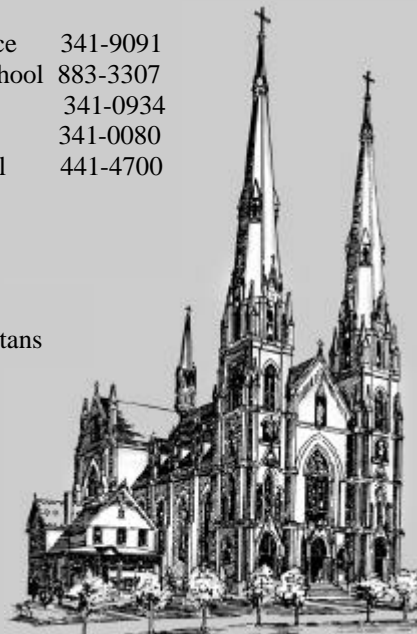

At his elevation to the throne of Peter 25 years ago, Pope John Paul II chose these words as a theme woven throughout his homily. **Don't be afraid!** Those words were uttered throughout the Sacred Scriptures numerous times! Accepting those demands with an attitude of faith will be accompanied by the grace God never fails to give for the strength to meet those demands. **Don't be afraid!** Don't linger on the precipice with doubt and anger. The Cross is the key to beauty as it is the compass of truth. With Jesus as the navigator, place your trust in Him and you will find peace!

“We do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin.” Hebrews 4:15

Once in a while I hear folks say, “I’m only human.” Or, they might say, “My humanness got in the way.” These are attempts, I think, to either excuse our faults and sins, or perhaps to denigrate one’s humanity, as though our being human is bad. Or a mistake.

From the Jewish and Christian point of view, humanity is good. In fact, according to the Book of Genesis, we are the **only** creatures whom God fashioned in his image and likeness (Gen. 1:27). Everything that God made is good, and after the creation of the human person, God says that creation is “very good” (Gen. 1:31). Now, what humanity does is another question – what God has done is good; when human beings turn away from God, sin enters. Being human is not a mistake, it is our destiny. To sin negates this.

The Letter to the Hebrews portrays Jesus as the great High Priest, following Jewish liturgical usage. The high priest in Jerusalem would enter the Holy of Holies (the great sanctuary) once each year to proclaim aloud the unmentionable holy name of God – *Yahweh*, invoking God’s blessing upon the people and the forgiveness of sins. Jesus, although not from the priestly tribe of Levi (he was from the tribe of Judah, the same as King David), becomes by his atoning sacrifice our high priest. Jesus redeems our humanity from sinfulness. He restores our humanity.

We no longer have any excuses, because Jesus became like us, he is able to sympathize with our weaknesses because he has in every respect . . . been tested as we are although without sin. Nor do we disrespect our humanity – because God has redeemed us in Jesus Christ. Everything about our humanity God created good; our very humanity God has restored in Jesus from the bondage of sin and death.

Liturgically we realize this when we hear the Word of God with our ears, we affirm it with our lips, we praise God with our tongues, we share the peace of Christ with our hands, we are invited to elevate our arms in worship and we receive the Holy Eucharist into our bodies. We are bonded by the Holy Spirit in the name of Jesus Christ so that we may approach the throne of grace with boldness (Heb. 4:16) in giving thanks to the Father. The Spirit of God forms us into the Body of Christ to the Father’s glory. Hence, the Kingdom of God is made manifest in our Mass – among us human beings. How good God is; how faithful!

Lord, open my eyes, my ears, my heart, my mind, my tongue and my lips that I may praise your holy Name. Live in me that my humanity, which you created, may be fulfilled. Thank you, Lord. Amen.

GETSEMANI PAPIEŻA POLAKA

Pontyfikat papieża Jana Pawła II jest wyjątkowy pod wieloma względami. Napisano już i jeszcze wiele zostanie napisane na temat jego osoby, działalności, niepowtarzalnej roli we współczesnym świecie. Dla nikogo chyba nie ulega wąpliwości, że jest to postać wyjątkowa. Wiele osób już dzisiaj nazywa go Janem Pawłem Wielkim.



Zastanawiające jest jednak pytanie: skąd ta jego wielkość się bierze, skąd pochodzi jego moc? Odpowiedzi można by udzielać wiele. Ta najbardziej właściwa, najprawdziwsza jest jedna: moc papieża płynie z podejmowania przez niego Chrystusowego Krzyża. Nawet więcej, można powiedzieć, że z szukania przez niego cierpienia, wychodzenia mu naprzeciw.

Kiedy, w 1976 r., kard. Karol Wojtyła głosił rekolekcje wielkopostne w Watykanie, zwrócił uwagę Pawła VI na całkowite osamotnienie Chrystusa w Getsemani. Mówił wówczas do papieża: Trzeba podjąć próbę odzyskania w jakiś sposób tej jedynej, danej ludziom w Getsemani, szansy pocieszenia Boga-Człowieka.

W Ogródzie Oliwnym Chrystus trzykrotnie zwracał się do apostołów, wśród których był Piotr, przyszły papież. Odsłonił im wówczas cały dramatyzm owej chwili; prosił ich: “Czuwajcie ze mną i módlcie się”. Tylko ten jeden jedyny raz Jezus Chrystus, Bóg-Człowiek, prosił ludzi o wsparcie, o pociechę, jednak jej nie otrzymał. Wybrani posnęli.

Kardynał z Krakowa, podczas owych rekolekcji, nalegał na papieża, by ten odzyskał utraconą przez ludzi przed dwoma tysiącami lat szansę pocieszenia Boga, by podjął tamto wezwanie: “Czuwajcie!” Czy rekolekcjonista mógł już wtedy przypuszczać, że to jemu samemu przyjdzie podjąć to wyzwanie, wypełnić prośbę Chrystusa o wsparcie? Karol Wojtyła powtarzał wielokrotnie: “Modlitwa w Ogrójcu trwa”.

Jego modlitwa w Getsemani nabrała szczególnego wymiaru, kiedy w dniu inauguracji swego pontyfikatu, Jan Paweł II zwołał do zgromadzonych na Placu Św. Piotra: “Nie lękajcie się, otwórzcie drzwi Chrystusowi”. On sam, wsparty o nieodłączny krzyż, przez całą swoją posługę pragnie jedynie **pomóc ludziom otworzyć drzwi Chrystusowi**. Po tych dwudziestu pięciu latach czyż nie można powiedzieć, że rangi ogromnego symbolu nabrała sytuacja z pierwszych dni pontyfikatu, kiedy lud, widząc papieża wspartego o krzyż, szeptał: “On wie, Kogo się trzyma, on wie, Kto go podtrzymuje”.

Papież w krótkim czasie zafascynował świat stwierdzeniem zawartym w jego pierwszej Encyklice *Redemptor Hominis* (Odkupiciel człowieka): “Człowiek jest droga Kościoła”. Konsekwentnie, przez wszystkie lata, wcielał w życie to stwierdzenie pokazując jaką wartością jest człowiek - każdy człowiek - dla Boga jak i dla niego samego - papieża starającego się naprawić “błąd” poprzedników z Getsemani.

Gdy, 13 maja 1981 r., na Placu Św. Piotra padły pamiętne strzały, świat zamarł, a wielu myślało, że to już apogeum pocieszenia Boga-Człowieka przez Wielkiego Papieża. A on, odczuwając modlitewne włączenie się niemal całego świata w jego misję, podniósł się z krzyżowego łoża cierpienia i stanął ponownie na placu, bez cienia lęku, jeszcze mocniejszy. Ta moc płynąca z krzyża, potrzebna do dźwignania krzyża posłużyła mu na długie jeszcze lata. A on nadal, świadomy swojego cierpienia, pociesza Boga-Człowieka w Getsemani.
