

THREE PARTS OF THE DIVINE LITURGY

1. THE PROSKOMEDIA. It is the first part of the Liturgy, and the faithful do not participate in this rite. It is performed by the Priest before the faithful come to Church. Its name came from the custom which prevailed among the first Christians of bringing the bread and wine for the Mystery of Holy Communion, and for that reason, the bread itself is given the Greek name of "Prosphora" which means "bringing." The PROSKOMEDIA consists of preparing the bread and wine for the

celebration of the Holy Eucharist and is done at the side Altar which is called the Table of Oblation. The PROSKO-MEDIA symbolizes the Nativity of Jesus in Bethlehem and reminds us that Jesus spent part of His life secretly, away from the busy world.

2. LITURGY OF THE CATE-CHUMENS (TEACHING). This is the part of the Liturgy we first see and hear which illustrates the public life of Jesus and is primarily instructive in its content.

In the early Church, the Catechumens were those being instructed in the teaching of the Christian Faith and preparing for Baptism and they could stay for this part of the service ONLY.

There are no Catechumens now but it serves to remind us of the honor we have to take part in the entire DI-VINE LITURGY and to unite us with Christ the Lord.

3. LITURGY OF THE FAITH- FUL. It is so called for during this part

of the Liturgy only the faithful may participate in it. In this part of the Divine Liturgy the Holy Eucharist if being fulfilled, the bloodless Sacrifice is offered and the faithful receive Holy Communion.

In this part of the service, with its rites, the Sufferings, Death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus are illustrated. THIS IS THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF THE DIVINE LITURGY.

LITURGICAL Q & A

QUESTION: Why does the priest have his back to the congregation?

ANSWER: Actually, he is facing to pray in the same direction as the worshipping faithful. The priest, according to our Ukrainian (Eastern) Catholic tradition, is the representative of the congregation. The sanctuary and tabernacle are the heavenly throne of God, so the priest faces God, the object of our prayers, and he speaks to God on our behalf. Also, by facing God, and have his back to the congregation, has a symbolic meaning that the priest leads his people towards God as a shepherd leads his flock to a safe place.

QUESTION: What is the archi-

tecture of the Eastern Catholic Church building?

ANSWER: There are three divisions to a traditional Christian church: narthex, nave, and sanctuary. The narthex is the entrance hall, where the faithful greet God. The nave is where the faithful gather to worship God. Nave comes from a Greek word, "naos", meaning "ship." It signifies the fact that salvation is a life-long process of becoming God-like. It is a journey towards God. The Sanctuary is the abode of God, the Holy of Holies. Hence, its name comes from the Latin "sanctus," meaning "holy." It is where the clergy offer the Bloodless Sacrifice, the Holy Eucharist or Holy Communion. It signifies Paradise or Heaven. It is demarcated from the nave by the iconostasis, or icon-screen, which does not separate the faithful from God, but rather, announces in holy images the presence of God. Notice that the sanctuary is higher and faces East, the direction from which the Star of Bethlehem came announcing the Advent of the Messiah and from which the Lord will appear in Glory at the Second Coming.

FIVE TIPS ON HOW TO ACT IN CHURCH

- 1. Remember Whose house you're in! You are in Heaven on earth! Here, we stand with faith, reverence and joy, just like we would and hopefully will in the eternal Heaven. Church hymns instruct us to do this also when they say: "When you stand in the temple, think that you are standing in Heaven!"
- 2. Look ahead... or above... not around! When you stand in Church, don't look to the left or right; don't look at how others are standing and praying, so that you will be blessed like the Publican and not cursed like the Pharisee who spent all his time in the Temple comparing himself to other people! You only need to watch yourself before God. Look up, at the icons! Look ahead, at the Altar, where God, who will eventually judge each of us, is present – and repeat within yourself like the publican, "God, be merciful to me a sinner!"
- 3. Focus! Focus your mind and your mouth on God. Pray along with the prayers. Sing along with the hymns. If you are tempted to talk to others, then open your prayer book and follow the prayers. If someone else talks to you, keep your answer brief and go back to your prayer book. Remind yourself that you can talk with other people get your business done, and so on after the Divine Liturgy.
- **4. Remember the dead, your own death, and the living who need prayers.** While in Church, remember the dead and think of the day when you will join them your body will go into the earth, but your soul very much alive and aware will go before God. Pray for the dead, ask God to have mercy on them, offer Divine Liturgies for their intention, and light candles for their souls. Thinking of your death will help you pray more sincerely and

to lead your life in a more Christlike way. Remember also, when you are in Church, your loved ones who are alive – your parents, children, relative, friends, the poor, and the sick; light candles for their health and salvation.

5. Don't just HEAR the Gospel... LIVE the Gospel! When hearing the Word of God being read, sung, or preached in Church, strive to fulfill

it, and always look for ways to do so in your everyday life. Otherwise, you will be condemned for knowing what to do but not doing it. "Blessed are those who hear God's word and keep it" (Lk. 11:28). Remember, God has invested His whole Life in you by dying on the Cross... and one day, He will ask you for the return on His investment.

VISITORS IN CHURCH

It may happen that, especially during the warm summer months, vacationers may appear in our parish. They may be from anywhere in the Archeparchy, or from across the country – even from abroad. They may even be local members of our community, wishing to simply join you in prayer – even on a long-term basis.

Whatever the circumstances, welcome them, share the unity of the Trinity with our guests! They've come to meet Christ among us. Show Him to

them – if necessary, guide them in following the pew book. Being inviting is every Christian's "job."

The impression you make on visitors will travel on with them – at home, and everywhere else they go! It may be that someone who is searching for a Church will find it by what YOU do, not what the priest says. Your welcome may be what opens the eyes, ears and heart of the searching soul to the Gospel.
