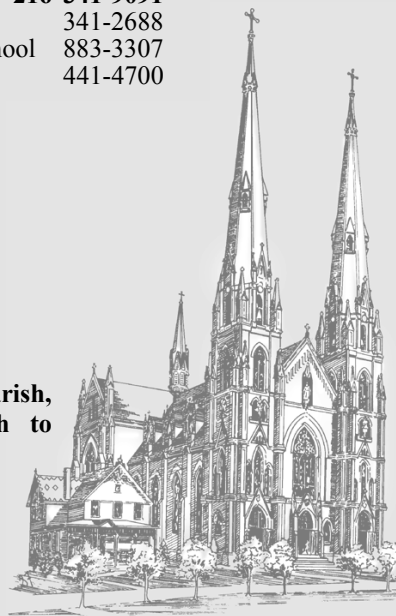

**The Falling Leaves...Listopad**

We're fortunate in our hemisphere to enjoy the full cycle of the liturgical year along with the flow of the seasonal calendar. With October almost behind us and November at our doorstep we already feel nature winding its way down into a period of rest. The Polish term for November, *Listopad*, directly tells us of the falling leaves. They are blanketing the gardens and lawns, giving back some of the nourishment they derived from the ground throughout their lifetime. Nature shows us that we all need to take a little time out to rejuvenate in order to contribute to life more fully. Hibernation is really a time of re-energizing, preparing us to make the most of life, to be more creative, to add our personal touch to the beauty of creation.

Here at the Shrine Church soon we'll be winding down the liturgical year. On Monday we'll already begin remembering the falling asleep of our loved ones as their names are read aloud before the November Masses. Pictures will bedeck the Passion Altar and tapers will be set surrounding the Paschal Candle. We keep our loved ones alive as we remember them. Besides, they are not gone, they are only gone from our lives in a certain way. They are asleep in Christ but they can still help us in this life if we ask them. God loves them and is taking care of them as we could only hope to.

With the Solemnity of Christ the King coming on November 21, we will together meditate on the mystery and gift of the Eucharist. The day allows each parishioner to spend some time in adoration face to face before Jesus prior to our Vesper Service at 4 PM, culminating in the great procession. Please plan to share that event with Him and with His saints and with our living and departed loved ones as we all walk together in unity honoring His eternal gift, His presence in the Blessed Sacrament. All of our voices will join together on that solemn occasion as we sing our praises of thanksgiving.

Then, on the following Thursday, we celebrate our national holiday of Thanksgiving. As a nation we do have much for which to be thankful. We have been given so much! Our morning Mass is just a little token of thanks back to God for all He has given to our land over and over again. We pray His hand will guide us as that same hand is raised in forgiveness for all our faults.

Advent begins the last weekend of November. The narcissus bulbs will be scattered about slowly bursting forth to show us a little life in their white flowers during the darkest days of the year in December. The blues and violets of our decorations and wreath will carry us through the season as we remember Mary's pregnancy with Jesus from the moment of her conception to the moment of His birth. The Advent wreath will be lit that first Sunday...but before you know it, we'll be celebrating the birth of the Light once again. But that will happen in December...for now, let us savor all the beauty offered to us by God throughout November. By the end of the month the leaves will all have fallen and the cycle of a new liturgical year will have begun once again.

### ALL OUR CHILDREN

“Jesus loves the little children!” So goes a line in one of the favorite songs sung in church at the children’s Masses. Three times a week, our school children come to church to start their days with Mass. Wednesday we have grades 4-6, Thursday grades K-3, and Friday grades 7-8: or as we say in the rectory, the

middle kids, little kids, and big kids. And Jesus loves them all!

Although it’s not a comprehensive survey, the word that reaches me from around the diocese is that we are one of the few Catholic schools — urban, suburban, or rural — that offers Mass so frequently weekly for our kids. Many of us older folks who grew up in Catholic schools remember going to Mass every day, so going once a week seems like a downgrade. Perhaps it might be, but compared to others, we’re still pretty “Catholic.” Not only do our school children celebrate Mass each week, they also go to confession every other month, they all receive rosaries in October (and pray them each day!), they have Stations of the Cross Fridays in Lent, and there are quarterly all-school retreats.

Yet with all this “Catholic stuff” going on, to be sure we are not the kind of Catholic school you and I grew up in. The majority of our students are not Catholic, though most are Christian. A few years ago, a non-Christian student in our school told us he was not coming back the following year, because his grandmother thought we had “too much Jesus.” What a great compliment! As we Catholics become more and more comfortable with the word “evangelization” in our vocabulary, our parishioners need to become more aware and appreciative of the evangelization that goes on in our parish school — perhaps the most significant contribution we make to the betterment of the community, and the most consistent and intense exposure of our traditions to non-Catholic people.

Years ago, when Bishop Pilla was introducing the Vibrant Parish Life initiative to parish leaders, a pastor asked about maintaining Catholic schools when so many of the students were not even Catholic anymore. The answer he gave then is just as valid now: “We do this not because **they** are Catholic, but because **we** are.” This is what it means to be the Church in our time, the heart of evangelization — **to live the Gospel in a credible and public way, and to invite others to participate in the life of our faith community.**

To be honest, sometimes the children’s Masses are a bit chaotic. Many of the kids don’t know how to go to Mass, especially the new students, and some kids go to other Christian churches on Sunday that might be rowdier in their worship. Other kids are Catholic, but their parents don’t take them on Sundays. But there certainly are plenty of days, most of them, when it is just delightful to have the kids for Mass. Sometimes they are so strong in their singing that they would put our Sunday congregation to shame!

How sad it is to hear parishioners say they don’t want to go to Mass when the kids are there. Why would we not all try to share our most precious gift with those who don’t know how to receive it? Over the next weeks, why not come to Mass at 8:30 on Wednesday, Thursday or Friday, and let the children evangelize you!

### Zdrowie za wszelką cenę?

Minęło już chyba dwa lub trzy lata od tego, jak ks. Dr Bogusław Jaworowski, misjonarz Świętej Rodziny, odwiedził Cleveland. Miał on serię wykładów na temat okultyzmu, czarów, satanizmu, wróżbiarstwem, itp. Zdesperowani cierpiący, którym nie mogą pomóc lekarze, udają się do różnego rodzaju bioenergoterapeutów, uzdrowicieli, czy wręcz czarowników. Poniższe dwa przykłady opisane przez ks. Gabriele Amorth w książce „Wyznania egzorcysty” są dość charakterystyczne:

*Ktoś od pewnego czasu zaczyna odczuwać dolegliwości fizyczne. Odwiedza różnych lekarzy i przyjmuje rozmaite lekarstwa, ale choroba zamiast ustępować jeszcze bardziej się wzmacnia. Nikt nie może odkryć jej przyczyny. W końcu udaje się do jakiegoś czarownika czy wróżącego z kart i słyszy: „Rzucono na pana czary przez sporządzenie przedmiotu guślarskiego. Jeśli pan chce, mogę go usunąć. Ale wpierrw proszę zapłacić mi milion lirów”. Ktoś taki najpierw się namyśla, a potem się godzi i płaci. Być może zostaje poproszony o zdjęcie, bieliznę osobistą czy kosmyk włosów. Po paru dniach osoba ta czuje się całkowicie wyleczona i bardzo szczęśliwa, że wydał tylko milion lirów. Zły duch właśnie ją opuścił. Po roku zaczynają się na nowo pojawiać te same dolegliwości. Znowu odwiedza lekarzy, ale lekarstwa okazują się nieskuteczne, choroba zaś wzmacnia się coraz bardziej. To właśnie złych duch powrócił z siedmioma gorszymi niż on sam. U szczytu wytrzymałości cierpiący myśli: „Tamten czarownik kazał mi zapłacić milion lirów, ale dolegliwości mi usunął”. W ten sposób ponownie wraca do niego, nie zdając sobie sprawy, że to właśnie ten sam czarownik przyczynił się do nasilenia się jego choroby.*

*Tym razem czarownik mówi mu: „Teraz został pan zaczarowany przedmiotem guślarskim o większej mocy działania. Jeśli pan sobie życzy, mogę go usunąć, a od pana żądam tylko pięć milionów lirów, ktoś inny zapłaciłby podwójnie”. I tak zaczyna się wszystko od początku.*

*Drugi przypadek. Początkowe wydarzenia powtarzają się jak wyżej. Chory płaci, zostaje wyleczony przez czarownika i cieszy się zdrowiem. Ale za to jego choroba przechodzi na żonę, dzieci, rodziców, braci. W ten sposób zło zostaje pomnożone (również pod postacią uporczywego ateizmu, grzesznego życia, wypadków samochodowych, różnych nieszczęść, depresji...)*

Dlaczego o tym mówię? Aby ostrzec. Te rzeczy dzieją się także wśród nas. Moim obowiązkiem jest przestrzec nieświadomych. Chodzenie do wróżki, czarowników nie tylko po to, aby rzucić przekleństwo, ale także żeby znaleźć tam uzdrowienie z dziwnych chorób, oddalenie nieszczęść, itd., jest grzechem przeciwko I przykazaniu: „Nie będziesz miał bogów cudzych przede Mną!”

Ta jedna racja powinna wystarczyć. Oprócz tego, że to grzech, jest to także narażanie siebie i swoich bliskich na wielkie cierpienia. Uleczenie jest krótkotrwałe i następuje nawrót choroby. A nawet, jeśli następuje uleczenie całkowite, to kosztem czegoś o wiele cenniejszego, aż do utraty wiary włącznie, aż do narażenia się na utratę życia wiecznego. Mówiąc inaczej: grozi cierpieniem niewspółmiernie większym.

Pray that We the People and our elected leaders — whether Republican, Democrat or Independent, liberal or conservative — will approach national politics in an ever more sober and self-less civic spirit.”
