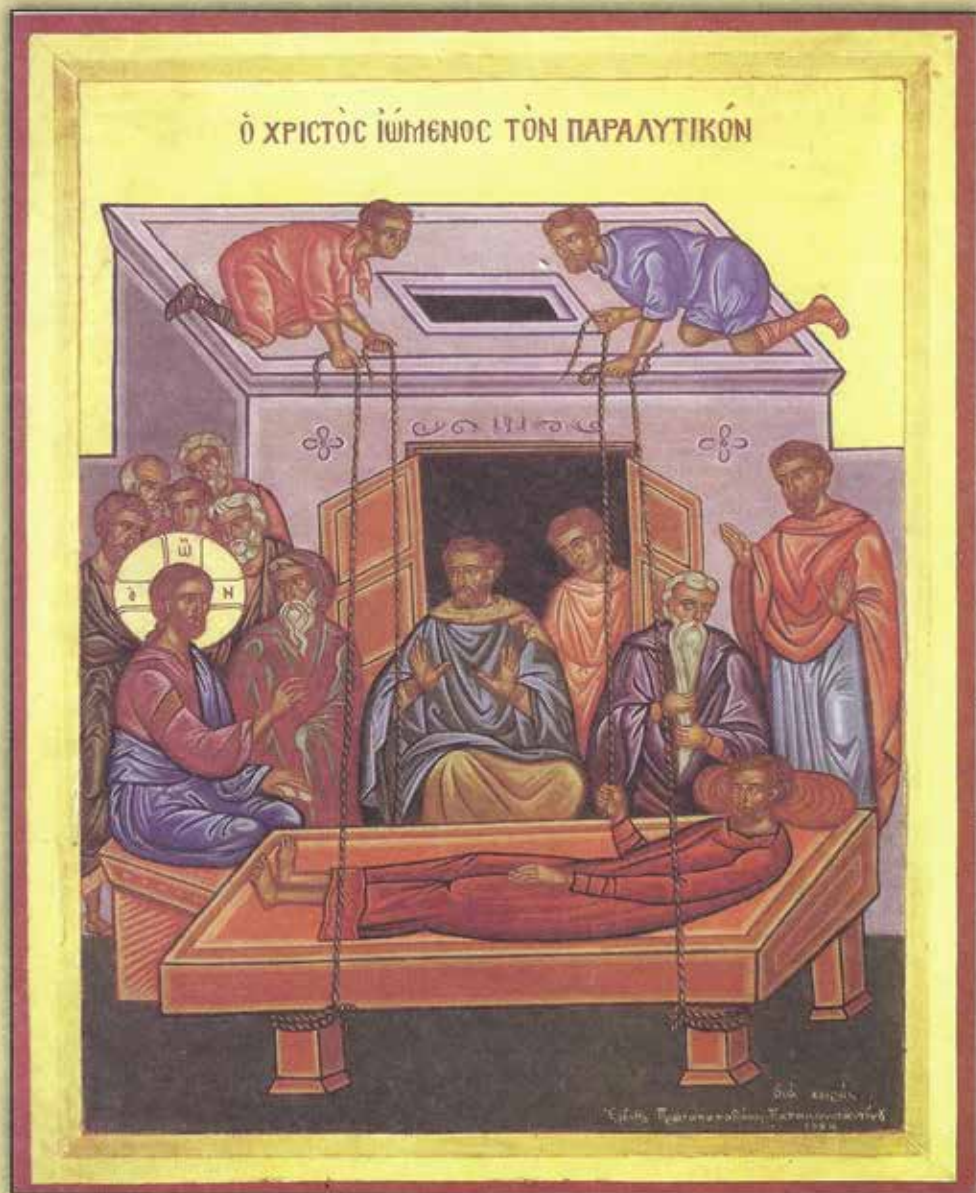

## **From the Archbishop's Chancery...**

### **Spiritual Regulations for the Great Fast**

Although our Church traditionally prescribed abstinence from meat and dairy products in days gone by for the entire duration of the Great Fast, the following are the minimal Lenten regulations today:

Abstinence from meat and all dairy products on the First Day of the Great Fast and on Good Friday.

Abstinence from meat only on all

Fridays of the Great Fast as well as Holy Saturday. It is also traditional to abstain from meat on Wednesdays during the Great Fast.

Reception of the Holy Mysteries of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist during the period from the onset of Great Fast to the Wednesday before Ascension Thursday.

The Fasting and Abstinence regula-

tions are not binding on persons 60 or older, the very poor, sick, nursing or pregnant women, children below the age of 14, and those who engage in physically very hard labor. However, all are urged, if able to do so, to observe the fasting and abstinence regulations.

All the faithful are urged to attend the Lenten services such as the Presanctified Liturgy and the Commemoration of the Deceased (Sorokousty).

Such good deeds as almsgiving, visitation of the sick, Bible reading and praying for vocations to the priesthood and religious life are most earnestly recommended to all the Faithful.

On Wednesdays and Fridays of the Great Fast, **the Liturgy of the Presanc-**

**tified Gifts is to be celebrated.** Typika may be used the other days. The Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great is to be celebrated for Sunday Liturgies during this time.

During Holy Week, the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is to be celebrated Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. On Holy Thursday evening, Vespers with Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great should be celebrated. On Good Friday, March 25, which is also the Feast of the Annunciation, special services which include the Divine Liturgy are to be celebrated. (Liturgical instructions and text will be provided.) On Holy Saturday evening, Vespers with the Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great is to be celebrated.

## **The Grace of God's Mercy**

In January of 2016, Our Archbishop, the Most Rev. Stefan Soroka, issued a Pastoral Letter for the "Year of Mercy." In this Pastoral Letter, he designates several Parishes to make special opportunities for the faithful to receive the grace of God's mercy. Ss. Cyril and Methodius Ukrainian Catholic Church is one of

these designated Parishes.

His Grace encourages the faithful to make Pilgrimages and visit various Shrines throughout the Archeparchy of Philadelphia, including our Shrine of the Our Lady of Zhyrovtytsi. The text of this Pastoral Letter for the Year of Mercy can be found on our web site.

## **What is the meaning of Vichnaya Pamyat?**

Eternal Memory - *Vichnaya Pamyat*, memory eternal, is the short prayer that closes our memorial services, which call for laying to rest or remembering the de-

ceased of our community. People may think that this prayer refers only to memory in this world, but the eternal memory is indeed eternal, for what gain would

there be if one's name were remembered until the end of time but forgotten in heaven? Thus, it is correct to believe that in prayer we are commending those who have fallen asleep to eternal life in the Kingdom of God. That is the real meaning of Eternal Memory - *Vichnaya Pamyat*. The Bible tells us how the names of the righteous will be inscribed in the Book of Life, while the names of the unrighteous will be forgotten. In the story of the Rich Man and Lazarus, found in the Gospel of Luke, we see that the Lord pronounces the name of Lazarus, who enters the Kingdom of Heaven,

but that the name of the rich man, prohibited from entering Heaven, is omitted.

Thus we see that the Church teaches and practices the eternal remembrance of our deceased faithful. We might bear in mind that countless numbers of people have passed through this life without noise or notice, but have received an eternal name in Heaven where neither death nor change exist. We are advised to bear this understanding in mind whenever we sing or hear this short but meaningful prayer.

### *The Grace of Almsgiving*

The kind and merciful Lord, dearly beloved, deigns to provide occasions and opportunities in many ways, whereby we can redeem our sins without great labor and difficulty. Since He sees people without the strength to fast for their sins or unable to abstain from meat or wine, the poverty of the poor gives the wealthy an opportunity to sell their earthly goods and distribute them to the poor. His secures abundant fruits, for by generously bestowing their superfluities upon poor men they obtain the remission of their sins.

What can be so good and delightful, so easy and ready at hand, dearly beloved, as to strive to redeem your sins by giving alms out of what God has deigned to give you more than you need? God does not command you to spend what is necessary for yourself or your family, for of this the Apostle says: I do not mean that the relief of others should become your burden (2 Corin-

thians 8:13). God does not need to spend your superfluities on Himself, but He wants to keep them for you in eternal bliss. Indeed, He wanted the poor to be so in order that the rich might have a means of redeeming their sins. God could have made all people rich, but He wanted to provide the rich with an opportunity for showing mercy.

Not for their own merit do the few rich gain more than they need and the many poor people not acquire even what they need. This is the cleverness of divine mercy, as I said before, so that while the poor patiently bear their poverty they may obtain forgiveness of their sins, and the rich, in turn, while they mercifully distribute their superfluities, they may redeem their offenses, and attain eternal rewards.
