THE PRINCIPLES OF CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING: Second of Seven: The Common Good

The second foundation to Catholic social thinking is *the common good*. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, following Saint John XXIII and Vatican II, defines the common good as: "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily." The common good applies to each human community, but it is most applicable to the political community where the state is "to defend and promote the common good of civil society, its citizens, and intermediate bodies."

The Catechism notes three essential elements of the common good: respect for the individual, the social well-being and development of the group, and peace resulting from the stability of a just society. Rooted in Greek and Roman philosophy, the common good entails the goal of political life, the good of the city (pólis), and the task entrusted to civic leaders.

Regarding the first essential of *individual respect*, the *Catechism* notes that all "public authorities are bound to respect the fundamental and inalienable rights of the human person." Authority must insist that majorities respect individual rights.

The second element—the *group's social well-being and development*—maintains that authority functions properly when it arbitrates between particular interests. Think, for example, of balancing interests in coronavirus time between public health and economic wellbeing. Proper functioning must ensure that each person can access "what is needed to lead a truly human life: food, clothing, health, work, education and culture, suitable information, the right to establish a family, and so on."

The Church emphasizes "intermediate" bodies or organizations in ideal societies. First is the family—key to nurturing its members with love, educating and protecting them. But a healthy society includes an array of organizations to promote diversity and richness: educational, sporting, cultural, arts, religious, political, and civic.

The third element of *peace* and *stability* requires authority to ensure by morally acceptable means the *security* of society and its members. Without peace—think contemporary Syria—the well-being of individuals and society itself are seriously jeopardized.

Everyone is responsible for the common good as an embodiment of charity and justice. Pope Benedict wrote, "The more we strive to secure a common good corresponding to the real needs of our neighbors, the more effectively we love them. Every Christian is called to practice this charity, in a manner corresponding to his vocation and according to the degree of influence he wields in the *pólis*." For Benedict, this is the "institutional path" of love—addressing juridical, civil, political, and cultural institutions.

According to the *Catechism*, the state shares responsibility for the common good because "the common good is the reason that the political authority exists." The state must ensure the coherency, unity, and organization of society "in order that the common good may be attained with the contribution of every citizen."

Common good responsibility extends beyond "my country." It includes a universal common good resulting from increasing human interdependence amid globalization. According to Pope Benedict, achieving it must assume "the dimensions of the whole human family, that is to say, the community of peoples and nations, in such a way as to shape the *earthly city* in unity and peace, rendering it to some degree an anticipation and a prefiguration of the undivided *city of God*."


