THIS WEEK IN BLACK HISTORY

Lemuel Haynes



Lemuel Haynes is credited as the first credentialed Black clergyman in the United States, and is considered the first minister to lead a white congregation.

Haynes was born on July 18, 1753 in Hartford, Conn. to a Black father and white mother. Abandoned at five months of age, Haynes was raised by an indentured servant who worked in the home of a farmer in Granville, Mass. From a young age, Haynes showed proficiency in reading and religion, drafting sermons and delivering them at a local church. After gaining his freedom at 21, Haynes joined

the Minutemen Militia who fought in the Revolutionary War.

After the war, Haynes returned to Granville and built his own farm while continuing to study theology. In 1780, Haynes was licensed to preach and ministered at the Congregational Church of Granville, making him the first Black minister to lead a white congregation. In 1785, Haynes was fully ordained, becoming the nation's first Black ordained minister.

Haynes married a white school teacher, Elizabeth Babbitt, and they had at least 10 children together. Haynes drew criticism from many for his Federalist views and for speaking on the behalf of Blacks in the country by saying they deserved equal rights to whites. Before passing in 1883 at the age of 80, Haynes' final words have served as a point of inspiration for Christians over the years.

"Christ is my all. His blood is my only acceptance. My pains are great, but blessed be God, they are not eternal. I long to be in heaven," Haynes told a fellow reverend and friend.

One of the great liabilities of history is that all too many people fail to remain awake through great periods of social change. Every society has its protectors of status quo and its fraternities of the indifferent who are notorious for sleeping through revolutions. Today, our very survival depends on our ability to stay awake, to adjust to new ideas, to remain vigilant and to face the challenge of change.

Sacraments

RECONCILIATION (CONFESSION):

Saturdays 3:00 PM and by appointment.

BAPTISMS: To arrange and prepare for the celebration of Baptism, please call the Pastor to schedule an appointment. Baptisms are usually celebrated on Sunday afternoon.

FUNERAL: Please call the parish as soon as possible to make arrangements for the Mass of Christian Burial.

VISITING THE SICK: If you or a family member are sick or in the hospital, please call the parish so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may be celebrated in the parish before hospitalization. Please call also to arrange for a Eucharistic minister to bring Communion to the sick. If you would like to request prayers for someone who is sick, please call the parish so that the name may be placed in the bulletin.

MARRIAGES: Preparation must begin at least six months prior to the wedding. <u>Please</u> make arrangements with the parish before scheduling the reception.

ANNULMENTS/CONVALIDATION: Please arrange a meeting with the Pastor to begin the process of celebrating your marriage in the Church.

NEW PARISHIONERS: Catholics who would like to be registered as parishioners of Immaculate Conception and receive stewardship envelopes should call the parish secretary or fill out a form in the vestibule of the church.

RCIA: Adults who desire to explore the possibility of becoming a member of the Catholic Church should contact the RCIA (Rite for the Christian Initiation of Adults) team. Preparation usually begins in September and Baptism or Reception is celebrated at the next Easter Viail.

TUITION ASSISTANCE: Some financial aid for tuition assistance to Catholic schools is available to registered members of the parish. This is a one time grant of no more than \$1,000.00 to needy families to assist them during a time of financial crisis. Eligible families should write a letter to the Pastor who will evaluate the request with the Financial Advisory Committee.



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

MINUTES PARISH COUNCIL OF MINISTRIES January 23, 2024

Eleven members of the Parish Council of Ministries and interested parishioners attended the meeting on January 23 at 6:30 PM. After an opening prayer and a review and acceptance of the minutes of the October meeting, the council had a spiritual conversation about the care of our planet inspired by Pope Francis' encyclical, *Laudato Si*. From this conversation emerged the following reflections and recommendations. Climate change and the threats to the delicate balance of the resources of the earth are real. We are taking too much off the earth and not returning enough to keep things in balance. We have become accustomed to a certain level of convenience that includes disposable products, air and heating comfort, and the quick discarding of broken items. We need to develop an awareness of the impact that our daily actions have on the environment and make changes in our lifestyle. Even small and simple changes can be effective. Changes that we discussed are recycling, carpooling, eating less meat and more plant-based meals, using LED lights, and employing solar energy. Suggestions for implementing this on the parish level: bulletin announcement and social media post to educate and increase awareness, encourage one meatless meal a week during Lent, plant a vegetable garden, recycle items that are no longer used, provide a recycle drop off for old tech products, partner with existing programs, safe disposal of expired prescription drugs, be intentional about minimizing waste especially in food, our use of paper, and advocate for less reliance on fossil fuels.

From Pope Francis' encyclical we reflected on how social and environmental degradation is interrelated. If we become pure consumers of the earth's resources and not stewards, then most likely we will be less concerned about the needs of our brothers and sisters in Christ and be less concerned about sharing and serving, Our care for creation is rooted in our faith that creation is a gift of God entrusted to us to be cared for and valued. Our good stewardship is reflected in our care for all God's children by sharing the good of this earth.

ADULT CONFIRMATION ON PENTECOST SUNDAY




