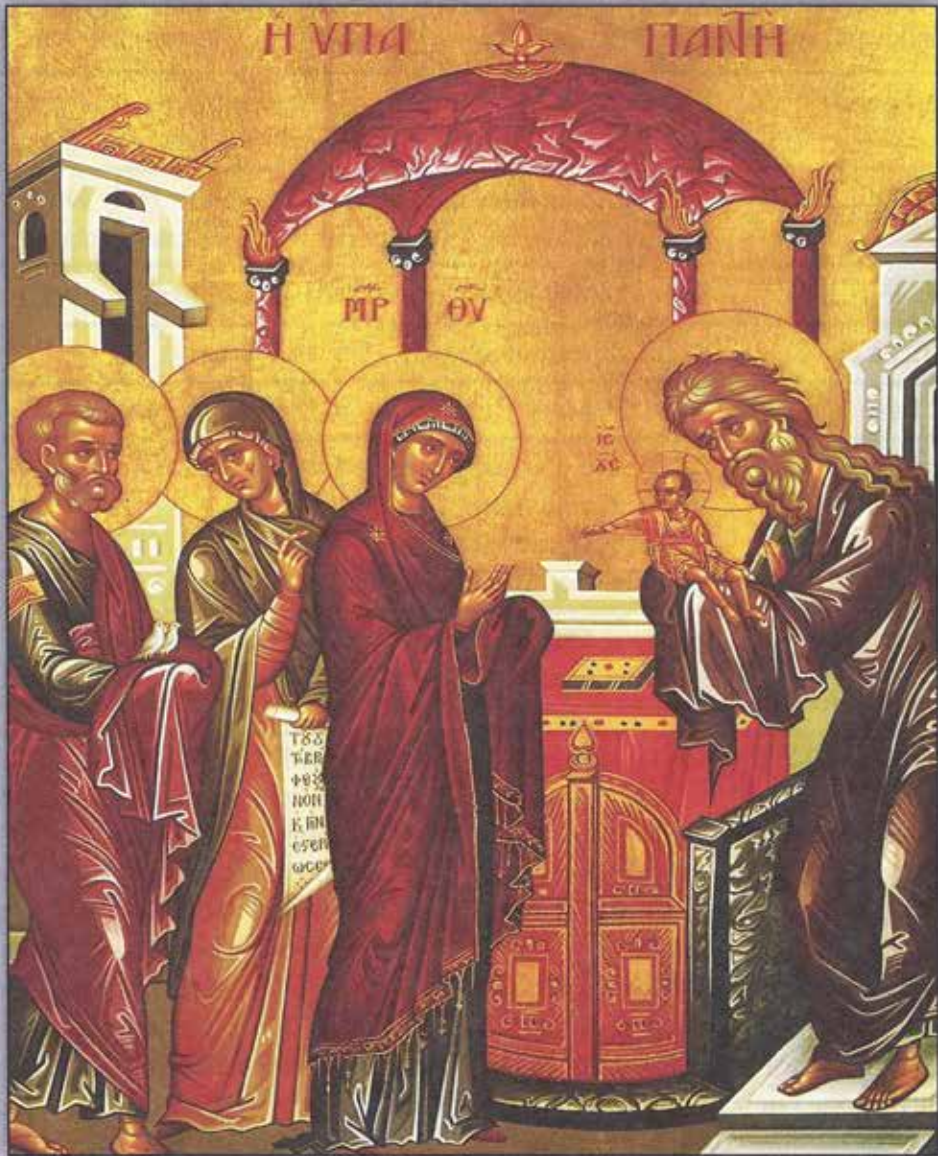

Today Is the Sunday of the Last Judgment

Today's Gospel reading is Matthew 25:31-46, the parable of the Last Judgment. It reminds us that while trusting in Christ's love and mercy, we must not forget His righteous judgment when He comes again in glory. Because He is a good and loving God who does not desire the death of a sinner, He calls us to turn from our wickedness and live (Ezek. 33:11). The time for repentance and forgiveness is now.

As Father +Alexander Schmemmann reminds us in his book GREAT LENT

(Ch. 1:4) that sin is the absence of love, it is separation and isolation. We shall be judged on whether we have loved, or not loved, our neighbor. We show Christian love when we feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, visit those who are sick or in prison. If we did such things for the least of Christ's brethren, then we also did them for Christ (Mt. 25:40).

Today is also known as the Sunday of Meat-Fare... That means that Great Lent begins next Sunday afternoon. In

this final week of preparation for the Great Lent, the traditional discipline suggests that we bid farewell to meat in our diet after today until Pascha, though eggs and dairy products are permitted every day during the coming week. This limited fasting prepares us gradually for

the more intense fasting of Great Lent. The way we decide to adapt this discipline to our own situation is a matter of individual choice. Of greater importance is the need to formulate a spiritual plan for the coming Holy Season.

Encounter of Our Lord

Tuesday of this week is the Feast of the Encounter of our Lord in the Temple (Presentation), formally called “the Purification.” The first Divine Liturgy will be celebrated on Monday Evening

at 7:00 pm; the second Divine Liturgy will be celebrated on Tuesday morning at 9:00 am. Candles will be blessed following both Divine Liturgies.

The Jesus Prayer

Early Christians came to understand that the name of Jesus had great power, and that the recitation of His name was itself a form of prayer.

Heeding St. Paul’s guidance to pray without ceasing, their ancient, short prayer became known as the Jesus Prayer: “Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.”

In the Eastern churches especially, this prayer became most popular. It is silently recited over and over throughout the waking hours, usually in rhythm with breathing. This is why it is also known as the “prayer of the heart.”

It is a prayer rich in theological and spiritual meaning.

The words form the essence of the

Christian faith in echoing Peter: “You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God.”

This prayer also emulates the words of the repentant publican who Jesus describes in Luke’s Gospel: “Have mercy on me a sinner.”

The Church sets aside the first month of the year to honor of the holy name of Jesus—and to remind us of the power of Christ’s name and to encourage us to pray in His name. Why not make a New Year’s resolution for 2016 to always have the Jesus Prayer on your lips and in your heart?

Our prayer today: *Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.*

The Presentation

So even though the arms of Simeon seemed to be presenting the Son, the words of Simeon testified that it was he who was being presented by the Son. Therefore, there can be no question for us about what happened; what was said puts an end to questioning: "Now, therefore, you dismiss your servant in peace." Whoever is dismissed in peace to go to God is presented to God as an offering. And to make it known by whom he was being presented, he said: "For my eyes have seen your compassion." Now, if goodness had not been at work in him, why would he be giving thanks? He was quite properly giving thanks because he had been found worthy to receive into his arms the one whom angels and prophets had eagerly

longed to see: For my eyes have seen your compassion

There was no possibility of our Lord becoming lost; those who had been lost were found by him! So the servant, who had been very careful not to become lost, was presented by the Son, who could not be lost. For my eyes have seen your compassion. It is clear that Simeon carried compassion in the baby he carried. He invisibly received peace from the child he visibly held in his arms. That child was glorious even when a feeble little man carried man, and the one who carried him became exalted by Him.
