

What they needed to do was open their hearts, their minds, and their souls to God's great Divine Mercy.

It's the same thing that we need to do in our own lives; open our hearts, our minds, and our souls to God's great Divine Mercy. The Divine Mercy of God is completely free, unearned, unmerited but is present to us in a huge overabundance if we are willing to open our hearts, our souls and our lives to God's great mercy.
