

The primary purposes of the LUC are:

The current focus of the League is to combine our purposes with those of the "Vibrant Parish - a place to encounter the living Christ" program as initiated by our Patriarch, His Beatitude Sviatoslav Shevchuk, in his pastoral letter of December 2, 2011, looking towards the year 2020 and beyond, for a renewal of our church life, a transformation to a Vibrant Parish through: the Word of God, the Sacraments, Prayer, Serving One's Neighbor, Leadership, Fostering Unity and a Missionary Spirit. It is through these components of the Pastoral letter that we can come to encounter the living Christ in our parishes and in our communities. Membership in the LUC is open to all Ukrainian Catholics.

Memorial Concert

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of the establishment of the Ukrainian Insurgent Army, whose members sacrificed their lives fighting for a sovereign, independent Ukrainian state during World War II. Equally important is the 70th Anniversary of Akcja "Wisla", the forced deportation of over 150,000 Ukrainians

from their ancestral lands. These are momentous milestones in the history of Ukraine and the Ukrainian American diaspora. In this historic commemorative year, a National Committee has planned a cultural evening of solidarity and remembrance. On October 14th, 2017, at 5pm, a Memorial Concert will take place at the

Ukrainian American Cultural Center in Whippany, NJ. On October 15th, 2017, at 2pm, a Memorial Concert will take place at the Ukrainian Educational & Cultural Center in Philadelphia, PA. Among other

performances, the featured entertainers will be Taras Chubay and the Pikkdardiyska Tertsiya, all well-known artists from Lviv, Ukraine.

A Peaceful Ending of Our Lives

Surely the secret of true life is to accept each state as it comes. To die the death and to live the new life, not to cling to the past but to live with total integrity in the present. Now in all these cases out of dying there comes resurrection. Not loss but enrichment, not decay but growth. Something dies means something comes alive. May not the death that comes right at the end of our life, fit into that pattern? May not our bodily death be the final stage in our growth? The last and greatest in the long series of deaths and resurrections, that we have been experiencing ever since the day we were born. If the small deaths each lead beyond death to resurrection, may this not be true of the great death that awaits us when we finally leave this world? May this not be the greatest passover? Then we should enlarge our vision, we should look beyond our own life stories to the Christ story. We should relate the death and resurrection pattern within our own life to the death and resurrection of Jesus our Savior. Our story makes sense in the light of His story. Our small deaths and resurrections are joined across history through His definitive death and resurrection. What do we hear at Paschal midnight? "Let none fear death, for the death of the Savior has set us free. He has destroyed death by undergoing death. Christ is risen and death reigns in fear. Christ is risen and there is none dead in the tomb."

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
