

IN EVERYTHING GIVE THANKS

How well do we remember the instruction our Sunday School teach-

ers gave us? After you receive Holy Communion, go back to your place. Stand, say prayers of thanks to Jesus for the great gift you have received. Times have changed and, unfortunately, so have the traditions. Now almost everyone in the church, prepared and unprepared, fasting and nonfasting, go up for communion almost every Sunday. Following the reception of the Holy Gifts many go back to their places and plop down in the pew. Those who have not received are not standing as previously in the presence of the Eucharist – they are sitting relaxed or whispering with someone near them. What is indeed sinful is conversation with someone while in line to receive Communion. If you have fallen into this habit, break it now for St. Paul warns that you will be judged for this. A reminder – it is proper – the teaching has not changed to stand with respect once the priest comes out of with the Holy Gifts and until he returns with them to the altar. Whether you commune or not, you should pray or meditate. Bring your prayer book to church, use the pew book provided. What can be said about those who leave the church immediately following the reception of the Very Body and Blood of Christ without giving a word of thanks?

JESUS IS ALL MERCY

When we take up our cross, we discover that it is freeing, that the yoke is easy and the burden light, just as Jesus promises. Isn't this what Jesus meant when, on the night of his passion, he offered his great Priestly Prayer to our heavenly Father: "....so they may share my joy completely." (John 17:13)

Pope Francis must have had this prayer in mind when he wrote his book, *The Joy of Discipleship*. Jesus is all mercy, all love, Francis writes. In his eyes, each of us is the little lost lamb, the mislaid coin, the child who

squanders an inheritance on illusions of happiness.

The Pope writes that God does not forget us, never abandons us. He is a patient father, always waiting for us. He respects our freedom, but he remains faithful forever. When we come back to him, he welcomes us like children into his house, for he never ceases to wait for us with love. And his heart rejoices over every child who trusts in his divine mercy and returns to him and asks his forgiveness.

Our prayer today: Jesus, I pray for the courage and faith to take up my cross daily and taste its freeing sweet-

ness for myself.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The churchgoer who never misses Sunday liturgy may spend as much as 78 hours per year in corporate prayer to God. Sound like a lot? An average American spends more than 2,900 hours per year in front of some kind of screen. So for every hour we spend

praying with God's people and getting to know Him better, we spend more than 37 communing with rectangles with moving pictures. It's no wonder that we know far more about politics, sports, fashion, soap operas and science fiction than we do about God.

Making Yourself Available

A man was going up to bed, when his wife told him he'd left the light on in the garden shed - she could see it from the bedroom window. But he said that he hadn't been in the shed that day. He looked, and there were men in the shed, stealing things. He rang the police, but they told him that no one was in his area, so no one was available to catch the thieves. He said OK, hung up, counted to 30 and rang the police again. "Hello. I just rang you a few seconds ago because there were people in my shed. Well, you don't have to worry about them now, I've just shot them all."

Within five minutes there were half a dozen police cars in the area, an Armed Response unit, the works.

Of course, they caught the burglars

redhanded. One of the policemen said to this man: "I thought you said you'd shot them!" He replied, "I thought you said there was no one available!"

The same thing happens frequently in our life. Someone asks us to do something and we respond, "I don't have the time." Often, what we mean by that is, "I don't regard this as important enough."

The truth is, we find (or make) the time to do whatever we regard to be important. Someone has said you can tell a person's priorities by looking at his checkbook. There is a great deal of validity to that. We are willing to spend money on the things we think are important. But perhaps a greater indicator of our priorities would be our planning books – a record of how

our time is spent. For all of us, choices must be made. We don't have time to do everything, so we must choose those things which are of greatest importance to us. Just be careful that your choices are those things which are also most important to God.

The greatest men and women in the Bible were not those with the greatest resources or talents, but they were men and women who made themselves available to be used by God whenever He called. May God never hear us say, "Sorry God, but I'm not available!" "Be very careful, then, how you live — not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is." (Ephesians 5:15-17).

Now in saying this, I am not hindering you from making such votive offerings as these. I am insisting that, along with these and before these, you give alms. He accepts the former but is much more pleased with the latter. Do not decorate this house and neglect your suffering brother. He is more truly a temple than this building.
