# Baptism and Membership in the Church

When Jesus had accomplished everything he set out to do, and was about to return to the Father, he commissioned the Disciples, saying:

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28: 18-20).

Through baptism, we become members of the body of Christ, that is, the Church.

Through baptism, we are constituted as the people of God.

Through baptism, we participate in the priestly, prophetic, and royal function of Christ.

Through baptism, we are called to exercise the mission which God has entrusted to the Church to fulfill in the world: to tell others the Good News of the Father's love and mercy.

How seriously do we take our baptismal call?

# From Baptism to Christian Discipleship

All too often today, we go through the motions of being followers of Christ. We attend Divine Liturgy on occasion. We call upon the pastor for First Holy Communion, a wedding or a funeral. We bless pussy willows, our Easter baskets, and undertake similar activities.

Perhaps influenced by the secular world around us, we have become consumers of the services provided by the parish, adopting an attitude of "What's in it for me?" or "Go ahead, entertain me."

Rather, through baptism, our membership in Christ's Church calls for a commitment on the part of each of us to a develop a personal relationship with Jesus, to foster our prayer life, and to use our God-given gifts of time, talent and treasure in the building up of the Christian community.

In other words, the rights we inherit as members of the Church are balanced by an equal obligation in continuing the mission of Christ entrusted to our care.

Baptism means being a disciple of Christ.

And being a disciple of Christ comes with certain expectations related to my membership in a given parish.

### **Parish Membership and Expectations**

What then does it mean to be a

parishioner? What are the expectations?

As a result of my baptism, in practicing my Christian discipleship, I am expected as a registered member of my parish to:

- regularly attend and participate in the Sunday Divine Liturgy, together with my family;
- regularly participate in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church;
- develop and practice an ongoing personal/family prayer life;
- witness to the teachings of the Church by the manner of my living life;
- practice stewardship of my time, talent and treasure in service to the mission of the Church;
- acknowledge, as a registered member, that I am to be a participant in serving the mission of the parish rather than being only a spectator; and
- realize the necessary and ongoing importance of love, generosity, faith and family.

Christ comes into the world to tell us of the mercy and love of the Father. Through baptism, we say: "yes, Lord, I choose to follow you by becoming an active disciple and parishioner. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you and my neighbor. Bless me!"

### Trisagion Hymn

Trisagion Hymn means Thrice Holy. This is the angelic song in which we glorify the Holy Trinity, the cornerstone of the Christian Church: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit -- Three Persons, consubstantial and undivided.

On some holy days (Christmas, Easter, Theophany, etc.) the Trisagion Hymn is replaced with the singing of "All who were baptized in Christ have put on

Christ. Alleluia." In early Christian times, on the eve of Church holy days, baptism of catechumens (those being instructed in the teachings of the Christian Faith and preparing for baptism) was performed. Those who were to be baptized stood in the Church dressed in white garments to receive a welcome into the Church with this hymn. We remember those early days with this beloved, short hymn.

# **CHURCH ETIQUETTE**

Please be on time for services; those arriving late should not approach the Chalice for Communion.

To receive Communion, one must be a baptized/chrismated Catholic Christian who has prepared by prayer, fasting, alms giving, and regular confession.

Men, women, and children: please dress modestly for services. The general rule for men and women is to dress appropriately, modestly and respectfully, because we stand before the living God. The people of our church wear everything from casual pants to suits, long dresses to skirts, and shirts with or without ties. Men are asked not to wear head coverings (baseball caps, etc.) in the nave, the main part of the church.

Please wait for the completion of the service before leaving the Church. Spend some time in thanksgiving with God.

### 10 THINGS ABOUT GUARDIAN ANGELS

- uardian angels exist. The Gospel affirms this, the Scriptures support it by countless examples and episodes. The Catechism teaches us from an early age to feel this presence on our side and to trust in it.
- 2. Angels have always existed. Our

Guardian Angel is not created with us at the time of our birth. They have always existed, from the instant at which God created all of the angels. It was a single event, a single moment in which Divine Will generated all the angels, by the thousands. After

- this, God no longer created any other angels.
- 3. There is an angelic hierarchy and not all angels are destined to become Guardian Angels. Even the angels differ from each other in their tasks, and above all in their positions in heaven compared to God. Some angels in particular are selected to take a test and, if they pass it, they are qualified for the role of Guardian Angels. When a child is born, one of these angels is chosen to stand by his side until death and beyond.
- 4. We all have at least one. We cannot sell it, we can not share it with anyone. In this regard also, the Scriptures are full of references and quotations.
- 5. Our Angel guides us on the pathway to Heaven. Our Angel cannot oblige us to follow the path of goodness. He cannot decide for us, impose choices on us. We are and remain free. But his role is precious, important. As a silent and trustworthy advisor, our angel stays by our side, trying to advise us for the best, to suggest the right path to follow, to obtain salvation, to deserve Paradise, and above all to be good people and good Christians.
- 6. Our Angel never abandons us. In this life and in the next, we will know that we can count on them, on these invisible and special friends, who

- never leave us alone.
- 7. Our Angel is not the spirit of a dead person. Although it might be nice to think that when someone we love died, they became an Angel, and as such returned to be by our side, unfortunately, this isn't so. Our guardian angel cannot be anyone we have known in life, nor a member of our family who has died prematurely. It has always existed, it is a spiritual presence generated directly by God. This does not mean that it loves us less! We should remember that God is Love first and foremost.
- 8. Our guardian angel has no name ... or, if he has, it is not our job to establish it. In the Scriptures, the names of some angels are mentioned, such as Michael, Raphael and Gabriel. Any other name attributed to these celestial creatures is neither documented nor confirmed by the Church, and as such it is inappropriate to claim it to use for our Angels, especially by pretending we've determined it using a fanciful method like the month of our birth, etc.
- 9. Our Angel fights on our side with all his strength. We must not think of having a tender plump cherub at our side playing the harp. Our Angel is a warrior, a strong and courageous fighter, who ranks at our side in every

- battle of life and protects us when we are too fragile to do it alone.
- 10. Our guardian angel is also our personal messenger, charged with bringing our messages to God, and vice versa. It is to the angels that God addresses himself in communicating

with us. Their job is to make us understand his Word, and move us in the right direction.

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### I Will Pay You

And so our sins become greater, and not only from this but also from the benefits and honor which we enjoy from them. If you want to learn how our sins against God are like ten thousand talents, or more in fact, and even much more, I will try to show you briefly. But I fear, lest to those who are inclined to wickedness and love continually to sin, I should appear to provide them with still greater security; or that I might drive the meeker sort to despair, and that they should repeat the despairing question of the disciples: "Who then can be saved?"

... But nevertheless I will continue on in the hope that I may make those who pay attention more secure and more amenable. For those who suffer an incurable disease and feel no pain are untouched by these words and do not change from their natural wickedness and inertia. And even if in the future they derive from my words greater occasion for contempt, that should be attributed not to this kind of argument but to

their own insensibility. What I will say ought to be able to arouse them if only they attend to it and let it prick their hearts.

And so it is necessary that I speak. In speaking of our sins, I will distinguish between those we commit against God and against other persons. I will set forth not each person's own but what are common. But then I will ask individuals to add their own sins according to an examination of their conscience. I will do this, having first set forth the good deeds of God to us. What then are God's good deeds? He created us from nothing; he made the whole visible world for us, the heaven, the sea, the earth, animals, plants and seeds.... He gave us a helpmate and set us over all the brute species, and He crowned us with glory and honor.

And yet after all this, when humanity turned out ungrateful toward its benefactor, He thought us worthy of an even greater gift – forgiveness.
