The public policy committee recently agreed on this agenda:

Petition Issue – Physician-Assisted Suicide (2nd week-end in February)

Education Issues:

- Addiction** – focusing on the dangers and reasons for using addictive substances and the ways parishes can support people in addiction recovery. (Fall 2019)
- Schools** – inclusion of Catholic and other private and religious schools in New York State in funding for energy efficient improvements and critical capital in order to reduce their carbon footprints (Budget season)
- Faithful Citizenship** – Encouraging Catholic participation in the political process in conjunction with the U.S. Bishops' rerelease of their Faithful Citizenship document. (Spring 2020 through Fall 2020)

Are you a refugee **who has been in this country for less than 5 years** and looking for some job skills training? Would you like some training to improve your abilities? Do you want to get an education? Do you want to make more money? Catholic Family Center may be able to help you with the Refugee Career Pathways program (RCP). This program was developed to create career options for refugees in three targeted industries; Hospitality (including Culinary), Healthcare and Advanced Manufacturing. The program also allows you to get a training certificate or college degree or even your GED. You will work with a Career Counselor who will assist you to find and register for a training program, provide you with basic employment skills training and even provide up to \$2500 in educational assistance funds.
