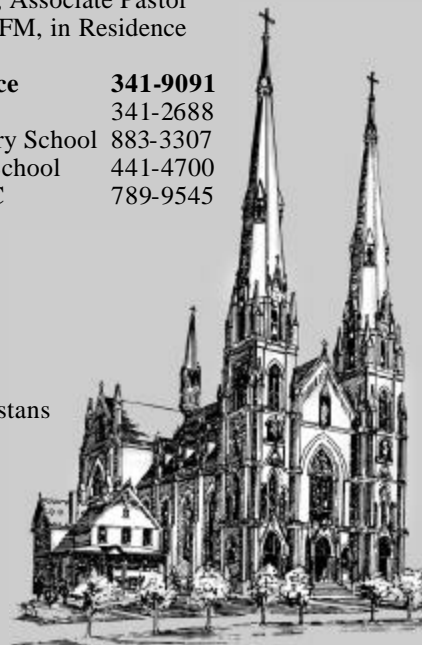

Four Altars

Each year there seems to be a theme which accents our spiritual and cultural activities here at the Shrine Church of St. Stanislaus. The theme flows from something extraordinary which sets a tone for the activities within the parish. One needn't look far to see the source for that focus—the pilgrimage to the holy places in and around Kraków. The icon which stands as a permanent reminder of that event is enshrined in our church now. It came from the city of Stanislaus and John Paul, a city which is in the midst of celebrating the 750th anniversary of the official charter granted it by Duke Boleslaus the Shy in 1257. That charter enabled much of the configuration, construction and development of the city after years of Tartar raids. As you hear the trumpeter from the bell tower this weekend, you will recall the famous melody which warned the inhabitants of Krakow of one such raid back in the 13th century. Thus, the ribbon which unites our four altars on this, the Feast of Corpus Christi, has its origin in the holy places around that famous city, the heart and soul of the Polish nation for centuries.

The first altar is dedicated to the Shrine of Divine Mercy, the place where our pilgrims visited at 3 p.m. on that very feast day this past Sunday after Easter. Now we will again reflect on the meaning and the depth of that mercy as we walk through this neighborhood together, praying and singing and hoping. That mercy is our hope. That mercy is Jesus' promise. We have His word.

The second altar takes us to part of the heart of that culture—Wawel cathedral, the Basilica of St. Stanislaus and St. Wenceslaus. It was here that the tombs of kings and cardinals and their treasures are kept and honored. It was here that the relics of Stanislaus were enthroned. It was here that John Paul said his first Mass.

If Wawel cathedral is one part of the heart of Poland, then Częstochowa is the other part of that heart. There, the icon of our Lady has welcomed pilgrims for centuries, listened to their prayers, dreams and worries...and continues to do the same to this day. You will recall the many personal thoughts of pilgrims which I've shared with you over the past few weeks in this column—thoughts which centered on our pilgrims' meeting here with Mary. The Mother of God truly loves us and intercedes for us as only a mother can to her son.

The final altar back at the steps of the church recalls the famous Basilica of Our Lady, *Kościół Mariacki*, the most prominent church in the city of Kraków. It is from the tower of that church that we can still hear the trumpet clarion, a call that we even need to pay attention to during this very time of life in our own city. The trumpet warns us to be vigilant. It warns us to be prepared to defend, protect, maintain our faith. It isn't meant to frighten us, but to remind us to 'not be afraid.' It begs for courage and eschews cowardliness. It warns of danger but reminds us of strength. The body of Christ gives us strength. As we honor that precious gift this day, we pray that the Holy Spirit guide our steps as we continue our pilgrimage here on earth, whether in Kraków, Slavic Village or elsewhere.

At the 8:30 Mass every Sunday, when I distribute Communion, I present the Blessed Sacrament to the faithful using each of the languages above. Yes, it's true — at that Mass

we have parishioners who are native speakers of English, Polish, Italian, German, and Spanish. We have other parishioners who come from Korea, Trinidad, and Jamaica. Our school hosts children whose families are immigrants from Poland, the Ukraine, Russia, Nigeria, El Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala, Mexico, Spain, China, Egypt, Jamaica, and the Dominican Republic. If I've left someone out, I'm sorry...

The multi-colored streamers ascending to the ceiling of our church are reminders that the Body of Christ is expressed in its diversity. This weekend we celebrate the sacramental presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Our prayerful gaze upon the Blessed

We can see Christ in the Blessed Sacrament in our church. Can we also see Him on Chambers Avenue?

Christ in our neighbor. It is even harder for some when that face looks much different from our own. After all, there was a time when the Spaniards doubted that Native Americans had souls, and Africans were property to be bought and sold.

We look back at those periods in history and wag our heads. Thank God those times are past, we think. But we are still not past the shadowy tendency to dehumanize others, especially those who make our lives difficult, or those whose ways of life are so radically different from our own. For example, look carefully at the way we use language when we speak about Muslims, Arabs, or anyone coming from the Middle East. On the other hand, we have in our lifetime the example of a modern saint who led us to look beyond these limitations. Mother Theresa of Calcutta referred to the face of Christ found in the "distressing disguise of the poor."

I love that phrase, "distressing disguise." We can see Christ in the cherubic faces and beaming smiles of the cute little First Communicants. Can we see Him in the face of the teenage delinquents who won't get out of the street when we drive past? We can see Christ in the face of an elderly person peacefully and prayerfully facing death. Can we also see Him in the face of someone battling the effects of AIDS? We can see the face of Christ in our Polish immigrant ancestors who came long ago. Can we also see Him when he comes from Mexico tomorrow? We can see Christ in the kind generosity someone shows to a poor person. Can we also see Christ in that very poor person, even when he doesn't show any gratitude? We can see Christ in the Blessed Sacrament in our church. Can we also see Him on Chambers Avenue?

Let us be open to the grace that lifts the veil of the disguise.

„Grupa czwartkowa”

Jak to już ogłaszaliśmy w *Biuletynie*, przy naszym kościele powstała organizacja o nazwie *Porada*. W jej ramach znajduje miejsce coraz więcej inicjatyw. Jedną z nich jest grupa, której celem jest pomoc osobom, które cierpią z powodu alkoholizmu jednego z członków rodziny. Oto krótka informacja na ten temat. Jej autorem jest p. Ryszard Romaniuk, który oferuje swój czas i fachową pomoc dla, jak to nazywa, „**Grupy czwartkowej**”. Oto jego tekst pisany kursywą:

Każdy alkoholik może znaleźć pomoc na spotkaniach Anonimowych Alkoholików, znanych w skrócie jako AA. Gdy alkoholik przestaje pić, okazuje się, że jego rodzina ma ciągle problemy, tym razem z trzeźwością alkoholika. Każdy boi się, że alkoholik znowu będzie pił. To denerwuje alkoholika i ... na złość rodzinie pije dalej. Dlatego też powstała inna organizacja: Al-Anon, dla rodzin alkoholików. Okazuje się, że żony, mężowie, dzieci i rodzice alkoholików mają sobie dużo do powiedzenia. Mogą sobie pomóc tak, jak nikt inny wcześniej tego nie mógł zrobić.

Opierając się na doświadczeniach Al-Anon, organizacja polonijna „Porada” postanowiła zorganizować grupę wsparcia dla rodzin alkoholików. Bywa, że alkoholik pije dlatego, że jego rodzina nie wie, jak traktować jego chorobę. Często zamiast pomóc, tylko zaostrza problem. Zdarzają się przypadki w polskich rodzinach, że żona, która ma dosyć picia alkoholu przez męża, nie wie jak szukać pomocy. Boi się dzwonić na policję lub do szpitala, nie zna języka albo boi się, że ma stracić pracę. Czasami rodzina boi się o kogoś, kto jest w Stanach nielegalnie. Trudno wtedy szukać pomocy. A przed ludźmi głupio się zwierzać.

Dla tych wszystkich, którzy nie dają sobie rady z powodu picia swoich najbliższych mamy słowo otuchy: w każdy czwartek od 7 do 8 wieczorem działa polska grupa wsparcia z udziałem specjalistów od problemów alkoholowych. Grupa korzysta z gościny Kawiarni Kraków na E 65-tej, naprzeciwko kościoła Św. Stanisława. Uczestnictwo jest anonimowe a grupa spotyka się w wydzielonym pomieszczeniu. Dajcie sobie i najbliższym szansę! Do zobaczenia w następnym czwartek.

Raz uczestniczyłem w spotkaniu tej grupy. Według mojej oceny, p. Ryszard Romaniuk jest osobą kompetentną. Spotkanie prowadzone było w sposób profesjonalny. Jestem przekonany, że takie spotkania dają uzasadnioną nadzieję na uzyskanie pomocy tym wszystkim, którzy zechcą przyjść. Jeśli było coś nieprofesjonalnego, to pewnie tylko fakt, że było to spotkanie naskalnicie darmowe. Dlaczego tak uważam? Ponieważ nasza ludzka psychika jest taka, że zwykle nie cenimy tego, co otrzymujemy za darmo, nawet jeśli ten dar jest najlepszej jakości i największej wartości.

Kiedy dłużej nad tym myślałem, przypomniało mi się pewne miejsce w Biblii. Pan Bóg mówiąc przez proroka Izajasza do ludu wybranego powiedział: *O, wszyscy spragnieni, przyjdźcie do wody, przyjdźcie, choć nie macie pieniędzy! Kupujcie i spożywajcie, dajcie, kupujcie bez pieniędzy i bez placenia za wino i mleko!* (Iz 55, 1). Czyżby i Pan Bóg czasami postępował nieprofesjonalnie?

ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT by *Rob Jaglewski*. The Corpus Christi procession at St. Stanislaus can be traced back to the very beginnings of our Parish in the late 1800's. The procession included all of the Parish organizations marching as a group. The St. Stanislaus Parish Band, led by Father Protaze Kuberek OFM, marched and played the various religious hymns. Liturgies at the various altars along the procession route consisted primarily of Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. As late as the 1960's and 70's the procession route went all the way to Fleet Avenue. This is a great tradition of our parish and reflects the devotion of our community to the Blessed Sacrament.
