LITURGICAL Q & A

QUESTION: What is the significance of receiving the blessing of a priest or a bishop? And when should you get such a blessing?

ANSWER: In Holy Scripture, we find stories of blessings given to the entire people of God by the High Priest and blessings given to individuals by Prophets and by parents. So we see that there are two types of blessings – sacramental or liturgical and personal. We must remember that the liturgical

and personal blessings are not the blessings by human beings, but are the blessings of the Lord. In our Church today we see the same sorts of blessings as can be found in Scripture. Blessings are commonly sought at the beginning of any arduous task, going to war, having surgery, after confession. In 'the old country' people frequently ask the blessing of priests or bishops or monks as they walk down the street.

More Q & A

QUESTION: Can priests give or take confessions over the phone, FaceTime, Skype or Zoom?

ANSWER: No, nor can they do so over the Internet using chat, or

other similar means. The church long ago recognized something that most of the world just recently recognized - that electronic communications are never truly private. Privacy is of key importance to the Mystery of Reconciliation. Priests are strictly admonished to keep all confessions as private as possible. They can be excommunicated if they don't.

But more importantly, it is the personal encounter that matters the most. The priest, when offering the Mystery of Reconciliation, is acting in *persona Christi* - that is, in the person of Christ. The Church believes that the personal encounter with Christ when partaking of the Holy Mysteries is vital.

Although our encounters with others on the Internet and via social

media can be considered "real" in one sense, in the Holy Mysteries we encounter Christ in a personal and ecclesial way. It is never just a private experience, but is always grounded in the life of the church and this means that it must truly be personal, including the contact between the confessor and the penitent.

While the convenience or ease of online celebrations might be appealing for many reasons, at heart, we always want to keep in the mind the fulness of the Church's tradition and meaning of the Holy Mysteries.

The Gentiles Cry Out for Jesus

To grasp the inner motive of the Canaanite woman for obtaining what came to pass, we must reflect on the impact of her words. There is a firm belief that there was and still is in Israel a community of converts who passed over from the Gentiles into the works of the law. They had left behind their previous life and were bonded by the religion of a foreign land and dominating law as though from home. The Canaanites were inhabiting the lands of present-day Judea. Whether absorbed by war or dispersed to neighboring places or brought into servitude as a vanguished people, they carried about their name but lacked a native land. Intermingled with the Jews, therefore, these people came from the Gentiles. And since a portion of those among the crowds

who believed were converts, the Canaanite woman most likely had left her territory, preferring the status of a proselyte - that is, coming out from the Gentiles to the community of a neighboring people. She was appealing on behalf of her daughter, who was a type for all the Gentile people. And since she knew the Lord from the law, she addressed him as Son of David. For in the law, the king of the eternal and heavenly kingdom is referred to as the "rod out of the stem of Jesse and the son of David." This woman, who professed Christ as both Lord and Son of David, did not need healing. Rather, she was begging for help for her daughter - that is, the Gentile people in the grips of unclean spirits.
