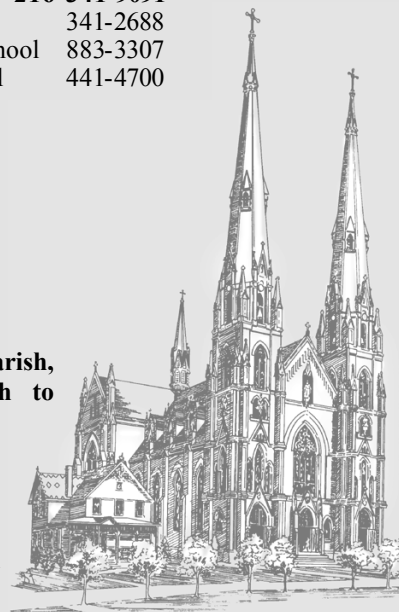

**He Just Won't Stop!**

Walk into our Shrine Church on any given day or time and you will walk into a world of different sounds, intended or natural. Sometimes you will even be lucky enough to experience silence if no other people are around conversing or otherwise detracting from the desired prayerful atmosphere we prefer to uphold. Amidst the noise and the silence you might find at least a few people praying, this often their only opportunity to sit and chat with their true friend in the tabernacle.

There's one person in our Shrine Church who actually remains deep in prayer day and night, before Mass, during Mass, in the heat of the afternoon, in the darkness of the night. His knees never weaken nor do his eyes reading the petitions asking for his intercession. He wears the symbol of his authority upon his head as he humbly begs at the feet of his martyred predecessor, as well as at the feet of the Mother of God. Who? I'm referring to John Paul II, the man who never leaves his spot in the Shrine area. There he kneels and there he prays on our behalf from the time he arrived in our midst again in November of 2005.

The basket which holds the petitions placed into the slots of the mitre shrine is nearly overflowing with the personal messages left for him since this custom began in May of 2008. The little blue sheets have never been read by anyone other than him and that's our promise. The messages to our constant prayer remain on his lips (like a Buddhist prayer wheel) as he continually intercedes on the behalf of all those who request his help. His abandoning of himself to the Blessed Mother brings her favors to us as he talks to her as his mother. His alliance with St. Stanislaus, the patron of the fatherland and the patron of our parish community, only makes his prayers that more effective and his knowledge of our true needs that much more astute.

You would think that on the evening before the feast of Divine Mercy way back in 2005 when John Paul returned to the home of his Father that he would finally be at rest. Well, for him, the work continues as he would have it no other way. As with Mary, his desire to help those in need and to present their cases at the foot of the throne of God never ceases. The little basket of blue sheets is really a basket of our crosses, John Paul, Stanislaus and Mary each taking turns to help each of us carry them along with Jesus. With all of them at our disposal just waiting for us to ask their help or advice our journey through life is made that much easier.

Our resident 'prayer' person has already seen the fruit of his intercession endless times. Many of us know in our hearts of those miraculous occasions, but this past Thursday evening those of us present at his 'Mass for beatification' met the young man from the Cleveland Clinic who was shot in the head, but survived and now has returned back to work as healthy as ever.....thanks through the intercession of our resident 'prayer.' We are so blessed to have him with us and that he's the type of parishioner who, when it comes to helping out, just won't stop!

### WHAT TO PRAY FOR

Last weekend we heard the wonderful Gospel about Martha and Mary, and their visit with Jesus. This weekend's Gospel reading follows immediately after last weekend's in the flow of Luke's Gospel. I think we need to look at the whole series to get a deeper grasp about prayer, especially prayer of petition.

Petition is probably the most common prayer in people's personal spirituality. We're always asking God to do things for us. We are certain that God hears us, and we trust that He will answer us according to our needs and God's loving will for us. Look at the Gospel stories from last week and this week and we see a contrast between ways of asking God for what we want.

In the first part of the trilogy, Jesus is asked to do something — and He DOES NOT do it. "Lord, tell her to help me," complains Martha about Mary. Martha's prayer is selfish. She wants Jesus to change Mary into someone other than who she is at that moment, so that Martha's life can be made a bit easier. Martha wants Jesus to change Mary, to make Mary do something, instead of asking Jesus to change herself into someone more patient, less anxious.

In the second part of the trilogy, the disciples ask Jesus to do something — and he DOES what they ask: "Lord, teach us to pray." This request of Jesus is not just for themselves, and it has the goal of transforming themselves more into what God calls them to be. They are not asking Jesus to change others, they are asking Jesus to be changed themselves. This prayer is not selfish, it is radically other-oriented. So, Jesus says, "Yes!"

In the third part of the trilogy, Jesus explains what we need to do when asking for things of one another. Here, He's talking about the normal, human, everyday needs that we have and that we sometimes seek from one another. He contrasts that with the kind of gift God wants to give — not bread, or fish, or eggs, but the Holy Spirit. Jesus is saying, Don't ask God for food and people for grace. Ask people — each other — for food, and ask God for what God alone can grant. And when God gives you that grace, it will always lead you to be more other-oriented and less self-centered.

So often, our own prayer is like Martha's. "Lord, change the other people around me so that my life can be better." Instead, we should be praying, "Lord, change me so that I can be more forgiving, more charitable, more patient, more concerned about others — especially the people who bother me the most!" Or, we ask God for practical things. "Lord, please get me that new car." Instead, we should ask our friends for help in finding just the right one. Or, we are exasperated because our friends act in ways that are less than god-like — forgetting that only God is God, and all of us are less.

When I was in college, a wise priest friend once said, "Be careful what you pray for, you just might get it." The Gospel of Luke gives us guidance on how to pray: what to pray for, what we should expect from one another, and what we can expect from God.

### „Panie, naucz nas sie modlic”



Słowa pouczają, przykłady pociągają. Ludzie żyjący głęboką wiarą i ufnością mają śmiałość wytrwale wstawić się za drugimi do Boga. Przykładem wzruszającej prosby za innych jest Abraham. Natomiast Jezus uczy nas dzisiaj jak zwracać się do Boga na wzór dziecka, które ufnie zwraca się do swego Ojca.

Mozemy zrozumieć urzeczenie jednego z uczniów widokiem rozmodlonego się Jezusa oraz jego prośbę: „Panie, naucz nas się modlić”. Mistrz po prostu urzekal innym stylem zachowania i przemawiania. Jezus spełnił prośbę ucznia i nauczył jego i nas modlitwy Paskiej.

My te modlitwy Jezusa znamy i widzimy, jak mądrze jest ułożona. Jest to modlitwa siedmiu prośb: trzy odnoszą się do spraw Ojca, bo Bóg ma być zawsze na pierwszym miejscu. Należy do nich: cześć dla imienia Bożego, nadejście Bożego królowania, wreszcie pełnienie woli Bożej, pragnące prawdziwego, a nie pozornego dobra. Te sprawy Ojca niebieskiego są niestety często lekceważone, osmieszane, odrzucane. Czasem dopiero cierpienie przywraca im właściwe miejsce.

Po prośbach dotyczących Boga następują cztery prośby o nasze sprawy. Są to: potrzeba zaspokojenia głodu, przebaczenie win i wola przebaczenia wzajemnych krzywd i żalów, ochrona przed pokusami i wybawienie od złego. Jak więc widzimy, modlitwa Paska jest prosta, zwięzła i treściwa.

„Proście, a będzie wam dane”

W dzisiejszej Ewangelii słyszymy o jednym rodzaju modlitwy, jaka jest prośba i błaganie. Jezus uczy nas, byśmy byli natretni w modlitwie, jak natretny jest sąsiad, gdy w nocy przychodzi i prosi o chleb.

Postawa dziecięcej ufności w niczym nie przeszkadza, by modlić się do Boga wytrwale. Na zakończenie przytoczę znana modlitwę:

Prosiłem Boga o danie mi mocy do osiągnięcia powodzenia,  
- uczynił mnie słabym, abym się nauczył pokornego posłuszeństwa.

Prosiłem o zdrowie dla dokonania wielkich czynów,  
- dał mi kalectwo, abym robił rzeczy lepsze.

Prosiłem o bogactwo, abym mógł być szczęśliwym,  
- dał mi ubóstwo, abym był rozumny.

Prosiłem o władzę, żeby mnie ludzie cenili,  
- dał mi niemoc, abym odczuwał potrzebę Boga.

Prosiłem o towarzysza, aby nie żyć samotnie,  
- dał mi serce, abym mógł kochać wszystkich braci.

Prosiłem o radość,  
- a otrzymałem życie, aby móc cieszyć się wszystkim.

Niczego nie otrzymałem, o co prosiłem,  
- ale dostałem wszystko to, czego się spodziewałem.

Prawie na przekór sobie,  
- moje modlitwy nie sformułowane zostały wysłuchane.

Jestem spośród wszystkich ludzi najhjojnziej obdarowany.  
(tekst anonimowy, znajduje się w instytucie rehabilitacyjnym w Nowym Jorku). Ufna i wytrwała modlitwa w duchu wiary i miłości sprawi, iż Chrystus wysłucha każde błaganie, jeśli ono będzie zgodne z Jego wola i będzie dla nas dobrem.

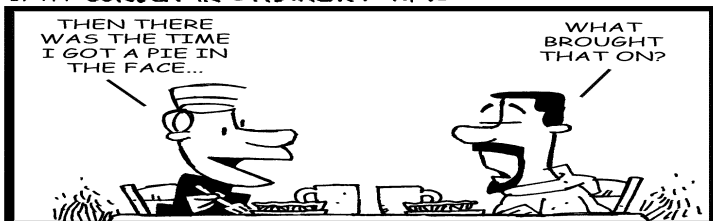

**ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT**

Father Wenceslaus Krzycki OFM was the Pastor of St. Stanislaus Parish from 1912-1923. His first project was building a new rectory for the friars. The friars moved into the present rectory on December 31, 1913. The original wood frame rectory was moved to a rear lot and later sold for \$750. Father Krzycki formed a federation of all of the parish organizations (there were 42 parish organizations at that time) to engage in charity and social work in the parish and other institutions. In 1916 Father Krzycki started a parish monthly newsletter. This published parish information and sermonettes. A great deal of the early years of his pastorate were spent keeping in touch with parishioners in the Armed Forces of the American and Polish Armies involved in World War I.
