

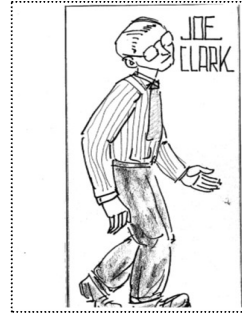

School's Out



Allan Rohan Crite was a notable artist who sought to depict Black people as ordinary American citizens instead of sharecroppers or entertainers. Crite was born in 1910 in Plainfield, N.J. and raised in Boston's South End. He developed an interest in art early on by way of his mother, and his father, a doctor and engineer, was also a great influence. Crite was accepted to Yale University but opted instead to attend the School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts University.

After leaving school in 1936, Crite became one of a handful of African-American artists employed by the Federal Arts Project under the New Deal. In 1940, he began a 30-year career as an engineering draftsman but continued to work on his art in the meantime. Crite focused on pieces that showed Black people of all ages in various settings. In an interview, Crite stated that he wanted to show the "real Negro" and not the "Jazz Negro" or "Harlem Negro," which he felt were images promoted solely by white people. Along with an honorary doctorate from Suffolk University and was bestowed with the Harvard University Anniversary Medal.

Crite's works hang in such major American art galleries as the Smithsonian, the Museum of Fine Arts, Grossman Library, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Boston Athenaeum, to which he left a substantial collection upon his death in gratitude for his long tenure there as a visiting artist and which now holds the largest public collection of his paintings and watercolors.

Allan Rohan Crite passed in 2007 at the age of 97.

Sacraments

RECONCILIATION (CONFESSION):

Saturdays 3:00 PM and by appointment.

BAPTISMS: To arrange and prepare for the celebration of Baptism, please call the Pastor to schedule an appointment. Baptisms are usually celebrated on Sunday afternoon.

FUNERAL: Please call the parish as soon as possible to make arrangements for the Mass of Christian Burial.

VISITING THE SICK: If you or a family member are sick or in the hospital, please call the parish so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may be celebrated in the parish before hospitalization. Please call also to arrange for a Eucharistic minister to bring Communion to the sick. If you would like to request prayers for someone who is sick, please call **the** parish so that the name may be placed in the bulletin.

MARRIAGES: Preparation must begin at least six months prior to the wedding. **Please** make arrangements with the parish before scheduling the reception.

ANNULMENTS/CONVALIDATION: Please arrange a meeting with the Pastor to begin the process of celebrating your marriage in the Church.

NEW PARISHIONERS: Catholics who would like to be registered as parishioners of Immaculate Conception and receive stewardship envelopes should call the parish secretary or fill out a form in the vestibule of the church.

RCIA: Adults who desire to explore the possibility of becoming a member of the Catholic Church should contact the RCIA (Rite for the Christian Initiation of Adults) team. Preparation usually begins in September and Baptism or Reception is celebrated at the next Easter Vigil.

TUITION ASSISTANCE: Some financial aid for tuition assistance to Catholic schools is available to registered members of the parish. This is a one time grant of no more than \$1,000.00 to needy families to assist them during a time of financial crisis. Eligible families should write a letter to the Pastor who will evaluate the request with the


**SAINTS-FALCONS TICKETS RAFFLE

**JESUIT APOSTOLIC PREFERENCES AND THE
JESUIT PARISH SOCIAL JUSTICE SUMMIT**



This past week two of our parishioners, Donald Victorian and Sharyn Wilcox, participated in the Jesuit Parish Social Justice Summit that took place in Morristown, New Jersey. Representatives from Jesuit parishes all over the country gathered to learn more about and discuss the Universal Apostolic Preferences that the Jesuits have adopted as the guidelines for their future ministerial choices. The UAP are: (1) show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment; (2) walk with the poor and outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice; (3) journeying with youth, accompanying them in the creation of a hope-filled future; (4) caring for our common home by collaborating, with Gospel depth, for the protection and renewal of God's creation.
