


Lent: A Call to Discipleship Jarred Kohn

Father Reutter and I were discussing the other day, the phenomenon of people who attend the gym for a short period of time after New Year's. Many of us have good intentions of carrying out a New Year's resolution to get healthy. But after a period of days, weeks, or months many of us inevitably fall off the wagon.

I have also seen that Lent for us as Catholics can turn into a do over of our new year's resolution to get slim. We give up sweets, eating in between meals, and other food for Lent. I think giving up all these things can be a spiritually fruitful experience for some people. Lent should be a time of penance and preparation for entering into the mystery of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord. Not just an opportunity to get ready for beach season.

Some people have also suggested that I add something instead of take it away for Lent. That is add some sort of devotional practice to our lives. While I think this is a good idea, sometimes the emphasis on adding over subtracting feeds our busy

mentality. A mentality that can fail to see the benefit of giving something up to detach ourselves from possessions, food, and bad habits.



If you are like me, you might have too much stuff. Perhaps throughout Lent you might consider going through your closet each week of Lent and getting rid of a set number of clothing items. Whether it is one piece a week or ten. This may help you detach yourself from your belongings and if you donate these items to St. Vincent de Paul you would be carrying out one of the corporal works of mercy--in this Year of Mercy--to clothe the naked.

I had a friend who once had a problem with cursing and using the Lord's name in vain. One Lent he sent aside a jar and every time he used the Lord's name in vain or cursed he had to put a dollar into the jar. Let's just say the jar was pretty full by the

end of Lent. But it did help him to overcome his bad habit of cursing and he gave all his cuss money to charity.

If you find yourself ignorant of scripture especially the Gospels, perhaps you could set aside anywhere from 5-30 minutes a day to reading and meditating on the Gospels or another book of the Bible. While the first couple weeks of doing this may seem boring and tedious, if you are praying over the scriptures you will find yourself eventually brought into the mystery of salvation history and begin to reap spiritual fruit.

If you struggle with the idea of redemptive suffering (the Catholic teaching that all of our sufferings big and small can be offered up to God for the good of a person or cause.) Maybe you could find a small pebble and put in your shoe for a couple days a week. Offering

up the small annoyance and pain for someone you love--or strongly dislike--or for the pro-life cause or another worthy cause.

Penance for Lent does not have to be private either, it can be communal as well. For example, at the seminary every Lent, the cafeteria will not put out desserts. So all of us with a sweet tooth must willingly give up sweets or make frequent runs to UDF across the street from the seminary.

Perhaps your family could come up with a communal Lenten practice whether it is as simple as agreeing to set aside a specific day each week to have a family meal (and inviting the seminarian intern one week.) Or you could maybe agree to pray the rosary as a family once a week to increase your family's devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the patroness of our parish.

The above are just some practices you could consider taking on in Lent. Think and pray about what you could do this Lent to grow closer to Jesus and follow His will for your life. Do something that will actually draw you into the mystery of the Cross and Easter, not something to help give you the best beach body you have ever had. Be brave, pick up your cross and follow Christ this Lent, only by embracing our cross will we come to truly experience the great joy of Easter, The Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Virtus bulletin

As a reminder, in order to protect our children from harm, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati requires that all volunteers in all parishes who have contact with children must follow the guidelines of the national Virtus child protection program, including viewing of their monthly child protection bulletins.

Beginning in January of 2016, if you are behind **2 or more bulletins** you will receive a letter from the parish office to remind you to get caught up on your bulletins. You will have 30 days to read and complete the backlog of bulletins.

Unfortunately, if you are unable to catch up with your bulletins in this timeframe, Archdiocesan Policy requires us to inactivate your Virtus account and you will no longer be able to work with the children of our parish until you take the appropriate measures to rectify the situation.

If you are not receiving email notices from VIRTUS each month advising that new bulletins are available, please set your own reminder for the 15th day of each month to log into your Virtus account. Just go to virtusonline.org, once logged in, the screen will display your "Training" tab in the upper left hand corner. On the far right of the screen, you will see a box labeled "Training Report." Click on "Click here to see your complete report." The next screen will show you the report including all bulletins you are behind. Please clear all unread bulletins to avoid the suspension of your account.

OLV Food Pantry Shows Christ's Love

Once again the Peace and Justice Food Pantry handed out food boxes this Christmas. It was not only our own generous parishioners who stocked the pantry, but food was also donated from Matthew 25 Ministries, Children's House, Delhi Citizen's Police Associa-

tion, Girl Scouts, OLV school students, Kroger and many more.

I was humbled and privileged to be present at the undertaking. The days leading up to distribution are busy ones. Volunteers move like parts of a welloiled machine. Organized by the Peace and Justice Commission, each dedicated volunteer knows his or her role. Once a process is completed, they patiently await the next task. Our Lady of Victory parishioners sorted, packed, and stacked over 160 food boxes requested by area families in need. Some are set aside for our own parishioners experiencing tough times while many others are picked up by our neighbors who could use a little help during the holidays. The boxes were filled with Christmas dinner staples like potatoes, fruits, vegetables, stuffing and gravy, as well as a Kroger gift card for a ham or turkey. A few desserts and snacks are piled on for an exua uear. The codes are pressive, but still less than quarter of a week's worth of groceries for most of Teresa Humphrey, Tom Winkler, Karin Marlman

Food donations that do not make it into the boxes are gathered in a parish office conference room. This "shopping room" also includes donations of kitchen items, feminine products, home decor, baby items, jewelry, books and toys. Almost 120 food box recipients had the opportunity to choose a few of these donations before their boxes were carried to their cars by young men from our parish and volunteers from the Delhi Fire Department. I was fortunate to be a personal shopper, helping guests as they made their choices. I noticed the most in-demand items were diapers and wipes, feminine products, and gently used toys. Some of the







women had children with them who picked out dolls and action figures, gifts they might not have gotten otherwise. I was brought to tears as a woman I was helping saw the kids bike I donated. She was speechless when she realized she was able to give it as a gift to her granddaughter. It was not by chance that I witnessed such appreciation of an item I brought in. It hit me right then- this is how Christmas should be! Instead of worrying what I can buy my own fortunate children I should focus my family on what we can give to those who are not as fortunate. Many of us are blessed with so much. What better way to show our thanks for our many blessings than to give back to God's children in need.

In addition to the weekly Tuesday food distribution, the Food Pantry's next food box hand out will be just before Easter. Please consider this challenge: add one or a few of the Food Pantry request items (listed in the bulletin) to your weekly shopping list and drop them in the tan barrels each Sunday on your way in to church. Or take a look around your home for something nice you can do without and donate it to the Food Pantry. Gently used, like-new items will be accepted in late March for their shopping room. Either of these small sacrifices enable you to show Christ's love to our neighbors in need.


