

OLV HISTORY TIMELINE By Kathy Lynn

February 2, 1834 - The Roman Catholic Society of Delhi Township was formed when the Catholics in Delhi gathered at Philip Owen's house.

August 17, 1842 - Adam Emge deeded land on Rapid Run to the church and donated the lumber to build the first church and school.

1842- Fr. John Martin Henni was assigned as the priest for St. Stephen's Church.

1842 - 12 children attend school in the church to learn German, religion, arithmetic, reading, and writing.

December 26, 1844 - Anna Mary Freytag, daughter of Anthony and Susanna, was baptized. This was the first recorded baptism at the new church.

January 5, 1845 - St. Mary's Ladies Society was organized to supply articles for Mass. They eventually furnished the rectory, too.

1845 - St. Stephen's Society was established, giving the men the opportunity to serve the school and church. This later became known as the Holy Name Society.

November, 1851 - Fr. Engelbert Stehle was assigned to St. Stephen's Church.

March 18-22, 1852 - The church was disassembled, moved to land donated by Blaise Schwietzer and Johann Gerteisen on Neeb Road, and reassembled.

July 10, 1853 - The cornerstone for the first brick church was laid. This new church is called "Maria Zum Siege", German for Our Lady of Victory. The name was changed in remembrance of where Fr. Stehle was ordained in France.

WELCOME ANDREW RECKERS. NEW SEMINARIAN INTERN

Andrew Reckers, lifelong resident of the Westside of Cincinnati, is the oldest of Bridgetown's Michael and Mary Helen Reckers' four children. Andrew was raised in a devoted Catholic family who instilled a sense of duty and reverence in their children regarding the precepts of the Holy Catholic Church from the

very beginning by regularly attending Mass and observing Holy Days of Obligation, making regular Confession, receiving the Eucharist, and fasting and supporting the Church. It was from this foundation that Andrew first heard the whispers of his calling as an alter server which grew to an undeniable presence too loud in his life to ignore.

After graduating from Elder High School in 2004, Mr. Reckers continued on to the University of Cincinnati where he entered and completed his Bachelor's degree in Biomedical Engineering in 2009. He still attended Mass with his family and continued to live at home. It was a tumultuous time for the United States economy and for Andrew personally as well. The lucrative field he was studying in a PhD program for wasn't producing as many jobs. UC's budget shrank drastically cutting funds to support graduate students thereby squelching Andrew's plans to pursue his PhD. Ultimately, after graduation, Andrew ended up helping his family undertake a bold and new endeavor of buying an embroidery franchise.

Paths are rarely straight nor do they bend and wind as one may expect and Andrew's path is no different. But even as a high school student, Andrew's path was oriented towards the search for Truth (with a big "T"). Initially he found the straightest and clearest approach to understanding God and the mystery of existence was through the rational clarity and certainty of mathematics and science.

Then, a gradual awakening towards the fullness and richness of truth revealed through the Church started stirring in Andrew about halfway through college when he found Catholic radio on the dial instead of his regular talk radio favorites that had been previously narrating his daily commute to and from UC.

Here he learned about "apologetics" and discovered that the Church has solid and well-reasoned answers to the skeptical questions posed by the secular world. It was through listening to these on-air conversations where a corner was turned. In Andrew's words,



"the big game changer for me was when I came to the realization that faith and reason were compatible with each other."

From here, Andrew's faith began to unfurl and flower with an exciting new virility allowing his once whispered callings to grow louder and louder. Andrew started attending daily Mass and making regular and frequent Confession in addition to attending church with his family. His world brightened and worldly anxieties began to fade.

What was once a whispered suggestion to an altar server became a 30-second ad spot on Sacred Heart Radio when the sing-song (perhaps slightly corny) voice of the then vocations director for the Archdiocese would call out daily, "Will youuuuuuu respond?" Finally after graduating college and seeing his family's business venture through to its end, Andrew responded to Jesus' call. And just as Peter says, "Where would I go, Lord? For you have the words of eternal life." so to then did Andrew finally say, "Yes."

With warmth, gratitude, and appreciation for his varied duties and contributions to Our Lady of Victory during his internship year as part of his priestly formation do we extend Andrew Reckers, 5th year seminarian, a gracious welcome to our community. OLV HISTORY TIMELINE

December 4, 1853 - The first Mass was held in the new church.

1854 - Fr. Nicholas Wachter was named as the first resident pastor of Maria Zum Siege. A wooden rectory was built for him, just east of the church.

March 4, 1854 - The first recorded burial was held for Jacob Hinterlang, age 1 1/2, son of Martin and Mary.

January 16, 1855 - Joseph and Magdelen Yunker were married in the first recorded marriage.

1869 - At the request of Fr. Henry Thein and the help of the parishioners, a new school was

September 25, 1870 - St. Rose of Lima Young Ladies Society was established to aid in supplying needed articles for the Masses. 1870 - St. Aloysius Young Men's Society was organized to serve the needs of the parish and the school.

built.

1871 - Land behind the church was dedicated to being a cemetery.

1875 - Fr. Florian Karge was the first pastor to be buried in the cemetery in section 2. The cross by the priest section was most likely erected around this time.

1887 - Fr. Francis Mesmer, after briefly serving our parish in 1881, returned to become our pastor. He remained until his death in 1907.

1892 - The care of the school was given over to the Sisters of St. Francis of Oldenburg of Indiana. The first principal was Sister Eleanore Waechter.

OLV HISTORY TIMELINE

1898 - A new rectory was built. 1899 - The first brick school building was built. (This school remains on our property. It is the back half of the library building.)

1900-1910 - Section 3 of the cemetery was opened.

January 28, 1905 - St. Mark Benevolent Society was organized to provide aid and relief to the sick and dying members of its society.

1907 - Fr. Joseph Sund became our pastor. He served our parish for 45 years, until his death in 1952.

1908 - 11 acres was added for cemetery and parish expansion.

March 10, 1908 - The wrecking of the 1853 church began.

April 9, 1908 - The building of the new church began.

May 3, 1908 - The cornerstone was laid.

October 23, 1908 - The ball and cross were raised on top of the steeple as the children sang "O Du Hoch Heilig Kreuze" (O You Most Holy Crosses).

January 1, 1909 - The first Masses were celebrated in the new church. Thomas Bross, son of William and Catherine, was the first to be baptized.

April 21, 1909 - Joseph Binder and Marv Ann Kayser were the first to be married in the new church.

May 2, 1909 - The new church was dedicated "Nostrae Dominae de Victoria".

1915 - Henry Reimerink sold 3 acres for \$1.00 for cemetery use.

OLV HISTORY TIMELINE

November 22, 1917 - On that Feast of St. Cecelia, the first convent was dedicated.

February 15, 1920 - A fire was discovered by Fr. Sund in the sacristy. Vestments and other valuable items were destroyed. **1920** - Parishioners donated new stations for the Stations of the Cross.

1930 - An addition was added onto the front of the school. This is the current library building.

March 22, 1959 - A ground breaking ceremony was held for the new school building.

April, **1959** - The building of the new school began. **January 18**, **1960** - A fire started in the vestments left in the sacristy after a funeral.

A NEW POSITION

We have come to the end of a beautiful celebration commemorating our parish's 175 years as a faithful Catholic community. Innovative planning and hard work by many parishioners made this celebration a historical one.

In 1842, a group that called themselves the Catholic Society of Delhi Township worked together to build our first church; and today we continue to uphold those same principles of our first parishioners. As we move ahead to further our legacy at Our Lady of Victory, it is essential that those who have experienced growth here; whether in their faith life, their education, or those have begun their own legacy here; that they continue the stewardship that has been conveyed before us.

Recently our parish has gone through a transformation, with the campus landscape changing with new projects. There are even more projects in the works as we speak.

Change is a good thing and OLV continues to do just that each day, within its faith community and especially with the education of our young students.

This past summer, our parish added a new staff position that is designed with parishioners in mind to plan for the parish: to increase involvement in all our parish wide activities and to develop new ways to continue the legacy here at Our Lady of Victory. Andy Spinney, a longtime member of the parish, as well as a 1987 graduate of OLV, says,

"I am truly blessed to have been named the new Director of Planning, Involvement and Development for Our Lady of Victory Parish. It is my commitment to continue what was started just over 175 years ago in a small log cabin just north of where we are now. But as you know, our parish cannot exist without all of us working together as one. Vince Lombardi once said; "Individual commitment to a group effort – that is what makes a team work, a company work, a society work, a civilization work". Together, we can create another 175 years of legacy at Our Lady of Victory."

Some of his focus will be to bring new opportunities to our school, developing new clubs and groups such as: a community service

group for students, clubs for Math, Science, and Art, among others. In addition, he is working to bring back the school newspaper that was written & produced by students,

He will also be working on connecting with our alumni so that we can continue to spread the legacy that they have bestowed



before us. This will include working with alumni to hold class reunions at OLV and to help them give back to their educational starting point. Andy said, "We're in the process of constructing a financial advancement program that will continue to give Our Lady of Victory students the best possible education for many years to come."

Over the years, the parishioners of OLV have developed a solid foundation for their faith. "Continuing to build on the faith formation programs that we have already in place are very important to me," said Andy. Encouraging more people to get involved is a must for our community to thrive, and a strength that we hold in our parish. We are looking to stay one step ahead so we can continue to give our students the best possible education, and help parishioners and families have a personal encounter with Christ in our faith community.

WHAT IS THE GOOD NEWS AT CHRISTMAS?

First we have to ask why did Jesus have to come to Earth? This is a common question many people ask at some time in their life. Couldn't God just forgive us and let us start again after the fall of Adam and Eve. This is a deeper question then you may think. In the beginning, Adam and Eve were made to be in communion with God. They had original innocence and original holiness. But they chose to turn from God and go against what He asked of them. This broke their communion with God but also broke their communion with each other. If you look after the fall in Genesis, they covered themselves and started using excuses for sin. There was a discord between them, they looked at each other differently. This was a break in communion with God on the vertical level, but also a break with each other on the horizontal level. They were no longer the way God intended them to be at Creation.

God wanted to remedy this and help us to get into communion with Him. God sent His Son Jesus to become man, one of us. This is called the incarnation. Jesus had to become man so that He could take on the sins of men but also be God so that he could cross the infinite divide that came between us and God. Jesus had to be God or infinite to repair communion with God on the vertical level. Jesus also had to be man so that He could take up our sins and become the sacrificial offering for all of us. This sacrifice helps to repair our communion with one another here on Earth, the horizontal level.

Advent and Christmas are right around the corner. Take some time this Advent season to really look at your faith. How are you drawing closer to Christ? Do you thank Him for His sacrifice? I invite everyone to use one of the Advent reflection booklets, available at the end of the month, to draw closer to God in the Scriptures. Take some quiet time to build up your relationship with Christ. Pray helps us to come into communion with God and will help us prepare to celebrate the incarnation this Christmas. Also, be sure to pick up the Christmas book this year, "Joy to the World", to be handed out at the Christmas Masses here at Victory. May everyone have a blessed Advent and Christmas Season! You will all be in my prayers.

October 22, 1961 - The new school was dedicated.

1962 - Fr. Wilfrid Dirr became the new pastor and remained until 1972.

1962 - A new convent was built for the Sisters of St. Francis. This building is used as the current Pastoral Center.

April 3, 1964 - After the Sorrowful Mother Novena prayers, the East Wing was blessed.

April 4, 1964 - The first Mass was celebrated in the East Wing. All Masses were moved to the East Wing.

May 3, 1964 - The 11:15 Mass was added to the schedule and takes place in the 1908 church.

1971 - A 4:30 guitar Mass was added on Saturday.

1972 - The 1908 church was evacuated and all Masses were celebrated in the East Wing.

1974 - Fr. J Paul Gruber was named our new pastor. He remained until 1982.

1976 - The gymnasium was built. It was expanded in 1986 and again in 1992.

1977 - The 1908 church was demolished.

October 28, 1979 - The cornerstone of the current church building was laid

March 23, 1980 - The first Mass was celebrated in the new church.

1986 - The Angel and Mary were added to the outside of the church building.

2006 - Fr. James Ruetter was named our pastor.

2016 - The inside of the church was renovated to include a center aisle, new tiled floor designs, a permanent baptismal area and a larger choir section.

2017 - The Mary Grotto was blessed. The Rosary Walk and the Outdoor Classroom were built.


