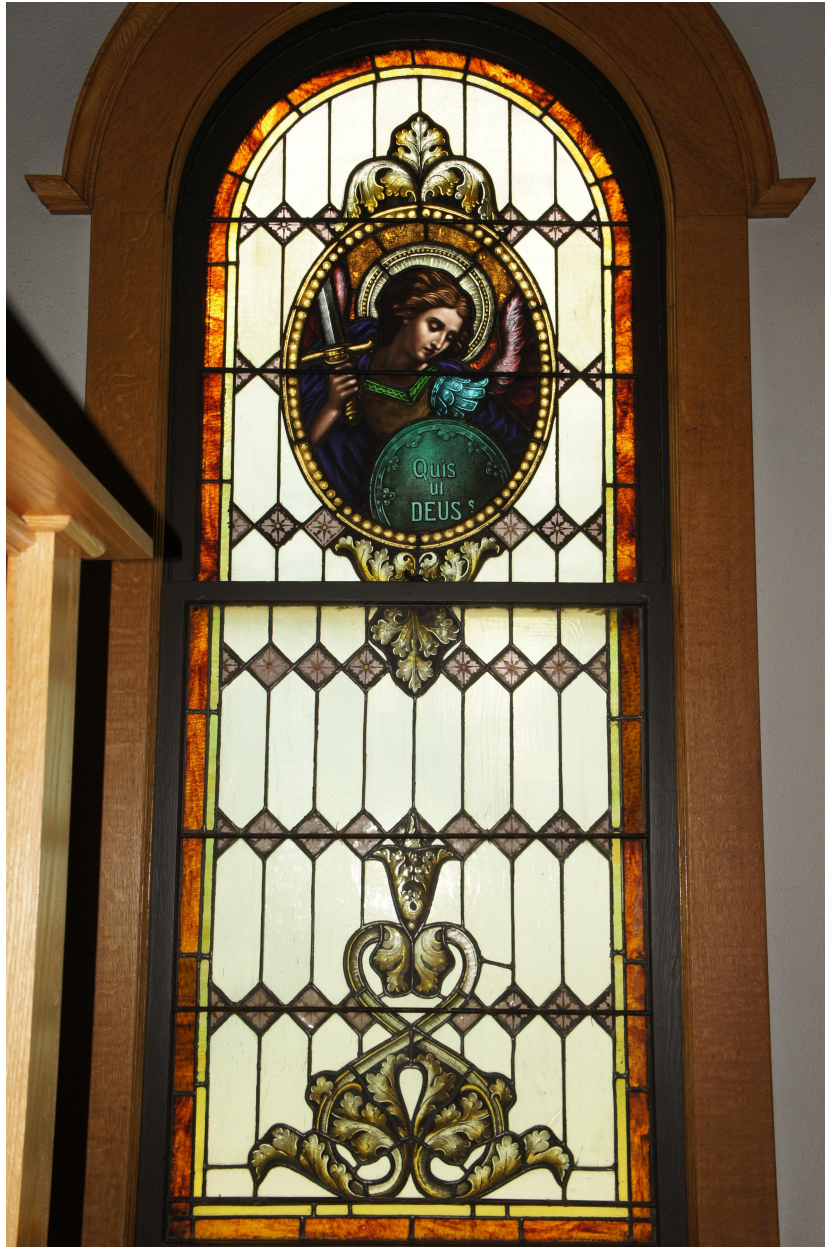


The sacristy in St. Michael's contains an additional three stained glass windows. While not as grand as the windows in the church nave, they present sacred figures in fine detail.

Starting from left to right, the first window has a medallion featuring St. Michael who holds a sword and shield. On the shield is the Latin phrase, "Quis ut Deus," (a Latin version of the meaning of the name Michael) which means "Who is like God."



The center window has a medallion with St. Joseph holding the Christ Child. He holds a staff sprouting lilies to show his chastity.





The right window has a medallion featuring Mary holding the Agnus Dei or Lamb of God. The Lamb represents Christ who was sheltered in her arms.





The sacristy also has a wheel light again repeating the symbol of the pelican feeding her young with its own blood.



The doors from the sacristies to the nave are also surmounted by fanlights.



In 1990, St. Michael's commissioned a repair of its stain glass windows through Hauser Studios of Winona, MN. At the time windows were also given protective shielding from storms and possible vandalism.
