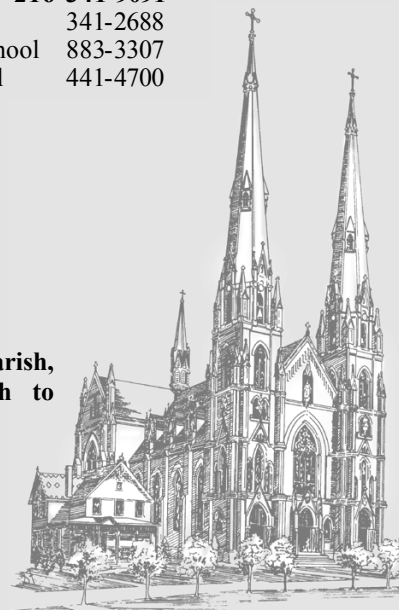

**More on the Assumption/Dormition**

Last weekend the Western/Roman Rite celebrated the great feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary while our brothers and sisters in the Eastern/Byzantine Rite celebrated the feast of the Dormition of Mary! To most of us on earth these two celebrations are perfectly fine, presenting no conflict one way or the other (save to the Theologians). In case you didn't notice, ours is probably one of the only churches in this country which actually has images of both events, a true rarity in the Roman tradition (as well as an image of Jesus in the grave). Thus we were able to give birth a few years back to the new tradition of the 'covering the image with rose petals' in which we took part after the liturgies on the vigil and the feast.

Brother Patryk, our current resident seminarian from Krakow/Verona informed me of another great tradition in this same vein which takes place annually at Kalwaria Zebrzydowska outside of Krakow. The great shrine in that city consists of numerous chapels scattered about the hillside each dedicated to a different event in the life of Jesus or Mary. (When our parish pilgrimage visited that site in 2007 we only had time

to visit the main basilica at the center of the shrine and didn't get the chance to meander throughout the remainder of the site.) Br. Patryk told me that among the many chapels are two specifically dedicated to the events commemorated regarding the passing of Mary namely, her Dormition and her Assumption. First, prior to the holyday, the faithful gather at the chapel of the Dormition where Mary is laid in state. Her sleeping image is then carried in procession on a bier throughout the grounds toward the chapel of the Assumption where her entrance into heaven is celebrated on the feastday.

The tradition of the rose petals has its origins in one of the Byzantine legends surrounding this feast. As the story goes, eleven of the Apostles were summoned by God to be there for the final breaths of His Mother in her home in Jerusalem. When they thought she had left this life her body was taken to a cave for burial. Three days later the last Apostle, Thomas, arrived to pay his respects to the body of the Mother of God. When the others led Thomas into the cave to see Mary, the cave was opened and all that was found in place of Mary's body was a bed of roses. Jesus had already taken her, along with a band of angels, body and soul, into heaven. Thus, our tradition's roots.

The additional blessing of herbs and flowers is a specifically Polish custom on this feast day. Thus, many parishioners brought bouquets of flowers with them to the weekend liturgies to be blessed to be kept in their homes near a statue or picture of Blessed Mother. We are lucky to have such colorful and beautiful traditions!

### JESUS LOVES THE LITTLE CHILDREN...

**...all the children of the world! Red and yellow, black and white, they are all are precious in His sight. Jesus loves the little children of the world!**

David Krakowski, our Director of Liturgy and Music, is an amazingly qualified musician, and we are blessed to have him in our midst. He has been educated in the Church in a minor seminary, and trained in classic pipe organ by masters. He has experience in the business world, he has had offers of employment in other fields, he has lived in exciting cities around the country, and yet he continues to contribute to the wider Cleveland community. We are blessed to have him as our Director of Liturgy and Music, as we are also one of the very few parishes in the city to have a full-time staff person in this kind of position. This is part of what demonstrates our commitment to good liturgy and worship.

A few years ago, I asked if he would be willing to play a couple of pieces during our school Masses. Our students gather for Mass every Wednesday (middle grades, how unsure of themselves!), Thursday (primary grades, how cute!), and Friday (junior high, how challenging!). Several parishioners come to Mass those days as well, to pray with our kids and to greet them at the Sign of Peace. But it would have been ghastly to have these kids at Mass without any kind of music, and since David was often in his office early, I wondered if he could stop into the church and play a bit for the kids.

Being David as he is, of course he said, "Yes." Then he worked to become comfortable with the various songs the kids like to sing. Here is a man who has been classically trained, asked to prepare for 6-year-olds who have rarely sung! I wondered what his "favorite" songs might be. Maybe I was surprised, but probably not, was the most frequent song is the one whose refrain is above. David has a heart for the kids of our school.

So do all the Friars who serve here, who spend several hours each week visiting the children and encouraging them to be their absolute best as God called them to be. Fr. Len visited each class on the opening day, and he encouraged them as a grandfather encourages his own family. Br. Patryk took the touching opening day photographs printed here, and he captured many other images that fix the spirit of the day. Br. Justin is present to the kids in his gentle and humble way, demonstrating the kindness and simplicity of Saint Francis himself.

Perhaps the most seriously committed people to our mission of education is the group of teachers and staff. Do we all realize that our teachers could make twice the salary they would have made in the public system — a system already underpaid?? They pay a higher price than anyone, all for the sake of actually teaching, of making a difference in kids' lives. Day after day, hour after hour. And our teachers do a marvelous job, day after day, as our test scores indicate.

And about our school parents, many of whom pay a higher personal cost than our parents did years ago — having received a building and a campus that others did not have to fix — Can you please give to other kids what has been given to yours, namely, a school campus worthy of their greatness, whatever their background?

This week, we celebrate not only our school, but may OUR SCHOOL be rich in grace, and may we be honored in the sight of our Lord. May all of our children be as blessed

### „Panie czy tylko nieliczni beda zbawieni?”



Wielu stawia sobie to pytanie w różnych okolicznościach życia. Stawiają je teologowie, stawia je młodzież poszukująca sensu życia, stawiają osoby umierające, których życie dobiega końca. Kto będzie zbawiony? Kto będzie uczestniczyć w radości bez końca z Ojcem w Niebie? To pytanie zadano również Jezusowi, kiedy wedrował przez różne miejscowości, kierując się ku Jerozolimie.

Nasze codzienne działania zmierzają do tego, by czynić życie coraz to łatwiejszym. Nowe wynalazki, automatyzacja i wszelkie usprawnienia mają nas odciążać w pracy i domowych obowiązkach. Mimo to nieustannie odkrywamy radość i satysfakcję płynącą z trudu i zaangażowania. To właśnie wysiłek i poświęcony czas pozwalają nam poznać siłę naszego ducha.

*Panie czy tylko nieliczni beda zbawieni?* To pełne obawy pytanie było prawdopodobnie spowodowane zbyt ciasnym i jednostronnym zrozumieniem nauki Chrystusa: w duchu prawa Starego Testamentu. Jezus nie udzielił odpowiedzi na to pytanie, nie dał takiej odpowiedzi, jakiej zapewne oczekiwali rozmówca. Zmienił problem z: kto będzie zbawiony – na: jak być zbawionym. Jezus uczy swoich uczniów, by nie zajmowali się spekulacjami, ale zająli się prawdą.

A zatem jak być zbawionym? Najpierw trzeba chcieć wejść przez ciasne drzwi do Królestwa Niebieskiego. Nie każdy będzie mógł tam wejść, nie każdy będzie się tam nadawał.

Nie sposób oderwać myśli od tych pielgrzymkowych dróg i szlaków prowadzących do grobu św. Jakuba w Hiszpanii, czy do narodowego jasnogórskiego sanktuarium Matki Bożej Częstochowskiej. Jeśli nawet za pielgrzymką stoja nie tylko religijne motywacje, jeśli nawet ktoś wyrusza w drogę, bo szuka jakiegoś innego sposobu na spędzenie wakacji, trzeba *przyznać*, że jest to wybór, który daje szansę zrozumienia, jak wielkie znaczenie dla ducha człowieka, dla jego życia i formacji, mają owe „ciasne drzwi” z dzisiejszej Ewangelii.

Pielgrzymowanie prowadzi do swego rodzaju synchronizacji ducha i ciała. Jest wyrazem tych wysiłków, które próbują ogarnąć człowieka we wszystkich wymiarach jego życia. Uświadamia, że duch i ciało wzajemnie się wspierają i że nie można ich oddzielać.

Ciasne drzwi to narzucanie sobie obowiązków, to dyscyplina, to karność, które według autora Listu do Hebrajczyków są błogosławieństwem i znakiem miłości Boga, a które często dzisiejsza młodzież i niektórzy pedagodzy nurtów liberalnych uznają za horror i zagrożenie. Jezus każe wchodzić nam przez ciasną bramę – bramę wymagan.

Polacy czasem myślą, że są narodem katolickim, że z ich narodu wyszedł papież Jan Paweł II, siostra Faustyna, ks. Jerzy Popiełuszko czy wielu innych świętych, że będzie im łatwiej przejść przez ciasną bramę.

Bóg nie będzie przeglądał roczników statystycznych religijności. Potrzeba czegoś więcej niż formalnej przynależności do religii. Potrzeba wiary, która polega nie na pustej deklaracji, ale na żywym przywiązaniu do Boga, zapraszaniu go nieustannie do swojego życia, kierowaniu się Jego prawami. Trzeba wchodzić przez wąską drogę wiary, która przejawia się w uczynkach miłości, wiary, która przejawia się w modlitwie, w poświęceniu swojego czasu dla Boga.

Obysmy nie zadawali pytań, kto będzie zbawiony? Czy wielu czy niewielu? Ale wchodzimy przez ciasne drzwi żywej wiary, pracy nad sobą, karności i miłości.
