


National Vocation Awareness Week is celebrated every year during the first full week of November. This year, we celebrate November 6-12<sup>th</sup>.

# **VHAT IS ALL SOULS DAY?**

All Souls Day is a solemn celebration in the Roman Catholic Church commemorating all those who have died and are now in Purgatory, a place of cleansing from our venial sins and from the temporal punishments of the mortal sins confessed before death.

# WHERE DID IT COME FROM?

The biblical tradition to pray for the dead goes back all the way to the Old Testament when a Jewish general, Judas Maccabeus, and his men were discovered they were secretly practicing idolatry. Judas raised money for the Temple and "prayed that the sinful deed might be fully blotted out" (2 Macc 12:42). "Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin." (2 Macc 12:46). St. Paul, in 2 Tm 1, also prayed for a friend who was deceased. This tradition can even be seen in the early church as inscriptions on Christian tombs asking for prayers for those buried within.

### WHY IS IT SPECIAL?

A simple answer is: to be reminded to pray for the dead. All Souls Day is often overshadowed by Halloween or All Saints Day, but it's a very important event, for ourselves and for those who have gone before us. burying their fallen comrades and Important for the dead because we're not just remembering them, but applying every treasury of prayers we know as Catholics, giving alms, and celebrating Mass for their release into Heaven. It is a faulty assumption to assume someone is automatically in heaven or hell. Most souls need to be purified before entering into the joy of heaven. Our prayer speeds up that purification!

> And it's important for us because praying for the dead is one of the Spiritual Works of Mercy; you can even get an indulgence (forgiveness from temporal sin) from visiting a church on this particular day. And who do you think will be lifting up prayers for you once you pass away? The souls in Heaven! We know they'll remember us, and we can trust in their petitions. Who better to pray for you than someone seated beside our Lord?

### IS THIS A ONE-TIME PRAYER?

Sometimes we assume one Mass or prayer in the first year of someone's death will get them to Heaven. We struggle to imagine how our little prayer can make a difference. But prayer is a powerful tool that can change lives, though the result may not be seen right away. When we pass on, we'll be able to see how much prayer truly effects everything. Which means we have to remember to pray regularly for those in need of our help, namely, the Souls in Purgatory. Call to schedule a Mass for your loved one at any Catholic parish or say a devotional or novena prayer for them.

Let's face it; most of us will probably need purification. How many of us feel like our lives are fully in line with God's will? Not even the saints felt that way! So let's pray for those who have gone before us and pass that tradition onto the next generation.

# HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED IN ALL SOULS DAY AT OUR LADY OF VICTORY?

Praying for those who have passed away over the previous year is a tradition here at Victory during our yearly Memorial Mass. Join us on Saturday, November 12th at the 4:30 PM Mass to pray for all those who have died over the past year.

Just like in the early Church, burying the dead takes its place on our list of priorities in order to show respect for the departed, as well as fulfilling on of the works of mercy. Our Lady of Victory Cemetery dates back to 1852, showing just how important it is in making sure our loved ones are properly taken care of, even after death. We can even trace back to some of the earliest parishioners, over one hundred and fifty years ago!

Single Graves, Lawn Crypts, and Cremated Remains are available for purchase, and while it's difficult to pre-plan for occasions such as these, there are many advantages, including selecting a family plot to be buried beside each other, taking the burden off of the family, and many more.



The parishioners from St. Stephen's knew they wanted a school when they built their first church. In 1842, twelve children attended school. For the next fifty years, the parish employed lay teachers to instruct their newly built, brick school building. In children in the Catholic faith, German, arithmetic, and reading. Until at last in 1892, Sister Eleanora Waechter and Sister Emmerenting Kaltenbach. members of the Sisters of St. Francis of Oldenburg, came to teach. Sister Eleanora was the first principal of the school. The Sisters of St. Francis served

the parish for 103 years. Over that time, 149 Sisters of St. Francis served the parish.

In 1899, the religious order lived in the 1917, the first convent was built for the Sister Rita Brink, a Sister of St. Benedict, Sisters. They moved into their new home on November 22, the feast of St. Cecelia, the patron Saint of musicians; the principal of the school at that time was Ven. Sister Cecilia Raab. This home was used for 45 years even became an editor of a until in 1962, when a second, larger

convent was built. They lived in this home until 1989. Later, two more sisters served our parish as music ministers without residing here, Sister Jerilyn "Jeri"

Fuhrman and Sister Noella Poinsetta. served as principal from 1981-2000. Besides being teachers, some sisters served as cooks and housekeepers for the convent. Some were music directors and organists. One sister magazine for students. By Kathy Lynn

During the month of November our OLV Book of Remembrance is placed in the atrium of the church. The book is inscribed with the names of all those enrolled in the OLV Memorial Association since 1983.

It begins with a Gift...

This season, we have the chance to give the Hope of Christmas to families in need. We invite you and your family to participate in the OLV Giving Tree Project. Beginning November 26th, two trees will be fully decorated in the church, with the ornaments adorning them representing individuals and families in need. Give the warmth of Christmas cheer the two weekends following (December 3rd-4th & 10th-11th) by bringing in materials to provide these families a joyous year. December 11th is the donation deadline. The OLV giving tree has been so successful in the past only due to your generosity. Take some time to read the Giving Tree agencies we support:

**St. Vincent de Paul:** SVDP's mission is "answering Christ's call" by providing names of families residing in Delhi in need of assistance for the Christmas season. In 2015, 20 families (71 individuals) received gifts from OLVs giving tree.

**Community Land Co-op**: The Community Land Co-op provides inexpensive homes to families with low and medium incomes in the West End and neighboring communities. The monetary donations collected assist individuals in paying their utility bills, cover costs of minor repairs, etc. *In 2015, \$800* was donated on behalf of OLV.

**Healthy Moms and Babes:** A nonprofit, community based organization rooted in the Catholic Social Teachings, serving at-risk, low-income women and children. The pink and blue "B"s ornaments represent this organization in which we collect baby items/clothes for infants. In 2015, 29 gifts were donated on behalf of OLV.

**West-End Communities:** The majority of the ornaments on the tree are names of children from the West-End. These children attend various centers including YMCA Christ Child Daycare, Youthland Daycare, and ParkTown. In 2015, 342 gifts were donated on behalf of OLV.

**Extras:** The giving tree also contains ornaments requesting items such as gloves, hats and blankets which are donated to various organizations in need. In addition, parishioners will drop off "extra gifts," presents used when a gift is not returned.

In 2015, we had 21 gifts not returned, but thanks to the "emergency shoppers" and the "extra gifts" we were able to fulfill all the requests.
