

Sunday of the Fathers of the Seventh Council

Today is a commemoration of an historical event — which, to allay all critics — is not found "in the Bible" — because it observes the fact which happened after the written part of our Tradition was closed to further addition. The living Tradition of the Church is that experienced by those people who follow the norms of Scripture and are thus sanctified by these writings, and give witness to ways of interpreting them for their lives — and a proof of the invaluable

worth of the Scripture. Such is the case of celebrating the Sunday of the Fathers of the Seventh Ecumenical Council. During the early development of the codification of the Christian Doctrine and clarification of the elements of the Truth to be found — sometimes hidden — in the Sacred scripture, there were at times people who would profess ideas which were not in conformity with what was and is written. The Fathers of the Seventh Council who battled the hereti-

cal thought are honored in the Liturgy in the Tropar while the Kondak of the feast proclaims the Truth over which they so valiantly — even physically — fought.

Ten Spiritual Reminders

- 1) Time is a special gift from God. Use your time wisely and it can bring you eternal rewards. Time wasted is gone forever.
- 2) Be sincere, be humble in all that you do for the greater glory of God, the good of the Church, the salvation of souls, for "What a person is in the eyes of God -- that he/she is, and no more."
- 3) Always do your work neatly, accurately, honestly and to the best of your ability.
- 4) Avoid the near occasions of sin, i.e., certain persons, places, or things that can easily lead you into sin. But, if a temptation suddenly comes your way, don't let it stay; get rid of it right away! Instantly, keep giving the temptation the 1-2 to punch: saying a little prayer, turning your attention elsewhere! Then, God's actual grace will come quickly to help you win-and not commit a sin!
- 5) Each day try to be kind, helpful, patient. Furthermore, never hold a grudge or seek revenge against a person, always remembering what we say

- to God the Father in the Lord's Prayer: "and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us."
- 6) In word and deed, always give good example. Personal good example is the prime requisite for being a good teacher.
- 7) "Come to me, all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will refresh you" (Mt. 11:28). Accept this perennial invitation of the Lord.
- 8) Receive the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist worthily, fervently, and frequently.
- 9) Knowledge always comes before love. The more you know about the Catholic Faith, the more you will love and appreciate it; the more you will benefit from it; the better prepared you will be to defend it and to teach it to your children/students.
- 10) "Life is God's gift to you. What you do with your life is your gift to God." Meditate well on this often quoted passage, and end up with a good resolution.

Not the Seed at Fault, but Ourselves

The parable of the sower and the seed could also be called the parable of the fate of the word of God in human hearts. It is very simple, clear and easy to understand. There is no mistaking its meaning.

There is also no mistaking Jesus' love and concern for His people. It must have been very frustrating and disappointing for Him to go from village to village and bring them grace and salvation only to find that His words were falling on deaf ears and cold hearts.

It is with this pain and concern for souls that He tells this beautiful parable. This is also why He cried out many times at the end of His parables, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear." Yet He continued on, patiently teaching, sowing the seed of truth and praying that it will take root and bring forth fruit.

When hearing this parable, do not these thoughts strike us: "How has the seed, the word of God, taken root in our souls? What is the fate of Christ's teaching in our hearts? What type of soil have we cultivated for God's word? Are our hearts cold, stony, filled with weeds and thorns?"

We cannot blame anyone but ourselves if the teachings of Jesus are not reflected in our lives. It is not the seed which is at fault, only ourselves.
