Preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation is a process of discovery that welcomes young Catholics into a deeper relationship with God and into the life and mission of the Catholic community. The purpose of our Confirmation Program is to "mentor youth toward an intimate relationship with Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, and the Catholic Church." The Confirmation preparation process is designed to fulfill this purpose by focusing on the following aspects: Mentorship, Faith Formation, Spiritual Renewal, and Discipleship.

Mentorship

Role of the Parents (*Life-Long Mentors*)

Parents are the first and primary catechist of the faith and are a vital role model for their children. Parents need to be strong leaders by learning, and being active in their own faith. We believe as Christians that "being family" means more than having dignity; it means taking responsibility and realizing the mission of the Catholic family. Children learn what they live, but first and foremost, they learn what their parents live.

Expectations for Parents:

- Make time to pray for your son/daughter each day.
- Attend and participate fully in weekly/Holy Day Masses together.
- Help their son/daughter choose a suitable sponsor (see below).
- Help their son/daughter research a Saint/choose a Confirmation name.
- Help monitor their son/daughter's progress toward completion of the Confirmation preparation commitments.
- Model Christian charity (love) and discipleship.

Role of the Sponsor (Spiritual Mentors)

Sponsors at Confirmation represent the believing Christian Community. Thus, it is required that they be a <u>practicing Catholic</u> in good standing with the Church and have themselves received the Sacraments of Initiation, which are Baptism, Holy Eucharist and Confirmation and have reached the age of 16.

In addition to the above, sponsors must also meet the following criteria:

- They participate in Sunday Mass and Holy Days of Obligation at their Catholic Church weekly.
- They are an active member in the life of their parish to the best of their abilities.
- They are faithful to the teachings of the Catholic Church.
- If they are married, they are married validly in the Catholic Church.
- If they are not married, they are not living with anyone in an intimate relationship.
- If they have children, they are educating their children in the Catholic faith.
- Sponsors will continue to serve as a Spiritual mentor to their Candidate for their lifetime (praying for their candidate regularly after Confirmation).

The Code of Canon Law 892 states... "Insofar as possible, there is to be a sponsor for the person to be confirmed; the sponsor is to take care that the confirmed person behaves as a true witness of Christ and faithfully fulfills the obligations inherent in this sacrament."

Remember that being a "Sponsor" at a Sacrament makes them a proper representative of the Catholic Church. If someone does not meet the criteria mentioned above, the role of representative would not be appropriate for them. How could someone ever represent a group in which they no longer participate? Candidates can avoid hurting the feelings of family and friends by choosing a person who can easily fulfill these basic requirements. If you do not know of someone who can fulfill this requirement, please reach out to the Faith Formation office as soon as possible.

Saints (*Unseen Mentors*)

Candidates for confirmation are asked to choose a name of a saint in which they would like to be confirmed. A saint is someone who has gone before us marked with the sign of faith. They are a disciple of Christ who has lived a life of exemplary fidelity to the Lord,



a life of heroic virtue. A patron saint provides us with a model of charity, and we are assured of their prayers for us (CCC 2156). Choose a saint that is a patron and model that you would like to look up to. Candidates should choose a patron saint's name because of the attractiveness of the Christian life that that person led. The chosen Saint's name will become the candidate's Confirmation name.

Parish Community (Full Community Mentors)

Once during Year 1, and again during Year 2– request a job shadow/interview with someone who is in a leadership or volunteer role in your parish. It may be a member of the Area Pastoral Council, Parish Administrative Council, Catholic United Financial Officer, CCW council member, Knights of Columbus member, catechist, song leader, choir member, lector, homebound communion minister, usher, greeter, sacristan, or a staff person. Please plan to spend at least one (1) hour shadowing and/or participating each person as they participate in their role. Please interview them afterward in order to process your experience. (Please choose someone who is not a personal relative of yours.)

Candidates seeking the Sacrament of Confirmation commit to completing the following Mentorship milestones:

Attend Parent/Student Formation Nights – Candidates & Parents are to attend 4 Faith Formation Speaker Nights (2 in Year One, 2 in Year Two).

Discerning a Sponsor – This worksheet gives Candidates direction on how to select a sponsor who will guide them on their faith journey. This must be turned into the Faith Formation office **BEFORE** one truly asks anyone to be their sponsor.

Asking a Sponsor – This worksheet is to be given to the Sponsor to then complete and send back to the Faith Formation office (Sponsor should mail this to the Faith Formation office.)

Faith Sharing – Candidates & Sponsors will meet 4 times throughout the preparation time to complete the Faith sharing questions together.

Select a Confirmation Name – Candidates will be given directions to research Saints and discern a Confirmation name of significance to them.

Service/Ministry Discernment— During Year 1, candidates will request a job shadow/interview in two areas with someone whom they can learn from in their volunteer role.

Faith Formation — Sacramental Preparation

Ongoing Faith Formation

As candidates prepare for Confirmation it is vitally important for them to continue to grow in knowledge and understanding of God's word as well as the traditions, teachings, and practices of the Catholic Church. Our Catholic faith is vast in scope, rooted in centuries of theology, and rich in symbol, prayer, and practice.

One could study for a lifetime and still not fully know all that can be known about the Catholic Church or its teachings and traditions. During this preparation, Year 1 candidates will be studying "YOU: Life, Love and The Theology of the Body". "YOU" helps young people discover the truth about their bodies, their sexuality, and their unique call to love. "YOU" presents young people with the extraordinary story of their creation as unique and unrepeatable individuals.

Year 2 candidates will learn about the depth and richness of the Catholic faith through the "Symbolon for Teens" curriculum from Augustine Institute. "Symbolon for Teens: The Catholic Faith Explained" is a systematic presentation of our Catholic Faith. It will lead students through the 'big picture' of the Catholic Faith using the Creed as the guide. Symbolon brings together some of the most trusted Catholic teachers in the world to guide our students in knowing and defending the faith.

Since class attendance is the main formation students receive, it is imperative that they are at all classes. If students miss a class for any reason, they will be given resources and be expected to make up the class on their own time. If students do not make up these class sessions, their Confirmation date may be delayed.



Mass: The "Source and Summit" of our Faith

For all Candidates and every Catholic, the Eucharist is an inexhaustible mystery to be loved and lived. It is a sacrament; it is a sacrifice; it is a meal; it is a liturgical celebration, a public proclamation of our faith in sign and symbol; it is the "source and summit" of our Christian experience where we are fed for the journey and it is our destination. To become the person of faith that God has called us to be, we must seek Christ in the sacraments; we must seek Christ in the Eucharist at Mass.

Because the Mass is so important, it is <u>an essential part</u> of the Confirmation preparation. Thus, we want to help our Confirmation students come to appreciate the beauty and the depth of the Heavenly liturgy of the Mass. The first step to appreciating the

beauty and the depth of the Mass is being present at Mass. For this reason we ask all

Confirmation students to come to Mass every Saturday/Sunday. The obligation to attend Sunday and Holy Day Masses is a responsibility for all Catholics. We expect all of our Candidates to understand and follow this teaching, which is based on the Third Commandment (Keep Holy the Sabbath). <u>Candidates desiring to be Confirmed are expected to attend Mass every weekend and Holy Day of Obligation</u>.

We also ask that Candidates fill out **Homily notes** during this time of preparation. These forms serve as a way for you to grow in your personal prayer and reflection of what is happening during Mass. It should also help you to enter more fully into the experience. Some have found this exercise leads into a more faith-filled journaling habit. Homily notes need to be signed by the presiding Priest or Deacon; that way they have the chance to get to know our candidates throughout the year. (If you attend Catholic Mass outside of the Holy Family Area, then we ask that you bring a church bulletin from that parish, signed by the presiding Priest/Deacon, in addition to completing the homily notes).

If you are traveling out of the area, you can easily find a Mass located close to you at www.masstimes.org

(<u>Note</u>: <u>Protestant services are not Mass.</u> If you miss Mass on Saturday/Sunday or a Holy Day of Obligation through your own fault, knowing that it was a serious sin to miss Sunday Mass, then it is a mortal sin and you need to go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation before you can receive Holy Communion again (1 Corinthians 11:29). However, even in a state of mortal sin, all are still welcomed and highly encouraged to attend Mass. In lieu of receiving Holy Communion, one can make a spiritual communion in your pew; or can walk up to receive a blessing instead, until one can get a chance to go to Reconciliation.)

Candidates seeking the Sacrament of Confirmation commit to completing the following Sacramental Preparation milestones:

Attend Mass weekly/Holy Days – All candidates preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation are expected to attend Mass every week.

Complete Homily Notes at each Mass

Commit to ongoing Faith Formation – All candidates preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation are expected to attend all classes and learn about the teachings and practices of the Faith by participating in Faith Formation classes. Any classes missed will need to be made up by visiting with the Faith Formation Coordinator.

Spiritual Renewal - Retreats

Taking Time for God – Few people take time to be still and rest in God's presence. But consider the Lord's instruction, "Be still and know that I am God." This is why the US Bishops feel that it is imperative that all candidates preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation set aside a period of time so they can build an intimate relationship with the Lord. Retreats are wonderful opportunities to step away from life's busyness and spend time reflecting more deeply on one's relationship with God. They are meant to draw youth into a closer relationship with God and into a closer relationship with others. Retreats also serve to help candidates discern their response to God's outpouring of love and how they will live the sacraments as a regular part of the faith community. One of our primary goals is to connect youth to their parish community, Holy Family Area Catholic Community, and provide retreat experiences specific to Confirmation.

Retreat Options – Candidates may choose from numerous retreat options over the next seventeen months. The Faith Formation Coordinator will give each candidate a list of possible opportunities that qualify as retreat options, along with dates and further information. If you have an idea that is not on the list, please speak with the Faith Formation Coordinator *prior* to registering/attending to be sure that the experience qualifies.

Discipleship – Volunteer Service

"Christ has no body on earth but yours, no hands but yours, no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes through which Christ's compassion for the world is to look out; yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good; and yours are the hands with which He is to bless us now." ~Saint Teresa of Avila

Service is a vital part of Christian living. To follow Christ's example, we must learn how to pour out our very lives for one another. In preparation for Confirmation, we will explore how to be Christ for others and see Christ in others. Through the sacrament of Confirmation, you will be "strengthened by the Holy Spirit to spread and defend your faith by word and action as true witnesses of Christ" (CCC 1303).

Church Volunteer Service

The service component of Confirmation preparation is asked by the Bishops in order to provide candidates with a variety of experiences and opportunities to share their gifts. Students in the Holy Family Area are asked to participate in two (2) Job Shadow Opportunities within their parish to learn about serving their parish, but also to see the beauty of serving others. **Examples are:**

- Liturgical: Helping a Sacristan, singing in the choir, ushering, altar serving, leading an altar serving class with Father, lectoring, etc.
- Organizations: Learning more/ Participating in CCW, Knights of Columbus, Moms' Group, OCIA, Parish Councils, etc.
- Helping in the FF office (mailings, bulletin boards, office work, translating documents, etc)
- Help decorate the church for the different seasons
- Help with younger students at Vacation Bible School or Totus Tuus at your parish
- Help with fundraisers for the parish, the CCW or the Knights of Columbus
- Volunteer to serve as a Catechist Assistant with a younger grade
- Volunteer for youth events and fall festivals, church dinners, hospitality events
- Babysit for families attending parent meetings, missions or retreats
- Visiting a member of the parish who is homebound
- Helping in the kitchen at a funeral luncheon

Community Volunteer Service

The aim of community service is to provide candidates with an opportunity to follow Jesus' teaching and put their faith into action in ways that help to build up families and the

greater community. This ministry emphasizes the recognition of our own unique gifts, talents, and interests as gifts for God and to use those gifts to make our world a better place. **Examples of Community Service**:

- Volunteer to babysit for someone (without being paid, of course!)
- Volunteer to help senior members of the parish or your neighbors with yard work, cleaning or snow removal
- Visit an elderly person (someone you are not related to) and play games with them
- Volunteer at the local food shelf, form a food drive, or participate in a food pack event (e.g. Feed My Starving Children event, Backpack program or similar)
- Volunteer at school (mentoring, tutoring, helping teachers in classrooms, volunteering for a sports camp)
- Cook a meal and bring it to someone in need (ill, recovering from surgery, etc)
- Volunteer at sports events as referees, coaching, or in concession stand
- Volunteer your time for other fundraisers within the community (so long as you aren't getting 'payment' in any way for this help).

About Volunteer Ministry

Young people have a tremendous capacity and energy to perform great works of charity (love). Most do this with vitality and joy. What a blessing!

Our youth <u>are not just</u> the *future of the Church*— they are a *vital* part of the Church TODAY! The Catholic Church needs the optimism, perspective, and energy of our teens in abundance. To this end, we invite all of our candidates to dig into their volunteer efforts with the same focus and enthusiasm as many of their other interests or hobbies. If not for their own sake (satisfaction of helping others, learning more about your faith/God, discovering an area of passion etc.), then for the sake of a Church and a world that desperately need their ideas, energy, and example.

Candidates seeking the Sacrament of Confirmation commit to complete the following Volunteer Service Milestones (20 hours total):

Church Volunteer Service (5 Hours, Minimum) – Each candidate commits to volunteer a minimum of 5 hours for their local parish or within their Catholic Area Community

Community Service – Each candidate commits to volunteer service that benefits the community at large.

Important Notes ...

Letter to Bishop and Pastor - Towards the end of the second year, Candidates will be asked to write a letter to the Bishop and to the pastor (Fr. John Hayes) to explain their desire to be confirmed in the Catholic Church. In this letter, you will write about your faith journey and make a statement about your beliefs. You will talk about your understanding of the Catholic Church and what gifts you bring to this Faith Community.

Confirmation Written Exam & Oral Interview - As the final step to Confirmation the Candidates will have a written exam and be interviewed. They will be asked to know the basics of the Catholic Faith. This will be done with the pastor or a Faith Formation Coordinator.

Sacrament of Reconciliation - "To receive Confirmation you must be in a state of grace. You should receive the sacrament of Reconciliation in order to be cleansed for the gift of the Holy Spirit" - CCC 1310. Monthly reception of this sacrament is best. Throughout the 2 years of Confirmation Preparation, Reconciliation



will be offered to students during Advent, Lent, and during the Confirmation Retreats, as well as at the Confirmation practice. Students preparing for Confirmation should attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation willingly whenever it is available.

Dress Code for the Confirmation Mass - All candidates and sponsors are expected to dress appropriately. For young men: a pair of dress pants (no jeans), dress shoes, dress shirt, and a tie. Suit coats or sports coats would be ideal, but optional. For young ladies: a nice dress or dress pants/dress top. Dresses should be at least knee-length or longer, and not low-cut, must have sleeves or sweater.

Remember: This is a very special, holy, and sacred time, so please dress accordingly.

Confirmation - Holy Family Area Catholic Confirmation will be in the spring of Year 2, date to be announced. Professional group and individual photos will be available for purchase.

Sponsors for Confirmation stem from an ancient tradition when baptisms were done as adults. The idea was that a member of the community could vouch for the candidate's Christian attitude and desire for the Sacrament in front of the entire community. Today, sponsors are just as important. They continue to be guides on the journey towards the Sacrament, and they are models for candidates. The sponsor-candidate relationship is unique because it allows for comfortable talks about religion and faith in a society where such discussions are rare.

The purpose of this exercise is to guide that relationship and build that trust. Please use the following meeting guides for each of your meetings. They are not the end-all of conversations, and in fact should only get the ball rolling. Do not be surprised or hesitant if the conversation shifts away from the original topic. The idea is to build relationship, not stifle conversation.

Each discussion should take roughly 45 minutes to an hour. Some conversations may take more than an hour, others may feel drawn out at 45 minutes. As a candidate for the Sacrament, take a little time after the conversation to reflect on the discussion and then fill in the journal questions. More than anything else, enjoy these conversations. Enjoy the discussions with one another. The sponsor-candidate relationship is unique and has the potential to be wonderful. But, like all relationships, it needs time and energy devoted to helping it grow.

AFTER we have received your Sponsor's form,, you may start scheduling/meeting with them to complete these meetings. Your sponsor will have also received copies of these in the mail or via email.

Sponsor Meeting #1: Interviewing Your Sponsor

Now that you have chosen your sponsor, it is time to spend a little more time with him/her to really get to know more about his/her faith journey. After all, the life-long role of your sponsor is to walk with you and support you on your own faith journey! You may find that you already know a lot or that there is a lot that you can learn!

Although you will be asking your sponsor questions in the format of an interview, your meeting should really be a discussion, with you adding your own insights and thoughts to the conversation. AND YOU NEED TO INVITE YOUR SPONSOR TO ASK YOU SOME QUESTIONS TOO! (Your sponsor can ask you questions from the list on the next page or he/she can ask some of his/her own.) You are also welcome to ask your sponsor a question that is not included in the list! The questions are there to guide your discussion. You do not need to get through all of the questions, but feel free to do so!

- Start your meeting by praying together!
- At the end of your meeting, write your name and the date at the last page of this packet. Write your sponsor's name and then have your sponsor sign it.
- You will need to write short answers to the reflection questions on page 3 sometime after meeting with your sponsor (NOT while you are meeting with your sponsor).

Saint Name (Unseen Mentor) HOW TO GO ABOUT CHOOSING YOUR CONFIRMATION SAINT NAME

Candidates for confirmation are asked to choose a name in which they would like to be confirmed. A saint is someone who has gone before us marked with the sign of faith. They are a disciple of Christ who has lived a life of exemplary fidelity to the Lord, a life of heroic virtue. A patron saint provides us with a model of charity and we are assured of their prayers for us. (CCC 2156)

Choosing a Confirmation Name is more than just choosing a name; you are choosing a Saint to be a part of your Confirmation experience, to be your role model in faith from the great cloud of witnesses that surround us!

The point is not to randomly choose a saint just for the sake of having one, but to seek out the person whose life and experiences really speak to you. Give yourself the opportunity to listen in your search and pray that God will guide you to your Saint. One important note: the Saint that you choose must be an officially recognized Saint of the Church.

For either of these sites, check on the "Saints" connection to get more information.

The object is to find a Saint that you want to walk with you on your spiritual journey, and then to get to know that Saint, as you would want to get to know any important friend in your life. Once it is clear to you who your Saint will be, ask that Saint to be your companion on your journey. Remember, we believe in the Communion of Saints, so ask your Saint to pray for you and to guide you.

The next step in your process is to let us know that you have chosen that Saint, and to reflect a little about what you have learned and why you chose the person you did. This should be 2-3 paragraphs, legibly written (see next page for more details).

OUTLINE: LETTER TO BISHOP AND PASTOR

WRITTEN BY CONFIRMATION CANDIDATE Due: February-March 2027

Here is an outline for the formal letter that needs to be written to the Bishop and to the Pastor, requesting the Sacrament of Confirmation. It is to be addressed to both the Bishop and the pastor (Fr. John Hayes), and will be sent to the Bishop along with the letters of all the Candidates from our Area Faith Community.

DO NOT mail it to the Bishop at the Diocese

- 1. Address Letter to:
 - Dear Bishop Zielinski and Father Hayes
- 2. Introduction:
 - tell who you are, say you are writing to request the Sacrament of Confirmation
- 3. Personal Information:
 - tell a little about yourself, what you like to do, who is in your family, etc.
 - tell the Bishop about your faith life
- 4. Reason for Confirmation:
 - tell your reasons for wanting Confirmation; what it will do for you; how it will bring you into closer relationship with Jesus and the Holy Spirit
 - Please DO NOT say 'I will become an Adult in the church'. This sacrament is your 'final Sacrament of Initiation' or 'becoming a fully initiated Catholic'.
 - tell what you have done to prepare for it
- 5. Future:
 - Share what your MISSION will be. In other words, how will you be involved in the Church and other areas of service then list ministries

- include information about your Saint,		, and why you chose
him/her	(Saint's name)	

- 6. Closing:
 - Thank Bishop Zielinski for the time he took to read your letter
 - use SINCERELY or another salutation, leave 3 spaces, then type you full name

If you would like the FF office to review/edit your letter before submitting, please reach out to us! We are happy to help!

- Sign your letter in INK between the salutation and your typed name!!

All letters should be in business format and typed on white paper (if you want to use a computer to type it and don't have access to one, let the Parish Coordinator know, we'll let you do it at the office). You only need to type and sign one.

Dear Bishop Zielinski and Father Hayes:

In the <u>first paragraph</u>, include your introduction information and request this Sacrament. (Try to sound friendly and conversational, but be sure to sound polished.)

In the <u>second paragraph</u>, include some personal information... (family information, hobbies, interests, activities, extra curriculars, etc.)

In the <u>third paragraph</u>, include your reasons for requesting the Sacrament of Confirmation. Here you should tell why you want to be Confirmed and especially show that you know what you are asking for in this Sacrament. Of special importance would be to mention the graces that the Sacrament confers. (You might want to refer to the YouCat #203-207, sections on Confirmation and the Sacraments in general, as a help/refresher...)

In the <u>fourth paragraph</u>, you will include information about your <u>Saint name</u> and what personal connection you find with this particular Saint (perhaps what you wish to emulate in your own life, or something that you admire, etc). You will also include two sentences about your **MISSION**...What you plan to do as a Confirmed Catholic – immediate and/or long-term.

<u>End your letter</u> with a paragraph which thanks the Bishop for taking the time to read your letter.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A MORTAL SIN AND A VENIAL SIN?

For a sin to be mortal, it must be ALL 3 of the following: 1. be a serious sin, 2. you knew that it was a serious sin, and 3. you freely chose to do it.

A venial sin hurts your relationship with God, whereas a mortal sin is your choosing to turn away from God. cf. 1 John 5:17

He descended into hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

TWO GREATEST COMMANDMENTS

- 1. Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with thy whole mind, and with thy whole strength;

Oral Interview Questions:

Who is Jesus Christ? (2nd person of the Trinity, fully God and fully man, born to Mary in Bethlehem, worked many miracles, taught us who God is and how we are to live, was crucified by Pontius Pilate 33 AD, rose from the dead, and is now seated at the right hand of God the Father)

Why is He important? (Because He is the savior—He is THEE only way to Heaven. He died for our sins and opened up the gates of Heaven for us. It's now up to us as to whether we will accept this invitation to Heaven or not.)

What prayer did He teach us? (Our Father)

Who founded the Catholic Church? (Jesus Christ)

Where in the Bible did Jesus make Peter the 1st Pope? (Matthew 16:18-19, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

How is the Catholic Church apostolic? (its teachings are completely consistent with that of the apostles, AND it has valid Orders going all the way back to the apostles themselves—Fr. Paul was ordained by a bishop, who was ordained by a bishop, etc, etc, who was ordained by one of the apostles themselves, who were ordained by Jesus Christ, Himself!)

What is the goal of life? Where do you hope to go when you die? Tell me about the basic differences between Heaven, Hell, and Purgatory. (*Heaven* is the endless moment of love. Nothing more separates us from God, whom our soul loves and has sought our whole life long. *Hell* is the condition of everlasting separation from God, the absolute absence of love. *Purgatory or the Final Purification* – someone who dies in God's grace (and therefore as peace with God and men), but who still needs purification before he can see God face to face.

What are examples of "serious sins", that is, sins that could be mortal sins? (Murder, abortion, euthanasia (physician-assisted suicide), adultery, sex outside of marriage, contraception, sterilization, masturbation, pornography, missing Sunday Mass, getting drunk or high, etc.)

How can you be forgiven of a venial sin? (simply by asking for God's forgiveness by praying the Our Father, or an Act of Contrition, or by calling it to mind at the beginning of each Mass)

What do you need to do to be forgiven of a mortal sin? (To be sorry for it and to confess it to a priest and receive absolution).

What happens if you die with a mortal sin on your soul that you have not Confessed or repented of?

(You choose to be eternally separated from God for all eternity; they would be choosing to go to Hell).

If a person has committed a mortal sin, but hasn't gone to Confession yet, can they still receive Holy Communion? (No. They would be "eating and drinking condemnation upon themselves" cf. 1 Cor 11:27).

What should they do at Mass instead? (They could either stay in their pew and make a spiritual communion, or they could cross their arms over their chest and ask for a blessing instead of Holy Communion).

How do we especially receive God's grace? (Prayer and the Sacraments)

What is a sacrament? (An outward sign instituted by Christ to give us grace)

Please talk about the meaning of Christianity to you—Is it easy to be a Christian?

- -What makes it difficult? ("Love your enemies," etc.)
- -How do our values differ from that of the world?
