

Traveling Icon of Blessed Mykola Charnetsky

The eling Icon of Blessed Myko-Charnetsky has traveled to our Parish here in Olyphant. This icon will be visiting all the Parishes of Archepaour rchy and it is our turn now. A Moleben Service in honor of the Blessed Mykola Charnetsky will be celebrated 6:30 pm on Friday, September 29th and on Fri-



day, October 6th.

Bishop and Martyr Mykola Charnetsky was born on December 14, 1884, in Ukraine. After completed his studies at the local Seminary and in Rome, he was ordained to the priesthood in 1909. He became a Spiritual Director and a Professor in the Seminary. In 1919 he entered the novitiate of the Redemptorist Fathers in Lviv, and in 1926 he was appointed apostolic visitator for Ukrainian Catholics in Volyn, Polissia, Kholm and Pidliashia. A model religious leader and missionary, he zealously worked for the union of the Holy Church. He was ordained to the episcopacy by Bishop Hryhorii Khomyshyn in Rome on February 2, 1931. He was arrested by the NKVD on April 11, 1945, and sentenced to six years of hard labor in Siberia. According to official data, he underwent 600 hours of interrogation and torture and spent time in 30 different prisons and camps. Terminally ill, in 1956 he was permitted

to return to western Ukraine, where he secretly continued to fulfill his episcopal obligations. in the midst of the cruelty and oppression which he suffered in imprisonment and exile, he was distinguished for his evangelical patience, gentleness and limitless goodness. Already during his life he was considered a holy man. As a consequence of his sufferings, he died a martyr for the faith on April 2, 1959 in Lviv.

Bishop Mykala Charnetsky was beatified by Pope St. John Paul II on June 27, 2001. The day of his commemoration in June 27.

The Holy Martyr Thecla

According to a popular second century tale, the Acts of Paul and Thecla, St. Thecla was a native of Iconium. She was so impressed by the preaching of St. Paul on virginity that she broke off her engagement to marry Thamyris to live a life of virginity. When Paul was ordered to be scourged and banished from the city for his teaching, Theela was ordered burned to death. When a storm providentially extinguished the flames, she escaped with Paul and went with him to Antioch. There she was condemned to wild beasts in the arena when she violently resisted the attempt of Syriarch Alexander to kidnap her, but again escaped when the beasts did no harm to her.

She rejoined Paul at Myra in Lycia, dressed as a boy, and was commissioned by him to preach the Gospel. She did for a time in Iconium and then became a recluse in a cave at Meriamlik near Seleucia. She lived as a hermit there for the next seventytwo years and died there (or in Rome, where she was miraculously transported when she found that Paul had died, and was later buried near his tomb). The tale had tremendous popularity in the early Church but is undoubtedly a pious fiction and was labeled apocryphal by St. Jerome. It is possible that St. Paul had a disciple named Thecla who was martyred. Some scholars are of the opinion that this is in fact the case.
