

To be a disciple of Christ is to be countercultural

Since I prepare for Mass almost every day and many of the liturgical days are dedicated to our saints, I get many opportunities to study their lives and reflect on them. They are incredibly varied in personality, life circumstances and temperament, but one common thread seems to be that the saints are those who are not afraid to stand against the culture of the day and stand for Christ, no matter what price they have to pay.

Last week, we celebrated the feast day of St. Boniface, the 7th century Englishman who was the great apostle to Germany. (Without him, many of us would not be here in this parish, because many of our ancestors were German Catholics, and he had a profound influence on bringing the faith there). There are legendary stories of the trials he went through. The German tribesmen had entrenched a very pagan culture and were quite hostile to this “newfangled” faith in the one God. So Boniface and his small band of Catholics were impoverished and persecuted. But he didn’t let that slow him down. One day, he came upon some tribesmen who worshipped giant trees. One such tree they believed was the abode of Jupiter. So Boniface (a man as physically strong as he was spiritually) chopped the huge tree down and used its wood to build a church dedicated to St. Peter. That took courage and guts. Needless to say, this did not endear him to all of the people, so he was eventually set upon by his enemies and killed with 50 of his Catholic compadres.

We also celebrated the feast of St. Charles Lwanga and his martyr companions from Uganda. He was executed to death in the late 19th century. When the missionaries first brought the faith to Uganda, the King (Mwanga) was at first receptive. But he began to turn on the Christians when he couldn’t get his way romantically. (Shades of Henry VIII!) But in his case, it was because the king was given to homosexual activity with the young men of his court. That was part of the culture, and most of the men in the court went along with it. Until, that is, Charles began to teach them chastity and teach them that these actions were against the will of Christ. When Charles himself resisted the advances of King Lwanga – and taught the others in the court to do the same, this so enraged the king that he had Charles burned to death. As he died Charles simply cried out with love, “My God!” He loved God more than the culture.

We should certainly think about that in our own day and age, when so many Catholics aren’t willing to be saints because they are afraid to resist the culture. When most college professors teach our young people that homosexual “marriage” is just fine; and that those who oppose it are bigots, like those who opposed mixed-race marriages; and when powerful companies like P&G and Delta and Trihealth begin sponsoring this immoral activity in very public ways, that all adds up to tremendous pressure. In fact, many young people cite this opposition to homosexual acts as their reason for leaving the Catholic Church. (Interestingly, women do that twice as often as men, according to recent studies). But if want to follow Christ, we can never abandon His teachings.

So the question is, do we want to roll with the culture, or do we want to be saints? We can’t have it both ways.

A Closer Look

Why do we say the "Sacrifice of the Mass"?

Christ's sacrifice was one sacrifice that took place at one specific point in time because He is human, but He is also divine, so the sacrifice was an eternal sacrifice.

The Mass is an unbloody eternal sacrifice that is one and the same sacrifice from Christ on the cross on Good Friday. A sacrifice so perfect and powerful that it can never be ended or repeated. It's eternal, because sins are still being forgiven even two millennia after Jesus's death. The Church maintains that without all the blood and gore of the physical Crucifixion, the Sacrifice of the Mass re-presents (not represents) the same offering as Jesus as the Victim at Mass.

The same person making the offering as Jesus is the Priest at the Mass. By virtue of the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the priest acts *in Persona Christi* (in the person of Christ). We are still receiving the same effect from Christ's one sacrifice, our sins are forgiven.



Our Lady of Victory Mass Time Changes Coming in July

- The Sunday Vigil Mass on Saturday evening will remain unchanged at 4:30pm
- The two Sunday Mass times will be **8:45am** and 11:00am

We hope this will provide the opportunity to continue to celebrate the Holy Mass at a time that works well for you and your families.

This schedule begins on Saturday, July 1, 2017.



Reflecting on the new Mass times

June 3rd (Memorial of St. Boniface, the Apostle to Germany)

One of the hardest decisions for a pastor to make is to change Mass times when it becomes necessary to reduce the number. Parishioners are understandably very attached to their Mass times and Sunday routines, and no one wants to budge. To be honest, I am reminded of a particular story in the Old Testament meant to teach a lesson about the great wisdom of the Israelite King Solomon. It's not a very family-friendly story, like much of that earlier part of the Bible. (For adults, you can read it on your own, at 1 Kings 3:16–28.) That story gives rise to the expression “dividing the baby”, to mean trying to split the difference in compromises when there is no easy solution possible.



So in trying to imitate the wisdom of Solomon, that is what I have decided to do regarding the Mass time change: Both the 8:00 a.m. Mass attendees and the 9:30 a.m. Mass attendees were not happy about losing their current Mass time, so I decided to split the difference evenly down the middle and have the earlier of our two Sundays Masses at 8:**45** a.m. That is a little unusual for a Mass time, but so is 11:15. (The longtime parishioners might remember that that unusual Mass time came about as a result of a similar compromise when the number of Sunday Masses had to be reduced from 4 to 3). My parish council had recommended 8:30 instead of 8:45. I usually take their recommendations, but in this case, I thought I'd throttle it back just a little.

I am hoping that most of our “early bird” folks who think the day is half wasted if Mass is later than 8:00 a.m. will be willing to wait for 45 minutes and that many of the folks who come to 9:30 Mass might be willing to get up a little earlier to join us and remain part of the community. I do sympathize with people wanting to sleep in on Sundays. Before I was a priest, I liked to do that too! There is of course the option of coming later at 11:00 if 8:45 proves too challenging.

Just as a reminder of why we are making this change: The Church has a legal code governing the celebration of the sacraments and other aspects of ecclesial life (called “Canon Law.”). One of these rules, #905, indicates that the priest should ordinarily not celebrate more than two Sunday Masses, unless there is a pastoral necessity. (“Necessity” doesn't mean “convenience.”) The law allows bishops to make the decision to permit their priests to say three Masses on Sunday if strictly necessary. For example, if the church building is physically too small to cram the total number of Massgoers into two Masses, a pastor might have to expand to three Masses. Fortunately, with our beautiful and large church, overcrowding is very rarely a problem.

Reflecting on the New Mass times (continued)

Why this law? I'll let the canon lawyers answer that, but from a priest's perspective, it is very difficult to pray the same Mass three times in a row on the same day. The Mass (for the priest especially) is a very intense prayer so it becomes difficult to pray in any meaningful sense of that word, if that has to be repeated over and over. In a sense, this law protects the priest from having to "just go through the motions." As our number of active priests in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati has declined significantly since the high point in the 1970s, there is no longer any assistant priest to divide the three Masses between.

We continue to pray for more priestly vocations so that this won't be a problem in the future. (Your prayers are already beginning to work! The number of seminarians studying in Mt. Washington to serve our diocese is finally starting to go up).

But there is a positive side to having fewer Masses: it means that more people will be able to pray together as one community. The Church holds that out as the ideal: having all parishioners together in one place every Sunday to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection. It is something we should center our week (and our life) around. The reason that parishes started multiple Sunday Masses in the first place was out of necessity, when far more Catholics were attending Mass than is the case today. We pray for the return of that day when all of our Catholics will want to worship the Lord and follow His commandments, but in the meantime, it is good for as many parishioners as possible to be worshipping together at the same time and place.

With my prayers that the people of Our Lady of Victory will be able to celebrate the holy sacrifice of the Mass with gratitude and joy for many generations to come.

Calming the Emotional Storms




