

THERE'S MORE TO ANGELS THAN MEETS THE EYE

Angels were the first of God's creation. As the Apostle Paul tells us "By Him all things created that are in heaven, and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers." (Col. 1:16)

The work of the Angels is twofold: in heaven to glorify God, and on earth to carry out God's orders concerning men. The word "angel" itself means herald or a messenger.

You might have noticed they are often referred to as the "Bodiless Powers." Even

though angels are bodiless and invisible to our physical eyes, every day during Divine Liturgy we affirm their existence. In the Creed we say, "I believe in one God... Creator of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible."

We often don't pay attention to the words of the prayers our priests recite in silence, although they are printed in our prayer books, yet during the prayer of the Anaphora, in the Liturgy of St. Basil the Great, the nine ranks of angels which were revealed to us are recalled: Angels, Archangels, Thrones, Dominions,

Principalities, Authorities, Powers, the many eyed Cherubim and Seraphim.

In the Anaphora of the Liturgy St. John Chrysostom, the priest says, "... there stand before You thousands of archangels, and tens of thousands of angels, six-winged ... and many-eyed hovering aloft on their wings."

Our Church dedicates every Monday to the holy angels. We are reminded of the holy angels with praise and prayer in other ways, too: "He makes the spirits His angels, and flaming fire His ministers." (Ps. 104:4)

Angels are active, intelligent, spiritual beings with will and knowledge. They serve God to carry out His will and glorify Him. They have no bodily needs or desires and passions, no cares about food, drink, clothes or shelter. Although God created them before mankind, they are neither aged or aging, but unchangingly youthful, beautiful and strong.

Of these nine ranks, we are most familiar with the Cherubim and the Seraphim. The Seraphim, which means "flaming," are burning with love for God and kindle others to such love. They are closest to God as the prophet Isaiah says: "And the Seraphim stood around Him, each having six wings" (Isaiah 6:2).

After the Seraphim are the manyeyed Cherubim, which means "great understanding." They are aglow with the knowledge of the mysteries of God and the depths of His Wisdom.

Through the Cherubim wisdom is sent down to others and spiritual enlightenment is given. The Cherubic Hymn is the song of the angels, sung during every Divine Liturgy of the year except those of Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday. It occurs after the Gospel reading, and before the Gifts are brought to the Holy Table.

THAT ALL MIGHT BE ONE

St. Josaphat Kuntsevych, OSBM, Archbishop of Polotsk and Martyr, was born around 1580 in Wolodymyr Ukraine. As a teenager he was interested in Church matters, often to the detriment of his business duties. After his father's death in 1604, John Kuntsevych entered the Basilian Holy Trinity monastery

in Vilna; he took the religious name of Josaphat. During the summer of 1609 Josaphat was ordained a priest. In 1617 Josaphat was nominated much against his will, Bishop of Polotsk.

On Sunday, November 12, 1623, a crowd (without the blessing of any Orthodox bishop) gathered outside

Josaphat's residence in Vitebsk, one of the towns under his ecclesiastical jurisdiction. Josaphat was in residence preparing to celebrate Matins and Divine Liturgy. He came out to meet the angry crowd. But the instigators shouted: "Kill him!" and one of them sank an ax into his head.

Some of the immediate effects of his martyrdom were: the conversion of most of his killers and the strengthening of the Church union in the country. But most significant and more important was the discharge of tension between Catholic and Orthodox, leading to cooperation between the two churches.

Twelve Years

When the woman with a hemorrhage learned that the Lord said to the leader of the synagogue, "Believe, and your daughter will live," she thought to herself that he who could bring back the soul of a little girl of twelve into her body would also be able to take away an illness of twelve years and expel it from the body. When she heard him say, "Believe firmly and your daughter will live," this woman reflected, "I can give the faith he requires as the price." The healing came forth from his mouth, and he negotiated as its price the faith expressed by the woman's mouth. He gave clear healing and demanded a clear price. The healing that came out from his lips could be heard publicly, and he required from the lips a faith openly professed. Although the woman professed before

everyone, they did not believe her, especially since her pains were hidden. When the Lord opened the eyes of the blind man, they called him a madman, and when he restored Lazarus to life, certain people, even among those who had seen for themselves, did not believe. This is why he restored the little girl of twelve years to life. He who was able to put the continued vitality of twelve years in the body back into its place was also able to arrest and banish from its place a flow of blood that continued for twelve years. He who was able to alleviate one illness was also able to banish another. He who was able to vivify all the dead members of this little girl was also able to heal the woman's womb.
