As we settle into the school year, I wanted to share how even, in my second year, I continue to be impressed with all who are involved at our school. Furthermore, as we approach our annual HOPE Dinner, I am touched by the efforts from parent-volunteers and HOPE Committee members who pour in countless hours, hard work and love to ensure a successful HOPE Dinner.

Through these observations I am reminded daily of what a blessing it is to all of us to be affiliated with St. John's Academy.

## **Notes for the month of October:**

**Building Project:** Things continue to progress on the school addition. The building is beginning to take shape as the block work nears completion and the steel beams, joists and pillars are set. Concrete floors have been poured for the new cafeteria, chapel and west driveway with more to be completed in the coming weeks.

We anticipate the Childcare wing to be completed in early November. SJA Childcare drop-off and pick-up will take place at the North entrance as soon as the work on the north side is completed.

Capital Campaign: The total cost of the project is estimated to be between \$5.9 and \$6.1 million. Thus far we have secured in pledges nearly 90% of the funds required to complete the addition and administration renovation. Although 10% appears to be a small amount to raise, we need to complete our goal and secure the additional \$650,000 before we can move onto Phase II which includes the renovation of the existing building.

Thank you to the over 400 families who have supported this endeavor. Your financial support is a testament to the importance of the faith-based education that takes place at the Academy.

We ask for continued support through prayers, donations and by sharing the message of the work our Lord is completing at St. John's Academy.

**School Happenings:** Teachers have set the classroom expectations and students are falling into the routine. As I shared with the staff last week in our meeting, I am really excited about how the school year has started and am anticipating great academic gains and powerful learning experiences this school year!

## North Dakota Offers new tax credits for donations to non-public schools

The 2019 North Dakota Legislature expanded tax credits for non-public schools, which means charitable gifts to Catholic schools in ND are now eligible for a ND tax credit. This is big news to those who make annual or regular contributions to their favorite Catholic School.

ND resident taxpayers (corporate or fiduciaries) are allowed a non-refundable credit equal to 50% of the amount of the contribution, but limited to 25% of the taxpayer's total income tax OR \$2,500, whichever is less. (ND Century Code 57-38-01-7). There is no carry forward of these credits when filling returns, so taxpayers will likely want to apply these credits before applying other available credits. The credits for non-public schools are divided into three different buckets, so to speak. For those who donate to various education levels of Catholic education, this new law provides for more tax credit opportunities.

Example: John and Mary figure they will owe \$1,000 income tax to North Dakota for the year 2019. With some clever planning they make 3 donations to various Catholic Schools (Elementary, High School and University). They make 3 checks out for \$500 to each school. Because of these donations, they will now ear a \$250 ND Tax Credit for each gift. They are now able to reduce their tax bill by \$750 (3 x \$250), and only have to pay the remaining \$250 in income tax.

## Endowment Contributions

Additionally, tax credits are still available for contributions to qualified ND endowment funds. Gifts of \$5,000 or more to one of the many qualified endowment or scholarship funds (school related or not) are eligible for a tax credit equal to 40% of the charitable gift. The maximum credit is for \$10,000 for an individual; \$20,000 for married individuals filing a join return; and \$10,000 for corporations and pass-through entities. Any unused portion of the credit can be carried forward for up to three taxable years, so this credit can be applied after the non-public school credits (ND Century Code 57-38-01-21).

## What's the difference between a tax deduction and a tax credit?

You might think the two are interchangeable, but they aren't. A tax deduction is something that reduces how much taxable income you claim. A tax credit is something that directly reduces how much tax you owe.



we can show responsibility. We also began building on our foundational skills in reading and math. In social studies we discussed how we can be a

Appleseed. In religion we learned about the God our Father, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We have also gotten pretty good at reciting our prayers.
