

REFLECTIONS FROM FATHER CLARK

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING AND THE SITUATION IN VENEZUELA

As we follow events in Venezuela and the President's threats to other countries, let us reflect on what Catholic Social Teaching (CST) offers for guidance to judge the morality of the situation. We are not looking at politics and whom we support on an all or nothing basis. We are looking at what the Catholic Church teaches about such situations.

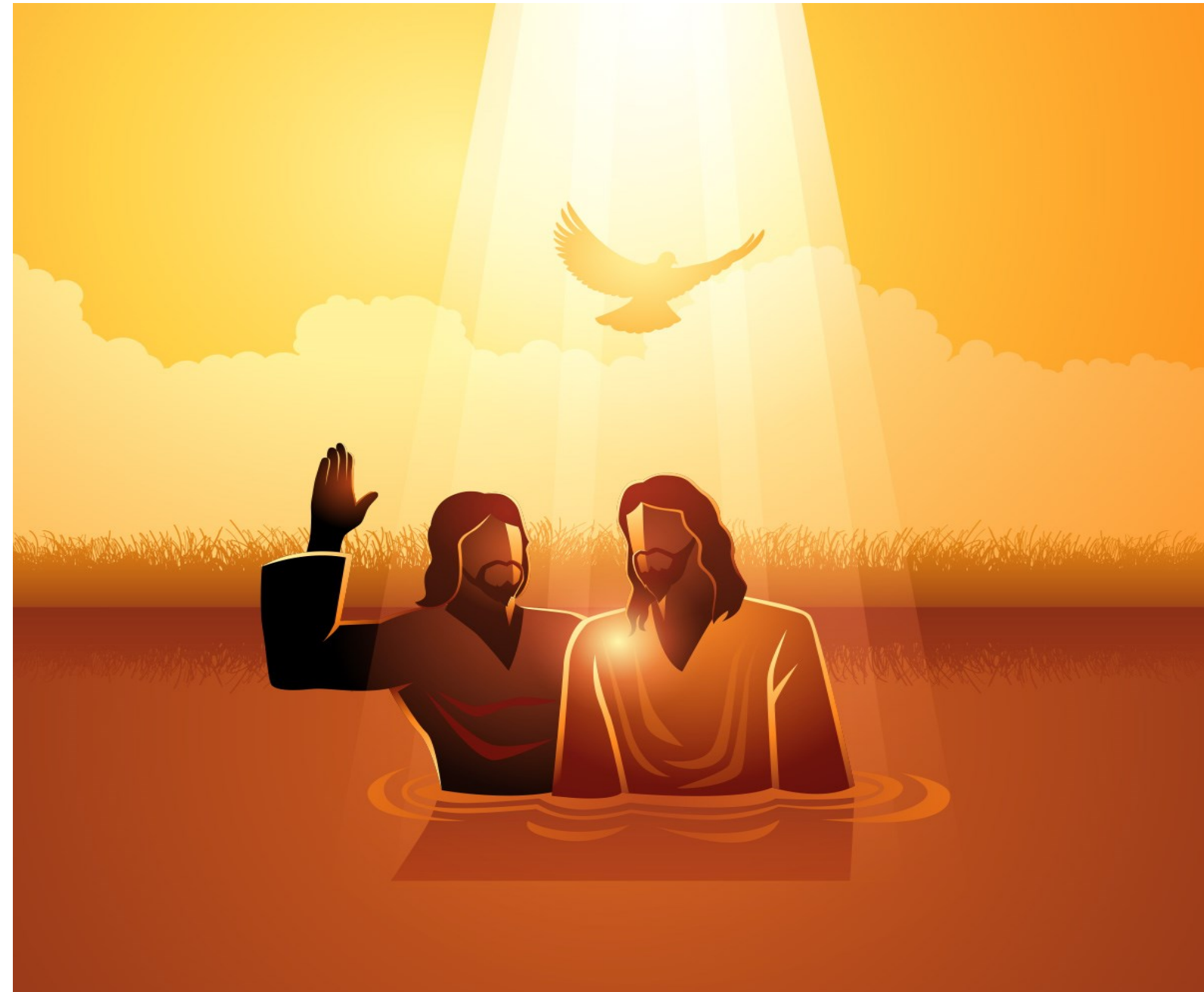
The bedrock principle of CST is the dignity of the human person. This principle governs all our actions. Governments exist to safeguard the dignity of each human person and the common good. Pope Leo in his remarks about the removal by the United States of President Maduro expressed first concern for the people of Venezuela in keeping with this fundamental principle. He said that the good of the people of that nation must be prioritized above any other situation. Granted that Maduro was a dictator and guilty of many crimes against the people and so was not safeguarding the dignity of his people, but the United States cannot replace one dictator with another under the guise that the end justifies the means. Our government is also under the obligation to protect the rights and sovereignty of the people of Venezuela and not only our own interests and agenda.

Another principle of CST is the call to family, community, and participation. We are social beings and have the right to participate in the organization of society through economics and politics, law, and policy. A corollary of this principle is that of subsidiarity, which means that decisions should be made at the most local level, as close as possible to the people affected. Therefore, the statements that the US will control Venezuela and allow local rule if it is in conformity with US policy and designs are against Catholic Social Teaching. An illustration of the demands of this principle is, as Pope Leo said, "guaranteeing the sovereignty of the country, ensuring the rule of law enshrined in its constitution, respecting human and civil rights of each and every person, and working together to build a peaceful future..."

Catholic Social Teaching enshrines a preferential option for the poor. The most vulnerable members of society must be protected and cared for. There is great poverty in Venezuela with an acute scarcity of food. Appropriating the oil resources of the country will cause the economy to crash and people to suffer more. Care for the poor must guide all policy decisions.

Finally, the principle of solidarity demands that we as Catholics cannot sit on the sidelines and continue our lives with disinterest to what is happening in Venezuela and other countries. We are all brothers and sisters in Christ, and sons and daughters of one Father in heaven. What affects one affects all. Our prayers, concerns, and action must reach out to all our brothers and sisters in need.

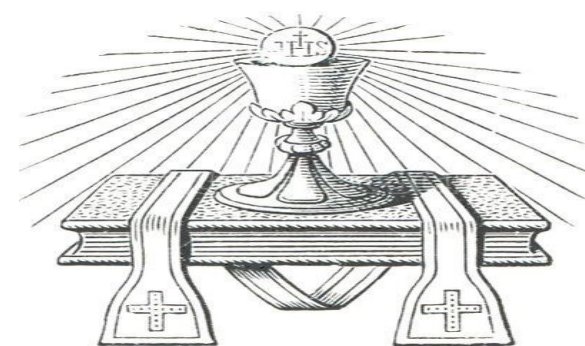

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Today we mark the conclusion of the Christmas season with the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord. In the spirit of the Epiphany, Jesus is revealed as God’s beloved Son in whom He is well pleased as he is baptized by John. On Monday, we return to Ordinary Time with its green vestments until Ash Wednesday on February 18.

In the eastern Churches, the celebration Christ’s birth is identical with the Epiphany or Theophany (revelation of God). The mysteries of Christ are celebrated together: the visit of the Magi, the Baptism, and the changing of water into wine at the marriage feast of Cana. In these three events, Jesus is revealed as the Light of the World, the Beloved Son of God, and the Bridegroom who will marry us, his people.
