

Did You Know?

From our Sacred Worship Committee

St. Elizabeth of Hungary was born in 1207, the daughter of a king.

She married a prince at the age of 14. She insisted on a simple wedding instead of the usual elaborate celebration for someone of her stature. She bore three children and cared for them lovingly. Sadly, her husband died when she was 20 years old.



She was known for performing works of mercy, caring for the poor who came to their castle by feeding, clothing and paying off their debts.

After her husband died, she was banished from the castle by her brother-in- law. She used her dowry to establish a hospital. She completed menial tasks that no one else would do. She died in 1231.

She was an early member of the Third Order of St. Francis, and is honored as their patroness. She is the patroness saint of hospitals, nurses and the homeless. A quote from St. Elizabeth: "How can I bear a crown of gold, when the Lord bears a crown of thorns and bears it for me".

By reading about the saints, we can learn many things. As I read her quote, I noted that she focused on a single verse from John 19:2: "And the soldiers wove a crown out of thorns and placed it on his head". They were mocking Jesus. Historians tell us this crown resembled a helmet.

When one reads the bible slowly, contemplating the meaning of the words, one can search for a way to incorporate the teaching into one's own life. This is what St. Elizabeth did by using her riches to serve the poor.

For this upcoming season of Advent, what can we do to show that we remember what Jesus did for us as he was crowned with thorns?

Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe!

When we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King this Sunday, we declare to the world and remind ourselves that Jesus is the Lord of the Church and of the entire universe. Christ's kingship is rooted in the Church's teaching on the Incarnation. Jesus is fully God and fully man. He is both the divine Lord and the man who suffered and died on the Cross. One person of the Trinity unites himself to human nature and reigns over all creation as the Incarnate Son of God. The Church calls us to acknowledge Christ's kingship with our whole lives:

- He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the doctrines of Christ.
- He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God.
- He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone.
- He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, 'as instruments of justice unto God.'

Advent—A Time of Preparation

The season of Advent begins next Sunday, November 30th.

Advent is the four weeks we set aside for preparing our hearts before the annual celebrations of Christ's birth on Christmas. The Incarnation – God becoming man – is the turning point of history. Our Heavenly Father loves us so much that He promised to send us a Savior after the Original Sin of Adam and Eve - and He kept His promise.

The Son of God was born in Bethlehem to give His life for us on the cross so that our sins can be forgiven, so that we "may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10). This preparation during Advent is to include interior penance, which involves a conversion of heart toward God and away from sin. Let us take Advent seriously by taking more time for prayer, offering small sacrifices for peace in families and the world, and receiving the Sacrament of Penance.



To help you prepare your heart for the coming of the Christ child, Advent Material, including the Little Blue Book for Advent and Christmas, will be available next weekend at entryways. The Sacred Worship Advent Tree and Basket where you will find a spiritual exercise attached to each ornament or candy cane will once again be available beginning next weekend.



FAITH STEP

Imagine you could only participate in Mass one more time before meeting God for the Final Judgment.

How would you prepare? What would you wear? What intentions would you bring to that Mass? Who would you pray for knowing you wouldn't see them again in this lifetime? It's impossible to know when your last Mass will be. But in any case, the best way to prepare yourself for that day is to approach each Mass you are blessed to attend, as if it were your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass.

One thing I ask from the Lord, this only do I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze on the beauty of the Lord and to seek him in his temple.
