Reaping the Gifts of Volunteerism Becca Sontag

The Bible is laden with references to gardens and gardening, cultivating of seeds, tending to soil. The parish, also

like a garden with grounds to tend and grass to mow, and her land-scaping needs brought Paul Hanneken and Joe Dunn to begin their volunteer service to Our Lady of Victory in 1995. The grass needed cut and Paul stepped in to do it. No one asked but readily, having recently retired, he volunteered his time. The first go around with a small patch of tall grass was an ill fated three hour attempt with a push mower. Soon the benefits of a lawn tractor became clear.



Paul was joined that same year by a fellow retiree, Mr. Cornelius Joseph Dunn, and the two, who in fact were childhood acquaintances from Covington, took on additional jobs from pruning and trimming, planting occasional flowers and raking and disposing of leaves. Mr. Dunn and Mr. Hanneken credit this common work and service for others that gave these Delhi transplants and devoted parish members the opportunity for the friendship that developed.

Twenty years of service to the parish has brought Mr. Dunn and Mr. Hanneken many insights from the favored nesting grounds of the brown rabbits that prefer the grass in front of the Convocation Center to the careful and selective pruning of an Oriental yew so the needles don't die on the inside of the shrub. But more significant than horticultural wisdom is the spiritual gains some of which Paul speaks.

Mr. Hanneken tells us that it is through his work for the church where he feels most close to God. Giving of himself, his time and labor, in the sunshine and in the rain, eating lunch with the maintenance crew before the kids come tramping into the cafeteria, week in week out. Giving to God, giving to our community is where Paul feels the spiritual gifts that come from selfless giving.

Here is also where Mr. Joe Dunn (who once repaired stock market tickers for downtown brokerage houses) tirelessly planned for upcoming seasons keeping in mind what gets trimmed in the Spring and what gets pruned in the Fall and what gets chopped down to the ground. Joe tells us of the satisfaction of seeing the work come together and being pleased with offering this to the Church and to us all-- a happiness in seeing your hard work shine as a witness to God's love.

We thank you, Joe and Paul, for your hard work and dedication and the love you have clearly shown in your labors. The campus of Victory has twinkled under your care.

Drawing Closer to Jesus





An Interview with Our Seminarian Intern Jennifer Reinkemeyer



During the 2015-16 school year, Our Lady of Victory will be host to Jarred Kohn, a seminarian at Mount St. Mary's Seminary who has entered the internship year of his priestly studies. Each seminarian spends the year before he is ordained a transitional deacon assigned to a parish in order to learn more about parish life and the everyday duties of being a pastor.

Jarred began his work with Victory in late August, and will be here through May 2016. I had a short interview with him so parishioners could learn a little bit about him as he starts his year of service here with us.

Jennifer Reinkemeyer: Where did you grow up?

Jarred Kohn: I grew up in a small town called Philothea, Ohio outside of a "larger" small town named Coldwater, Ohio. While my parents were not farmers, my area was agriculturally centered.

JR: What school did you attend?

JK: I attended Coldwater Public Schools from Kindergarten through high school.

JR: How old are you? JK: I am 25 years old.

JR: When will you be ordained?

JK: I am studying at Mount Saint Mary's Seminary of the West in Cincinnati. Priesthood is set for 2018.

JR: How many siblings to do you have? Where are you in the line?

JK: I have one sister. I am the oldest by 3 years.

JR: When did you first hear the call to the seminary? Share a little about your vocation story.

JK: I first felt called to the priesthood in the year after I graduated from high school. I was working as a welder, and had never wanted to attend college. I had been laid off and during this time I began to explore my faith. Then one evening in Eucharistic Adoration, Jesus put on my heart that he wanted me to be a priest, a conviction I have never been able to shake. After one year of seminary I took one year off and went back to work as a welder. I then realized that I was still being called to the priesthood. I have been back in seminary for over 4 years now. It has been a great blessing and I have met many amazing people. I expect my internship at Our Lady of Victory will be more of the same.

JR: What do you like most about the seminary? Least?

JK: The community at seminary is my favorite part. We work and have fun together. The seminarians at the Mount are some of the most amazing men I have ever met. I also appreciate having the opportunity to talk with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament in communal and private prayer. My least favorite part is the studies. While I enjoy reading, academia is not my forte. I also enjoy working with my hands and see progress - such progress can be hard to see in academics.

JR: What are some of your hobbies/interests/free time activities?

JK: In my free time I enjoy to work out and do a number of other activities outside. For example right now I am training for a half-marathon that I am running to help support a religious order I worked with over the summer. I also enjoy to camp and hike. I actually enjoy doing manual labor as I mentioned before. Reading something that I am not assigned is also a favorite activity of mine.

JR: Who is your favorite saint?

JK: I cannot pick one favorite saint, but I can choose the top two. St. Josemaria Escrivá and St. Therese of Lisieux. They have provided wisdom and intercession that have rocked my life.

JR: Any other interesting tidbits about yourself you would like to share?

JK: I was a wrestler in high school.

JR: What do you hope to gain from your internship year here at Victory?

JK: I hope to gain many things from my internship at Victory. Most importantly I hope to gain continued confirmation of my vocation. I know I will also be surprised by what I learn and get from this experience, which will be undoubtedly amazing and grace-filled.
