

BLESSING OF FRUIT NEXT WEEKEND

Blessing is a very common practice in the Ukrainian Church. The faithful are familiar with many blessings – food, houses, various objects such as crosses and medals, and even a personal blessing.

What do these blessings mean? Is the blessing of a house or car and "extra insurance policy?" Is it in fact safer than an "unblessed" house or

car? There seems to be a storng dose of superstition in all of this.

In a Christian view however, this distinction between sacred and profane falls apart. For the whole world and all that is in it has been created by God; and He says that it was all "good." To bless something in this way of thinking means to acknowledge that it is truly "good," from God. It means that we see this blessed object as coming from God and as a sign of His Presence among us. To bless then means to see things as they really are, as all coming from God.

On August 6th, the Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord is cel-

ebrated. Because the feast falls during the harvest season (especially of fruit), fresh fruit is brought to the Church and blessed.

Blessings are without limits, done at anytime and anywhere, but most properly so on this Feast, for the Feast of the Transfiguration is a celebration of God's Presence in the world and because of this, the changing of the world, its transformation, its transfiguration into God's world. The fruit is an example of the "good things" that "comes from God."

The fruit which was blessed, now is more than mere nourishment and refreshment, it is a sign of God's Presence.

WHAT TO DO WITH OLD SACRAMENTALS

When your rosary breaks or your crucifix falls apart, what do you do?

What should be done with these holy objects? Sacramentals are sacred signs and provide for us grace (spiritual help) through the intercession of the Church. They can be any number of religious items that have been blessed by a priest: a rosary, medal, scapular, crucifix, or even a candle. Catholics are instructed to dispose of old sacramentals in a way that shows due reverence. All sacramentals can be either burned

and buried or buried as they are in order to properly dispose of them. This type of disposal honors their sacred purpose and returns them to the earth in a dignified way. By treating sacramentals with respect, we recognize & honor the heavenly blessing that was placed on the object. Should you wish to dispose of pussy willows blessed on Flowery (Palm) Sunday, they should also be disposed of in the same way: you may bury them or burn them and spread the ashes outside.

Before you repeat a story, ask yourself:

Is it true? Is it harmless? Is it necessary? If it isn't, don't repeat it. People are indignant if they are denied the right of freedom of speech, but sometimes they overlook the duty to use this right responsibly. We need to be on our guard and practice restraint in our speech.

TO THE PARENTS OF OUR YOUNG CHILDREN

- Sit toward the front where it is easier for your little ones to see and hear what's going on at the altar.
 They tire of seeing the back of others' heads.
- Quietly explain the actions of the Liturgy (what the priests, deacon, are doing).
- Sing the hymns and responses. Children learn how to worship in church by copying you.
- Incidental noise and movement are not reasons to take your child out of church. If a child's crying or movements become a distraction to

- others, then it is time to leave until they are calm.
- If you have to leave the church with your child, do so but please come back. Our Lord said, "Let the children come to me and forbid them not, for such is the Kingdom of Heaven."
- Remember that the way we welcome children in church directly affects the way they respond to the Church, to God, and one another. Let them know that they are at home in our house of worship.

Trust in Prayer

A man sat in his luxurious hotel room and dialed room service. He marveled at the fact that at the other end of the telephone line was an individual waiting to respond to his every need. All he had to do was ask.

Many people believe that prayer is supposed to work the same way. For them, God is at the receiving end of their prayers and is expected to grant every prayer requested. "And why shouldn't it be?" they might ask. "Doesn't God want me to get this new job?" "Doesn't God want my marriage to work?" "Doesn't God want my surgery to be successful?" After all, don't we read in the Scriptures, "Ask and you shall receive?"

The answer is, yes – God always wants what is best for us, and every prayer is answered. But, not every prayer is answered as we expect it to be. In order to be able to accept God's answers

to our prayers, especially the unanticipated answers, we need to exercise patience, trust and openness to God's will and His wisdom.

We see Saint Peter exercise this kind of trust in God in today's Gospel lesson. While the disciples' boat was being storm-tossed on the sea, Jesus came walking on water toward them. Then, Jesus issued a most unexpected command to Peter. "Come," Jesus said and Peter actually began walking on water toward Him! It was only when Peter took his eyes away from Jesus and focused again on the perilous storm around him that he began to sink. The same is true for us. When we trust God, He will lead us to safety. When we take our eyes away from Him, we become overwhelmed by the storms of life.
