My brother David and his wife Karen have four children: Daniel, who died a few days after his birth, James, Samantha and Dean. Dean suffers from occasional minor seizures, but a few years ago he had a major seizure and was rushed to the hospital. He was in a coma and placed on life support. For a few days it was touch and go; would he come back to us? The family kept a constant vigil at his bedside. My youngest brother Gerard, who is usually silent, went every evening after work and spoke to Dean almost constantly.

When Dean awoke from the coma, he was anxiously waiting for Gerard's visit. When Gerard arrived, Dean said: "You promised me that you would take me on the train engine and let me drive." In fact, of all the things people said to Dean while he was in a coma, this was the one thing he clearly remembered. You see Gerard works in a train yard in Dublin Docks and promised Dean when he awoke, he would take him to the yard and let him drive one of the huge diesel engines. For Dean driving the train was a dream come true. For everyone else, Dean's return was a dream come true. Our family could not imagine life without Dean, it just wouldn't be the same. It wouldn't be life as we expected.

Albert Einstein said "If you want your children to be intelligent, read them fairy tales. If you want them to be more intelligent, read them more fairy tales." President John F. Kennedy said: "Children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see." Einstein spoke to the importance of a child's imagination as the foundation of being great and doing great things. President Kennedy spoke to the consequences of the lessons we teach our children for their own lives and for the lives of others in the world and in the future.

God sent His Son as a child. Soon we will celebrate the memory of the birth of that child, Jesus. We can't imagine a world without that child. His birth, His life, His teaching, His Death and Resurrection has made all the difference in our lives. Without this Child, life just wouldn't be the same – life just wouldn't be life. The stories about Jesus are not fairy tales, but they are stories that inspire, make a difference, change hearts, and build character. These are stories we pass onto our children, because children become the men and women, the fathers and mothers, and the leaders of the future. The stories we tell them impact their very souls and make all the difference. The most important story is the story of the Child who was born for them and who asked them to be like Him and live for others.

Using the PBIS framework, we will teach students exactly what it means to be Christ-like, to be problem-solvers, and to be responsible in each aspect of their day at school. We will go over examples and non-examples.

Honduras Mission Trip

What wonderful things can be done when many hands come together to do God's work! In late July and early August members of Our Lady of Victory joined with several other Cincinnatians and people from all over the U.S. to go on a medical mission trip to San Antonio de La Cuesta, Honduras. For nearly two weeks, this group worked with members of a group in Honduras called Asociacion Gozo y Esperanza, which means the Association for Happiness and Hope, to provide medical clinics for people in the town of San Antonio de La Cuesta and in several areas in the mountains surrounding that town.

Many thanks to the many members of Our Lady of Victory who came together one evening in July in the Convocation Center to help separate, count, organize, and package a great number of medicines, pills, and care packages which the group took with them. In the town we provided several clinic days at the town's Health Care Center. We were also able to provide 3 medical "clinic days" up in the mountains. In fact, our clinic was set up in the school building for the neighboring people in the mountains. Over the course of the mission trip, the team met with over 1200 patients; adults and children.

The team included 4 doctors, several nurses, a pharmacist, a translator, and more. Parishioners who went included Josh Kaine, who is a medical doctor, Mary Beth Rebennack, the pharmacist, and Ron Lewis, translator. I know I speak for the entire team when I say it was a privilege to serve these people and use our talents to "Go Make a Difference in the World" as in the familiar song we have sung at Mass at OLV.

The medical mission trip was sponsored by an organization called Volunteers in Medical Missions (VIMM). It was an opportunity to share our talents and share our faith. Each and every clinic was always opened with a prayer. The process of our clinic was to "sign in", have vital statistic measurements (blood pressure, etc.) taken, then consult with the doctor. Next, the people would go to the "pharmacy" area, and finally the prayer station. The patient would be asked "Oremos juntos?" (Can we pray together?) and the enthusiastic response was almost always yes. The people are very devout and the group which hosted us were incredible hosts. This trip was a blessing for those who went as much as it was for the Hondurans we assisted. I thank God for the opportunity to make this medical mission trip.

I have a friend at home who gave me a Bible when I entered the seminary. This wasn't just any Bible. It was the very beautiful Ronald Knox translation of the Bible and it was very expensive. I said to her that this was too expensive a gift and she replied: "She who helps the holy man shares in the holy man's reward." Which is a paraphrase of the word of Jesus in Matthew 10: 41-42:

Christmas Giving Tree

answer Christ's call by providing names of Delhi families in need of assistance year round in addition to the Christmas season. Twenty-one families (65 individuals) received gifts through OLV's giving tree. In 2017-2018 St. VDP received \$12,951 from parishioners through the St. VDP's collections and boxes in Church.

West-End Communities - In 2017 299 gifts were donated on behalf of OLV. The majority of the ornaments on the tree were names of children from the West-End. Hats, gloves, blankets and gifts to healthy moms and babies were also included. These children attend various centers including YMCA, Christ Child Day Care, Youthland Day Care, Little Tree House of Knowledge and York Street Kids Ministry.

Community Land Co-op - In 2017 \$640 was donated on behalf of OLV through the Christmas giving tree. The Community Land Co-op's mission is to empower families with low and medium incomes to own homes in the West End and neighboring communities. The monetary donations collected assist individuals in paying their utility bills, cover costs of minor repairs, etc.

Baby Bottle Campaign

Collected for Pregnancy Center West from both the parish, \$2,039 and the school, \$1,041, for a grand total of \$3,080.

Donations to Food Pantry

St. Vincent de Paul Society - St. VDP's mission is to Our Food Pantry continues to supply year round food assistance to those in need. At Christmas and Thanksgiving we provided food baskets to about 300 less fortunate families in our neighborhood. At Easter approximately 75 families received food baskets. In addition to food received from the Care Barrel Cupboards, the school, and the religious education children cash donations totaled over \$16,389 to the Food Pantry for the twelve months ended 6/30/18.

Special Collections

In the 2017-2018 fiscal year we had four special collections at Our Lady of Victory. They were: Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowl, Hurricane Relief, Crossroads Pro Life Walkers and Little Sisters of the Poor. The total of these collections was \$7,995.

Archdiocesan Designated Collections

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati requests all parishes to collect funds for specific designated purposes throughout the year. The appeals this past year included Religious Retirement, Catholic Relief Services, Mission Sunday, Campaign for Human Development, Respect Life, Catholic Inner-City Education Fund, the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and Central & Eastern Europe & Africa as well as other designated collections. Through your generosity, over \$9,670 was contributed for these very worthwhile purposes.
