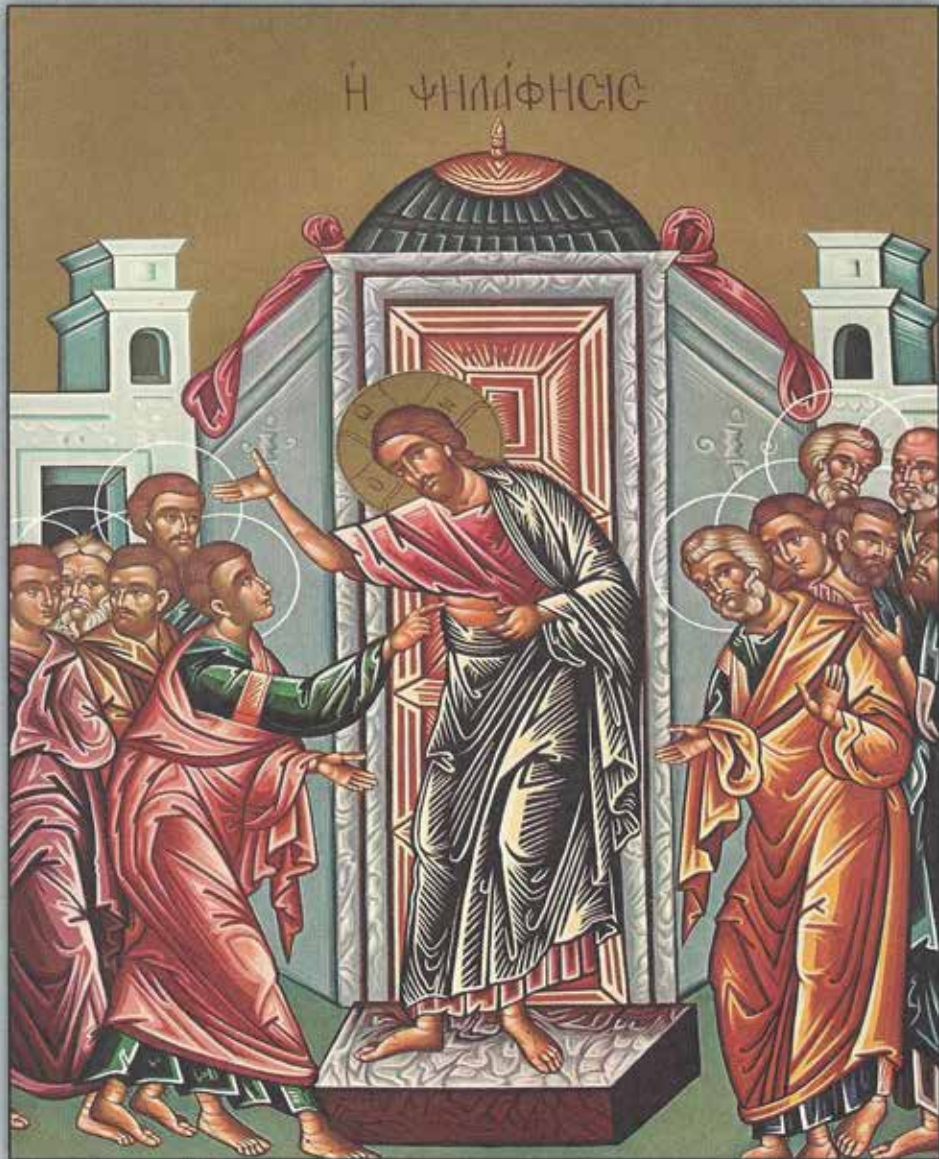

Sunday of Saint Thomas

The Sunday after Pascha is called the Sunday of Thomas. The name comes from the gospel that is read on this Sunday. The Gospel begins with Jesus appearing to His Disciples on the evening of His Resurrection.

When it was late that same day, the first day of the week. . . Jesus came and stood in the midst and said to them, "Peace be to you".

. . . And after eight days, his Disciples were again inside and Thomas with them. Jesus came, the doors being closed, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be to you!" (Jn. 20:19-27)

Thomas was not present when Jesus first showed Himself to His Disciples. When the Apostles told Thomas of the Lord's appearance, he said that he would not believe until he saw Jesus Himself. Eight days later, Jesus again appeared and called Thomas to Him and showed His hands and side that Thomas might believe.

The Church remembers this gathering of the Disciples and celebrates Thomas' confession on the eighth day after the feast of The Resurrection. Thomas' brief but pointed affirmation of belief "My Lord and my God,"

(Jn. 20:28) is the title often given to the Icon of St. Thomas. It portrays the greatest confession of anyone in the Gospels. Thomas, who has seen Christ in His earthly existence, now is transformed to see Christ through the eyes of faith.

In the Icon, Christ shows Himself to Thomas. Christ, the dominant figure at the center, initiates the activity in the Icon as He bends toward Thomas and shows him His side. Thomas is

called to see and believe. The remaining Apostles stand as witnesses to the

Risen Lord. This event takes place in the upper room where the Disciples gathered, and the closed doors witness to Christ's entering even though the doors were locked. This Icon is a witness of the Resurrection. It is a witness to us and a call to believe and profess our faith in



Christ, our Lord and our God.

Interesting Facts About the Bible

2016 Women's Day of Prayer: Women as Caregivers: Spiritual, Pastoral and Practical Matters Sunday, April 24, 2016 at St. Vladimir's Church - Scranton

Once again, the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia, in partnership with the Sisters of the Order of St. Basil the Great, the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate and the Missionary Sisters of the Mother of God will be sponsoring the 2016 Women's Day of Prayer. Developed by the members of the Philadelphia Archeparchy's Committee for the Enrichment of Women, the theme for the 2016 Women's Day reflects the Committee's Mission to offer women of all ages an occasion to grow spiritually and deepen their faith; to expand their social consciousness and their understanding of the social issues and problems facing today's women and families; and to nurture their personal development through various opportunities for enrichment.

Ms. Stefanic's discussion will focus on the importance for caregivers to be mindful of their need for self-care. Sister Joann holds a certificate in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE). Her studies for this professional designation have provided her essential skills which enable her to contribute to the biophysical, psycho-spiritual and socio-relational healing of individuals and community. She has gained much practical experience in this area through previous service as chaplain at Jeanes and Abington Hospitals.

Ms. Stefanic has cared lovingly for both her mother (during her mother's later years) and her brother who, throughout his lifetime, struggled with the effects of a chronic, disabling disease. She will offer first-person insight into the rewards and challenges she experienced during her years as caregiver for these members of her family.

Jesus the Lamb of God

In Egypt the Passover lamb was slain, in Sion the True Lamb slaughtered. My brothers, let us consider the two lambs, let us see where they bear resemblance and where they differ. Let us weigh and compare their achievements - of the lamb that was the symbol, and of the Lamb that is the Truth. Let us look upon the symbol as a shadow, let us look upon the Truth as the fulfillment. Listen to the simple symbols that concern that Passover, and to the double achievements of this our Passover. With the Passover lamb there took place for the Jewish people an exodus from Egypt, and not an entry. So with the True Lamb there took place for the Gentiles an Exodus from error, and not an entry.

With the Living Lamb there was a further Exodus, too, for the dead from Sheol, as from Egypt. For in Egypt two symbols are depicted, since it reflects both Sheol and Error. With the Passover lamb, Egypt's greed learned to give back, against its wont; With the Living Lamb, Sheol's hunger

gave back the dead, against its nature. With the True Lamb, greedy Error rejected and cast up the Gentiles who were saved; With that Passover lamb, Pharaoh returned the Jewish people whom, like Death, he had held back.

With the Living Lamb, Death has returned the just, who left their graves. With the True Lamb, Satan gave up the Gentiles whom, like Pharaoh, he had held back. In Pharaoh two types were depicted; he was a pointer to both Death and Satan. With the Passover lamb, Egypt was breached and a path stretched out before the Hebrews. With the True Lamb, Satan, having fenced off all paths left free the path that leads to Truth. The True Lamb had trodden out, with that cry which he uttered, the path from the grave for those who lie buried. Praise to the Son, the Lord of symbols who fulfilled every symbol at His Resurrection.
