William Boyd Allison Davis



William Boyd Allison Davis, widely as Allison Davis, was a pioneering educator and anthropologist who made history by becoming the first African-American to hold a faculty position at a major white university. The Washington, D.C. native was born October 14, 1902.

Davis attended Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., one of the three "Little Ivies" – a trio of small private liberal arts colleges in the Northeast. Davis then earned a master's in Anthropology some reports also add he earned a master's in Comparative Literature as well] from Harvard University and then a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

In 1942, Davis joined the faculty of the University of Chicago where he spent the bulk of his career. He was among the first scholars and researchers to challenge the cultural bias of standardized tests in school. Along with a number of notable colleagues, Davis introduced a study of the biased tests tailored towards the middle class and formulated his own intelligence test.

In 1967, Davis became the first educator elected into the American Academy of the Arts and Sciences. After he retired in 1978, he began writing his last work, "Leadership, Love & Aggression," an examination of Frederick Douglass, W.E.B. Du Bois, Richard Wright, and Martin Luther King Jr., released in 1983.

Dr. Davis passed in November 1983 at 81 years of age.

Sacraments

RECONCILIATION (CONFESSION):

Saturdays 3:00 PM and by appointment.

BAPTISMS: To arrange and prepare for the celebration of Baptism, please call the Pastor to schedule an appointment. Baptisms are usually celebrated on Sunday afternoon.

FUNERAL: Please call the parish as soon as possible to make arrangements for the Mass of Christian Burial.

VISITING THE SICK: If you or a family member are sick or in the hospital, please call the parish so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may be celebrated in the parish before hospitalization. Please call also to arrange for a Eucharistic minister to bring Communion to the sick. If you would like to request prayers for someone who is sick, please call the parish so that the name may be placed in the bulletin.

MARRIAGES: Preparation must begin at least six months prior to the wedding. <u>Please</u> make arrangements with the parish before scheduling the reception.

ANNULMENTS/CONVALIDATION: Please arrange a meeting with the Pastor to begin the process of celebrating your marriage in the Church. NEW PARISHIONERS: Catholics who would like to be registered as parishioners of Immaculate Conception and receive stewardship envelopes should call the parish secretary or fill out a form in the vestibule of the church.

RCIA: Adults who desire to explore the possibility of becoming a member of the Catholic Church should contact the RCIA (Rite for the Christian Initiation of Adults) team. Preparation usually begins in September and Baptism or Reception is celebrated at the next Easter Viail.

TUITION ASSISTANCE: Some financial aid for tuition assistance to Catholic schools is available to registered members of the parish. This is a one time grant of no more than \$1,000.00 to needy families to assist them during a time of financial crisis. Eligible families should write a letter to the Pastor who will evaluate the request with the Financial Advisory Committee.

Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

The overall and easily seen thrust of the parable is that Christ will return at an unknown hour and that His people must be ready. Being ready means preparing for whatever contingency arises in our lives and keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus at all times while we eagerly await His coming. As seen in the fact that all the virgins were sleeping when the call came indicates that it doesn't matter what we are doing when Christ returns. We may be working, eating, sleeping, or pursuing leisure activities. Whatever it is, we must be doing it in such a way that we don't have to "make things right" (get more oil) when He comes. This would apply to either the coming of Christ for His Church or for the Tribulation saints as they await His second coming. Take the time now to fill your lamp with oil and take extra along. Keep waiting and watching with joy and anticipation.

THANKSGIVING DAY MASS



DECEMBER 24: CHRISTMAS EVE VIGIL MASS: 4:00 PM




