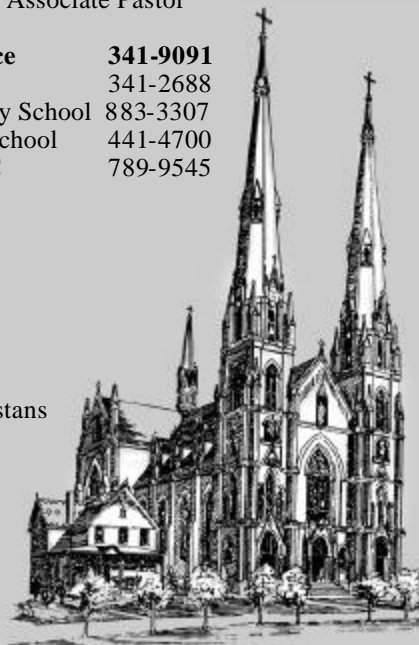

His Dad

Well, by this weekend, the cleaning and safety project in the East transept should be winding down. Our master wood-carver and restorer, Timothy Riffle, has been kept busy over the past few weeks safely securing the large altar within the shrine area, vacuuming, dusting, washing and waxing the wood, and continuing the process of completing the newest devotional space within our church. He even found and put back into place the very top of the altar which had been knocked off during the earlier restoration project 9 years ago, to find its way lodged in between places high up on the altar! During most of this process, you've seen the three figures standing atop the scaffolding, namely, St. Clare of Assisi, St. Dominic and St. Joseph. As of this writing those three are still watching Tim work from their interim perch, but perhaps by the weekend they'll be back in place.

It was during this time that one of the figures specifically caught my attention, that of St. Joseph—Jesus' dad! We don't really hear too much about him any longer, do we? Here was a figure in the life of Jesus for at least a part of his formative years. We know some things about him, namely his occupation (carpenter, but many scholars agree that in those times he might also have worked with stone), that he was from the House of David (thus providing the lineage for the Messiah), and that he was Mary's husband and the foster father of Jesus. In the Gospel according to Matthew an angel visited him telling him to stick with Mary and **"Don't be afraid"** (Now those words are in the icon directly across from his altar).

We can only imagine what lessons he tried to teach Jesus while he was a child. He must have told him great stories! Probably a few funny ones (perhaps: 'inch me and pinch me'!!!). He probably took Jesus around with him to visit his pals and probably introduce him to other children as playmates. The Gospel according to Luke tells us that Jesus was obedient to his parents, so at least we don't have to imagine Joseph scolding his son....although...who knows? Perhaps he brought home a dog for his boy to play with and had to give him a few pointers as to how to become responsible. Perhaps Joseph and Jesus left the house at times when Mary had her kumoszki over to exchange recipes and stories. The two of them probably wandered the streets, looked at the people, laughed, talked about life, shared some dreams...

I imagine Joseph's death was hard on Jesus as well—in fact that was the thought that crossed my mind recently while at one of our funerals when I could see the statue of Joseph up high on the scaffolding looking down on the grieving congregation. Many of the mourners knew the worldly father of Jesus is often remembered as the patron of a peaceful death. Once his dad was buried, Jesus knew that he would be responsible for his mother's well being from that point in time, a responsibility he probably tried his best to uphold. Finally, before his own death on the cross, Jesus asked his friend John to now take his place and watch over his mother.

In John Paul II's encyclical *'Redemptoris custos'* he wrote that *"St. Joseph was called by God to serve directly the person and mission of Jesus through the exercise of his paternal role. It was precisely in this way that in the fullness of time he cooperated in the great mystery of the redemption and was truly a minister of salvation."*

He is a powerful intercessor, along with his wife Mary. Together we say: *Joseph and Mary, pray for us, now and at the hour of our death!*

NOT A PROBLEM



I don't know how or where it all began. Somebody somewhere must have thought it up, or maybe it just slipped out accidentally but then caught on with others. It even started to creep into my own life as well, until I caught myself one day and surprised myself at what had come out of me. Now I notice it everywhere. It's gotten out of hand!

It's the replacement of "You're welcome" with "Not a problem."

"Hey, thanks for helping me with that!" "Not a problem."

"Thanks for picking that up!" "Not a problem."

"I appreciate you stopping by!" "Not a problem."

"You really helped a lot with that!" "Not a problem."

"My mom was happy you called!" "Not a problem."

"Can I have some ketchup with that?" "Not a problem."

We often talk about the need to express gratitude to one another for the kindnesses extended to us. It is a matter of courtesy, to be sure, but also it is an acknowledgement that someone has gone a bit out of the way for us. Not that they do it just for

the sake of being thanked (which is another matter), but it is right to recognize it nonetheless.

Lately, though, it seems that we are not only less inclined to give thanks, we are also uncomfortable with accepting the thanks given to us by others. When one learns a foreign language, there are some basic phrases that are usually at the top of the list: Yes — no. Please — thank you. Thank you — you're welcome. When I thank someone for something, and they say it was not a problem, I sometimes want to ask, "If it had been a problem, would you have done it anyway?" Of course, it would be awkward to ask something like that, because they most certainly are not thinking that way. I think the phrase "Not a problem" comes to the lips sort of automatically. Too bad that "You're welcome" is not as easy to say.

The Wisdom writer suggests that the things of heaven are beyond our grasp. "Not a problem?" Saint Paul urged Philemon, a Christian slave-owner, to accept one of his own slaves, Onesimus, as a brother. "Not a problem?" Paul himself was literally imprisoned for the sake of the Gospel. "Not a problem?" Jesus asks us to take up a cross to follow him. "Not a problem?" He also asks us to renounce our possessions before becoming disciples. "Not a problem?"

We give thanks to God for the many blessings we receive. We also thank God for the challenges and difficulties of discipleship in Jesus. God's response to our expression of gratitude is not, "No problem." It is, "You are welcome." Welcome to the life of grace. Welcome to the challenge of ongoing conversion. Welcome to embracing the cross. Welcome to caring for the poor. Welcome to forgiveness and mercy. Welcome to the Eucharist. Welcome to the joy of eternal life.

Jeszcze bedac w Polsce, slyszalem opowiesci Polakow mieszkajacych za granica o milym zwyczaju spotkania sie po niedzielnej Mszy sw. Takie spotkania odbywaja sie najczesciej w piwnicach kosciolow lub w sasiednim budynku i maja szczegolny charakter integracyjny. Sa to miejsca, gdzie rodacy przy filizance kawy czy herbaty, maja okazje do rozmow, wspomnien, podejmuja nowe pomysly, a przede wszystkim podtrzymuja wiezi polonijne.

Taki obraz Polonii mialem na dlugo przed przyjazdem do Ameryki. To moje wyobrazenie zostalo potwierdzone, kiedy przyjechalem tu przed rokiem. Podczas katechezy dzieci w kaplicy konwentu, ich rodzice spotykali sie w innym pomieszczeniu. Mamy przynosily domowe ciasto, ojcowie zywo dyskutowali o polityce i pilce noznej. Bylo dla mnie milym doswiadczeniem spotkanie z dobrze zorganizowana grupa mlodych polskich rodzin.

ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT by Rob Jagelewski.

Father Anton Kolaszewski, the man who built our church made house to house collections to help pay for the construction of the church building. Although most of his parishioners, who worked at the Newburgh Steel Mill, only made \$7.25 a week, Kolaszewski financed the building of the church. He wrote to Bishop Richard Gilmour on November 5, 1890. "At present I need only a few thousand dollars more to complete this grand, glorious, beautiful temple. The good people give, that is true, most willingly, but I must call on them in their houses. I have to collect from house to house. Saturday was pay day at the Mill. This morning (Monday), I started a new house collection. We need the money to pay workers and the collection will take over a month, every day from dawn to dark."

REMEMBER 9-11. This year is the sixth anniversary of September 11.
