HOLY WEEK IS ALMOST UPON US...

During the days of Holy Week, the Spirit makes a way for us to pass over from sin and death to forgiveness and new life in Christ. Over the days of Holy Week, rivers of life will burst forth in the desert and there will be abundant life and joy. Let God make a way for you this Easter, that you would enter deeply into the days of Holy Week to experience the peace this world cannot give; the peace that comes from Jesus Christ.

HOLY THURSDAY:

Holy Thursday is the first day of the Easter Triduum, It begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper, which commemorates the Last Supper celebrated by Jesus and his disciples on the Jewish holiday of Passover. It's not a Holy Day of Obligation, but many Catholics attend Mass. Unique to the Holy Thursday is the *mandatum:* "I have given you a new command, love one another as I love you" (John 13:34).

This command of love is expressed in the washing of feet by the priest. It was during the Last Supper that Jesus taught the disciples that the Eucharist *is truly His Body and Blood*. Jesus' disciples were the first Catholic priests, the beginning of the priest hood.

GOOD FRIDAY:

Mass is not celebrated on this day. The altar is completely bare, the tabernacle empty, images are veiled or removed, holy water fonts are dry. The church is stripped of all externals so that we can focus our attention on one thing only: the holy cross by which we are saved. The cross is held up before us as a sign of God's victory over sin and death. The solemnity of Good Friday is not so much about mourning for Christ's sufferings, but rather an expression of our utter inability to fully comprehend or express the tremendous Mystery we stand before on this day, the wondrous love of God lifted high upon a cross.

EASTER VIGIL:

The Great Vigil of Easter is the Mass celebrated on Holy Saturday and it begins the Easter celebrations of Jesus' resurrection. We come to the Great Vigil of Easter hungry and thirsty, eagerly awaiting the waters of rebirth and the Paschal Eucharist. It begins with a fire outside or inside of the church, and Mass attendees light candles that slowly illuminate the church. Many readings from the Old Testament that foretold Jesus' death and resurrection are read. It's also the day that new catechumens, those who are entering the Catholic Church, receive the Sacraments for the first time. Holy Saturday night is the most important liturgical celebration of the year! This is the night when all is made new in Christ! Come and experience the glory of the Resurrection! Come, and receive the Light of Christ! Come to hear the story of salvation! Come, and renew your baptism! Come, and partake of the Paschal Eucharist!

<u>DO YOU KNOW WHAT WEDNESDAY IS SET ASIDE FOR?</u>

Correct! It's the day of fasting and prayer for the Justices of the Supreme Court, asking God to give them the grace, wisdom and courage to stand on the side of Life to overturn Roe v. Wade. And, our continuing prayers for peace in Ukraine, conversion of hearts for Russian Leaders, and for the million refuges. Offer your fasting and prayers to *Mary Immaculate*, that She may best apply them to the interests of *Thy Most Sacred Heart*.

MARRIAGE:

Couples requesting the celebration of the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the office at the time of engagement, at least six months prior to the anticipated date of marriage. If a couple wishes to be married as a registered parish member, they must actively participate in the faith (Sunday worship) and be a registered member of our parish at least 3 months prior to requesting the Sacrament of Marriage. Weddings are not celebrated during Lent.

BAPTISM:

Parents may request the baptism of their infant at least two months prior to the anticipated date of baptism. Family should be members of our parish, they must actively participate in the faith (Sunday worship) and be a registered member of our parish. To request baptism, please call the parish office at 715-824-3455.

ANNOINTING OF THE SICK:

If you or a loved one is in need of the Anointing Sacrament especially before a hospital stay or procedure - please contact the office.
