

# APPEAL OF THE HIERARCHY OF THE UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES REGARDING THE EVENTS OF JANUARY 6, 2021

As Christians, on the Feast of the Theophany, we continue to celebrate and welcome the Emmanuel—"God is with us," the Prince of Peace, "the Beloved Son of the Father" who calls us all to be His sisters and brothers in the Father's house. But as a nation, today, we witness an appalling assault on the central seat and process of American democracy which must stop.

Criminal trespassing, menacing break-in, and the intimidation of senators and members of Congress is unconscionable.

Any use of Jesus' name to justify this violent behavior and chaos is a travesty of the Gospel. There is nothing Christian about it.

Americans bear a great responsibility for the future of democracy in the world.

American leaders, first of all the President of the United States, must do everything in their power to reestablish peace and the rule of law.

There is much injustice in our land. There is much anger. No injustice will be remedied by violence.

We ask all of our priests, religious, and faithful to pray for the future of our country, to call for repentance, to witness to the integrity of the Gospel of our Lord, and begin the difficult work of rebuilding the unity of America.

We are called to help all people hear and believe the fundamental truth of Theophany— that each person is a "beloved son or daughter of the Father."

We have a long road ahead of us.

#### THE POWER OF PRAYER

"As rain is necessary that plants may live and be refreshed, so prayer is necessary for the nourishment of the life of the soul." -- St. John Chrysostom.

And yet, although prayer is so necessary, why do some people neglect it? A few reasons are: the weakness of human nature as a result of original sin; sloth; a personal attachment to the materialism of the world; failure

to cooperate with the actual grace of God; etc.

Each day *adore* your Creator, the one God in three Divine Persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; *thank* God for the countless graces received; *make reparation* to God for your offenses; *petition* God for benefits for yourself and for others -- living and departed.

The Divine Liturgy includes the

above four purposes, and is the greatest form of prayer that a creature can give to the Creator. Consistenly participate in this Sublime Sacrifice!

Say all the traditional prayers with fixed number of words. But also use your own words to tell God of your anxieties, problems, sufferings, intentions, etc.

Parents and children should pray together at least once a day. "A family that prays together stays together."

In the words of St. Paul: "pray without ceasing." Pray especially in time of spiritual and temporal danger. Never be a prayer-quitter; always persevere. Continue with your efforts to ward off distractions. Finally, as St. Alphonsus Liguori reminds us: "One who prays will be saved, but one who does not pray will be lost."

# John the Baptist and Forerunner

For the Church, John was a prophetic and tragic figure. He is called the 'Baptist' because he baptized those who came to him; he is called the 'Forerunner' because he went before Christ and prepared His way, making His paths straight, in accordance with the words of the prophet: "The voice of one crying in the wilderness ... make his paths straight (Mark 1:3). In the Old Testament, he is prophesied as "the voice of him that cries in the wilderness," in the passage from Isaiah quoted above. In other texts, he is referred to as 'the voice of the Word', 'the lamp of the Light', 'the friend of the Bridegroom', 'the morning star before the Sun'.

John began his work at the age of 30, in the fifteenth year of the reign of the Emperor Tiberius (27 or 29 AD). To begin, he journeyed

around the southern part of Judah, near the river Jordan, preaching and prophesying. The central theme of his preaching was repentance: he called upon men to repent and to change their ways of thinking, so that they would be ready to receive the teaching of Christ, their Savior – "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2).

At the same time, he was severe in his rebuking of evil and sin. Another element of his teaching was that of the practical form – how each of us should love our fellow brothers and sisters.

As we anticipate the coming Great Fast in a few weeks, are we prepared to repent and change our ways, and rebuke evil and sin as Saint John taught?
