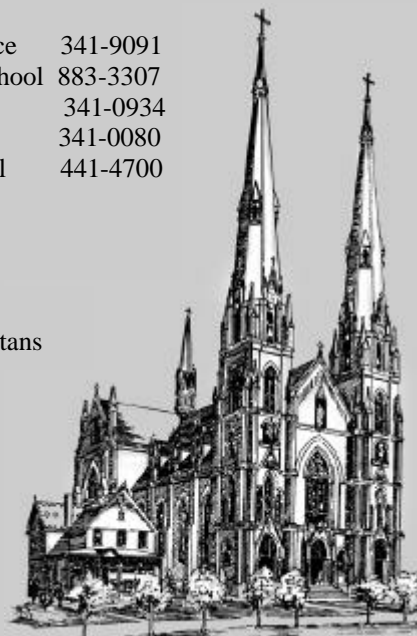

THE TONGUES OF FAITH

Wonderful! Znakomite! Wunderbar! and 9 more ways of stating the outstanding experience we had here last Sunday at our ‘Catholic catholic Choralfest,’ the concert of sacred music celebrating the 25th anniversary of Pope John Paul II. If we know how to do anything here at St. Stanislaus, it is how to celebrate in a grand style! Twelve choirs and/or soloists represented the culture of that many styles of musical expression within the Catholic Church, both Eastern and Western Rites.

The soft Ukrainian solo was the perfect prelude to the four Marian hymns performed by our Polish Choir. The Lithuanians, soloist and accompanist, performed beautifully and looked outstanding in their authentic garb. *Der Gottscheer Heimatchor* did a stellar interpretation of a German Mass arrangement. Central and Eastern Europe was well represented!

St. Michael’s Latino Choir as well as that of Sagrada Familia provided a glimpse of the extremely diverse Hispanic faith experience, their guitars providing a joyful support for their selections. The African-American representatives showed us two slightly different approaches to the Catholic experience, both with music so full of life it had the whole church swinging and swaying in praise!

Two of the most unfamiliar segments were those provided by the Koreans and the Melkites. The former mesmerized the audience even before they opened their mouths with their colorful outfits. The latter gave those of us familiar only with Roman Catholicism a taste of the Byzantine Catholic world of music in Greek and Arabic.

The world of Latin classical music was represented by the Sobieski family whose renditions of the most loved Latin pieces transported everyone to the clouds. Our English choir sent them to the moon with their perfect rendition of “Don’t Be Afraid”, followed by the grand finale, “We Should Glory”. If only the spirit that pervaded that final number could be bottled for ‘sale!’ Those of you who were there know what I mean. Wonderful! My thanks to everyone who helped make it so.

WHEN THE SAINTS COME MARCHING IN!

Next weekend is already the beginning of November. It seems like we have just recently begun the school year, and already we are headlong into the month of Advent! If time flies like this now, how does eternity feel?

As we follow an ancient tradition, the month of November is dedicated to remembering those who have been embraced by Sister Death (as St. Francis of Assisi refers to it) and called forth from life with us. At Saint Stanislaus, this month has always been observed with a deep sense of reverence, tenderness, and devotion. Every Mass throughout the month begins with the solemn and prayerful recitation of names of those whose souls have

been commended to our prayer. *(Reminder: Please submit those names soon, either to the rectory or in the collection basket, so that they can be inscribed.)* The Book of

Life, which contains all of these names, will be placed in a prominent location in the sanctuary as a month long reminder of our call to pray for them.

On Saturday, November 8, at 7:30 in the evening, we will continue our recently beloved annual tradition of praying Compline in Latin, accompanied by placing lit tapers in the darkened sanctuary as a commemoration of the faithful departed. Year after year, this wonderful devotion grows in popularity. Its solemnity and reverence is especially healing for anyone who has lost a loved one during the past year. Feel free to invite friends and family members to share in this common expression of faith in God and hope in eternal life.

Just as every human life touches many people, so also does every death wound the hearts of many. This November will be more poignant than ever, as our whole parish community shares a common grief in the violent death of our beloved Fr. William. It has been a hard, hard year. Our nightmare began in the short, dark, cold days of December. How fitting to come full cycle once again to a season of short, dark, cold days as our first year without Fr. William comes to a close. Many people are still deeply moved by grief and sadness, often surprised at moments when they least expect to be in the grip of despair's return. Like widows and widowers, people often find themselves missing him during the simple moments and routines of daily life.

At the same time, the past year has shown us the goodness of God in his mercy and compassion for those who suffer. Our parish ministries are still flourishing, and our spirit is not broken. Indeed, in some ways we have been strengthened, like gold that is made pure in the heat of white fire. In myriad ways, we have been proclaiming with our actions the resurrection faith: God wins!

In this way, confident that the love of God for us transcends even death itself, we dare to face the darkening days ahead, to remember those who are no longer with us except in spirit, and to recall for ourselves the victory of Christ over death and darkness.

KTO CHCE BYĆ PIERWSZY...

...Kto by chciał stać się wielki, niech będzie sługą waszym. A kto by chciał być pierwszym między wami, niech będzie niewolnikiem wszystkich (Mk 10, 43n).

Wprawdzie są to słowa zaczerpnięte z Ewangelii poprzedniej, a nie dzisiejszej niedzieli, jednak one doskonale pasują do postaci, które były najważniejszymi właśnie w ubiegłą niedzielę - 19 października Roku Pańskiego 2003.

Na Placu Św. Piotra w Rzymie, w obecności blisko półmilionowej rzeszy wiernych, papież Jan Paweł II beatyfikował Matkę Teresę z Kalkuty. Ktoś powie, cóż w tym nadzwyczajnego; przecież obecny papież kanonizował i beatyfikował już setki osób podczas swojego pontyfikatu. A jednak warto spojrzeć na to wydarzenie w perspektywie powyższego fragmentu Ewangelii.

Zarówno Ojciec Święty jak i błogosławiona Matka Teresa są wielkimi postaciami w ludzkiej historii, a równocześnie, bez specjalnych własnych zabiegów stali się rzeczywiście "pierwszymi".

25 lat posługiwania jako "sługa sług" (także taki tytuł przysługuje ziemskiemu zastępcy Chrystusa), jak również wcześniejsza posługa kapłańska i biskupia, to piękny przykład realizacji ewangelicznego wezwania do służby bliźniemu przez papieża "z dalekiego kraju". Ta właśnie postawa bycia "niewolnikiem wszystkich" w trosce o pokój, dobro i praktykowanie cnoty miłości uczyniła go prawdziwie wielkim i postawiła wśród pierwszych tego świata, choć nigdy o to nie zabiegał. A co najważniejsze: na pewno wielki jest w oczach Boga.

Podobnych słów można użyć wobec błogosławionej Matki Teresy. Agnes (takie jest jej imię z chrztu) Gonxha Bojaxhiu urodziła się 26 sierpnia 1910r. w Skopje (obecnie stolica Macedonii). Była trzecim, najmłodszym dzieckiem w katolickiej rodzinie Albańczyków. Po śmierci ojca, w 1919r. zamożna dotychczas rodzina doświadczyła biedy. Ale właśnie wtedy ich dom był jeszcze bardziej otwarty dla biedniejszych od nich. W wielu 18 lat Agnieszka opuściła rodzinę; już nigdy nie zobaczyła się z matką i siostrą. Odkrywszy w sobie powołanie misyjne, nastolatka wyjechała do Irlandii, by wstąpić do Zgromadzenia Sióstr Loretanek, które przygotowywały swoje siostry do pracy w hinduskich szkołach. W zakonie przybrała imię Maria Teresa od Dzieciątka Jezus. W 1929r. przybyła statkiem do Kalkuty i zaczęła pracować w szkole jako nauczycielka, a później dyrektorka. W korespondencji matka przypomniała jej, że "pojechała, aby pomagać biednym". 10 września 1946r., jadąc pociągiem, przeżyła "powołanie w powołaniu", jak sama to określiła. Wewnętrzny głos nakazał jej by, naśladując Chrystusa, zamieszkała z nędzaczami na ulicach Kalkuty. W 1948r. otrzymała zgodę papieża na opuszczenie zakonu loretańskiego i przyjęła obywatelstwo indyjskie. Zamieniła habit na hinduskie sari. Założyła nową szkołę, dla najbiedniejszych dzieci. Uczyla je i opiekowała się nimi. Przez dwa lata dołączyło do niej kilka byłych uczennic z poprzedniej szkoły, pochodzących z bogatych domów.

7 października 1950r. Stolica Apostolska uznała tę "grupę pobożnych kobiet mieszkających razem" za nowe zgromadzenie zakonne - Misjonarki Miłości.

Matka Teresa zmarła 5 września 1997r., oczywiście w Kalkucie, w opinii świętości. Pozostawiła po sobie ogromne dzieło: ok. 4 tys. sióstr, ponad 600 domów opieki w 127 krajach. Sama, poza sari, nic nie posiadała i nic ze sobą nie zabrała; jednak świat uznał ją wielką i postawił wśród pierwszych.
