# School Security & Student Safety:

The new doors and check-in system have been installed and are now in use.

### **Entry One Improvement – Entrance into the School Building to Office Window:**

The first set of doors (glass) will remain unlocked during school hours; however, as you enter the old wooden/glass doors have been replaced with more secure doors. These doors will require anyone wishing to enter to push the entry/call button and wait to be buzzed to come in. There is a camera where the secretaries will be able to see who is requesting entrance. Upon being admitted you will need to PULL (NOT TURN) the right door for entrance, and go to the Office Window for assistance.

### **Entry Two Improvement – Access to Students/Faculty/Staff**

Everyone wishing to access the students, faculty and/or staff will need to go to the Office Window, present his/her Driver's License, get your picture taken and receive an Identification sticker to be worn while in the building. The new system will do a quick check on your name and provide us with any concerns. **EVERYONE**MUST PRESENT A DRIVER'S LICENSE TO BE ALLOWED ACCESS!

# Grandparents' Day

# CYC Basketball Registration

CYC Basketball registration will soon open for 4th - 8th grade teams. Signups begin October 1 and will close on October 20. Fees are \$65 per player with a \$35 non-parishioner fee for anyone not enrolled in the full time school or in PSR. Families who do not already have a uniform from last year will be sent information on how to order jerseys after registration is complete, which are not included in the registration fee. Practice begins in December, with games beginning in January.

CYC Basketball registration will soon open for 2nd - 3rd grade teams. Signups begin October 1 and will close on October 20. Fees are \$50 per player with a \$35 non-parishioner fee for anyone not enrolled in the full time school or in PSR. These grades will play as teams in the instructional leagues held at St. Theodore (boys) and St. Paul (girls). Practice begins in December, with games beginning in January. Coaches and volunteers needed for our CYC basketball program. Coaches are required to take a Coaching to Make a Positive Difference and the Protecting God's Children Course prior to the start of practices in order to be listed as a coach or assistant coach.



### THIS IS A **FAMILY EVENT** FOR ST. PATRICK SCHOOL ONLY

It is a fun, safe event where families decorate their trunks and pass out candy to all the kids.

If you plan to participate with your vehicle at the Trunk or Treat, please read the following:

- 1. **RESERVATIONS ARE REQUIRED! Limited spaces available; first reserved, first served!**! After registering, you will receive a "permit" to place on your dashboard for entrance into the lot.
- 2. Trunk or Treat will be weather permitting. If cancelled, an email will be sent.
- 3. This is a **family event**, dropping off your children is NOT an option.
- 4. **Parking lot opens at 6:30 pm** to allow time to set up your trunks. Pay close attention to the parking lot attendants. They will be directing traffic to ensure all spaces are filled. Please DO NOT skip spaces. If everyone shows up that registered, we will use ALL parking spaces plus some. We will have cars line up similar to school carpool and will park cars similar to church parking.
- 5. **Open up and decorate your trunk** or the back of your vehicle. There are some great trunk decorating ideas on the Internet. Please refrain from anything overly spooky or gory. Possibilities could include a Halloween theme, sports, comic characters, Biblical, exotic locations, a particular decade- and can be as elaborate or simple as you wish. If lights are needed, please make sure they're battery powered, as electricity will not be available on-site.
- 6. **Parking lot will close at 7:00**. At that time no one will be allowed into the parking lot to ensure the safety of everyone involved and the children will be allowed to start trick or treating.
- 7. **The parking lot will reopen at 8:30 when it is safe for cars to begin leaving.** No one will be allowed to leave early! At that time everyone must be in their cars and you will be dismissed in an orderly fashion similar to school carpool.
- 8. Approximately **250 children** are participating, so remember to bring lots of candy to pass out. Don't forget your trick or treat bags!
- 9. For **candy**, please only bring store-bought, individually-wrapped treats. Small trinkets would be acceptable in place of candy.
- 10. Everyone helping at Trunk or Treat is encouraged to wear a family-friendly costume.

- 12. **REMINDER:** Volunteers signed up at Open House Night in August. For questions, contact Home & School through FACTS (RenWeb).
- 13. **Have fun and BE SAFE!** Bring some lawn chairs to sit in and hand out candy to the kids! Compliment costumes! Meet a family! Have a great time!



The movie Unplanned made headlines earlier this year, as Abby Johnson's story shed new light on the abortion industry while focusing on hope and transformation. What's even more beautiful? We'll laugh together, we may cry together, but most importantly, we'll learn together in this session that will help reshape the way you use your voice to impact the world around you.

### About the Speaker

**Brandy Meeks** - After graduating from Missouri Western State University in 2007 with a degree in psychology and a minor in communications, Brandy has led and served non-profits who believe in the dignity of ALL human life by working with foster families through mentoring programs, assisting the elderly with end of life issues and Medicare enrollment programs, helping low-income families find healthcare options, and connecting women experiencing unexpected pregnancies with their local pregnancy centers. Brandy has 12 years of non-profit leadership experience, including serving as the Executive Director of St. Joseph Pregnancy Resource Center in Northwest Missouri and the Director of Marketing and Research Application at Vitae Foundation, where she led efforts with over 400 pregnancy centers on their marketing campaigns.

In 2017, she began serving on the leadership team for Pro-Women's Healthcare Centers, a consortium whose mission is to "partner with women to provide comprehensive, convenient, compassionate, high-quality medical services and access to social services that empower them to care for their health." In 2018, Brandy joined And Then There Were None as the Vice President of Operations. She feels so incredibly blessed to have the opportunity to extend love and compassion to abortion industry workers, helping them find hope and healing in a new job that they can be proud of.

Brandy represented ATTWN at the 2019 General Assembly in Medellín, Colombia, while working with the Organization of American States, a regional agency of the United Nations. She organizes and moderates the monthly public webcast, The Walls are Still Talking, with former abortion clinic workers as guests and speaks regularly at the annual Pro-Life Women's Conference about compassionate and consistent digital messaging strategies.

While all of this professional work has been an amazing journey, her favorite accomplishment is being a wife and mother. She is married to a great guy who loves this work as much as she does. Together, they love laughing with their five children, talking marketing strategies, building long-lasting memories, and protecting life.

### **Emotional Virtue for a Drama-Free Life**

Presented by Sarah Swafford

Men and women today are faced with a constant assault on their emotions. Whether from the media or the environment around them, relationships are especially under attack.
