

Blessing of Fruit

Blessing is a very common practice in the Ukrainian Church. The faithful are familiar with many blessings – food, houses, various objects as crosses and medals, and even a personal blessing.

What do these blessings mean? Is the blessing of a house or car and "extra insurance policy?" Is it in fact

safer than an "unblessed" house or car? There seems to be a storng dose of superstition in all of this.

In a Christian view however, this distinction between sacred and profane falls apart. For the whole world and all that is in it has been created by God; and He says that it was all "good." To bless something in this way of think-

ing means to acknowledge that it is truly "good," from God. It means that we see this blessed object as coming from God and as a sign of His Presence among us. To bless then means to see things as they really are, as all coming from God.

On August 6th, the Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord is celebrated.

Because the feast falls during the harvest season (especially of fruit), fresh fruit is brought to the Church and blessed.

Blessings are without limits, done at

anytime and anywhere, but most properly so on this Feast, for the Feast of the Transfiguration is a celebration of God's Presence in the world and because of this, the changing of the world, its transformation, its transfiguration into God's world. The fruit is an example of the "good things" that "comes from God."

The fruit which was blessed, now is more than mere nourishment and refreshment, it is a sign of God's Presence.

VISITORS IN CHURCH

It may happen that, especially during the warm summer months, vacationers may appear in our parish. They may be from anywhere in the Archeparchy, or from across the country – even from abroad. They may even be local members of our community, wishing to simply join you in prayer – even on a long-term basis.

Whatever the circumstances, welcome them, share the unity of the Trinity with our guests! They've come to meet

Christ among us. Show Him to them – if necessary, guide them in following the pew book. Being inviting is every Christian's "job."

The impression you make on visitors will travel on with them – at home, and everywhere else they go! It may be that someone who is searching for a Church will find it by what YOU do, not what the priest says. Your welcome may be what opens the eyes, ears and heart of the searching soul to the Gospel.

After the Furniture Sale on August 3, 2019, we start pre-Rummage Sale preparation for the 9th year of our biggest fundraiser. We are all 9 years older than when we started with our 1st Sale. We all have more aches and pains, recovering from broken bones, sore shoulders, hips and legs, living with chronic illness, and more doctor appointments. Yet, many of us show up and volunteer.

First, on MONDAY, AUGUST 5TH The tables from the Parish Hall, rectory need to be moved to the gym (need men). Any remaining furniture will be moved to Father Nestor's garage. We do have dollies and carts to move items.

On AUGUST 6TH TUESDAY, we begin merchandising and pricing for the Rummage Sale. They All Ate and Were Satisfied

Our Lord in a desert place changed a few loaves into many, and at Cana turned water into wine. Thus before the time came to give men and women His own Body and Blood to feed on, He accustomed their palates to His bread and wine, giving them a taste of transitory bread and wine to teach them to delight in His Life-giving Body and Blood.

He gave them things of little value for nothing to make them understand that His supreme gift would be given yet more freely. He gave them for nothing what they could have bought from Him, what in fact they wanted to buy, to teach them that He asked them for no payment.

When it was not permitted them to give Him the price of bread and wine, which they could have done, they certainly could not pay Him for His Body and Blood.

Moreover, as well as giving freely He lovingly coaxed us, offering us these small things without charge to attract us and cause us to go and receive something greater and beyond all price. He awakened our desire by things pleasing to the palate in order to draw us to that which gives life to the soul. He gave a sweet taste to the wine he created to show how great is the treasure hidden in His Life-giving Blood.
