

## For priest, real calling lies in parish minist



cntering his faith relationship with God through Jesus and the celebration of the Eucharist provides Fr. Joe Hornacek sustenance in daily life. At daily morning prayer, he reminds himself "this is God's church, this is God's people. I pray for strength to respond to the needs of each day and keep a healthy perspective on my limitations and the powers of God working through me."

Fr. Hernacek's vocation was prompted by an idea similar to his favorite Psalm 115, the faith of his wonderful family. He declined the first offer to be vicar (pastor) for clergy for the Milwankee Archdiocese, but accepted the difficult task in 1998, The program helps them take more responsibility for their physical and mental as well as spiritual well-being and has helped to save lives through annual physicals. (Archbishop Timothy M. Dolan who has lost 45 pounds in the last year is his prime example of success, he noted.)






















## Frs. Joseph Hickey, Linus Schmelzer announce retirement from active ministry

Retirement from active ministry has been announced by:

Fr. Joseph J. Hickey, pastor of St. John Parish, Rubicon, for the past eight years, as of June 1.

Fr. Linus L. Schmelzer, pastor of St. Anthony, Pewaukee, for nearly 27 years, effective June 30.

Born in Milwaukee, Hickey, 73, attended Pio Nono High School and Marquette University.

Upon completion of studies for priesthood at Saint Francis Seminary, he was ordained June 8, 1946, by Archbishop Moses E. Kiley at St. John Cathedral.

Following ordination he served 22 years as assistant at St. John Cathedral. He was appointed pastor of St. Peter, East Troy, in June 1968 and St. John in June 1986.

A Madison native, Schmelzer, 74, also studied for priesthood at Saint Francis Seminary. He was ordained Sept. 29, 1945, by Archbishop Moses E. Kiley at St. John

## Pewaukee Pastor to Note Silver Jubilee

PEWAUKEE - The silver jubilee of his ordination will be observed by Fr. William M. Loesch, pastor, St. Anthony parish here, with a noon Mass Sunday, June 27.

Fr. Phillip Roets, C.SS.R., will preach the sermon at the Mass at St. Anthony's which will be followed by a 1:30 p.m. jubilee dinner at the Oakton Manor hotel. A parish reception is planned for 3:30 to 5:30 p.m.

Father Loesch studied for the priesthood at St. Francis semipary and was ordained May 18, 1940 by Archbishop Moses E. Kiley at St. Anne parish, Milwankee. He offered his first Mass the following day at St. Anne's.

Following ordination the jubilarian was an assistant at St. George parish, Kenosha from 1940 to 1943, During 1943 to 1946 he was an army chaplain. He served briefly after the war at St. Anthony parish, Milwaukee.

In 1946 Father Loesch was appointed to the veterans hospital in Waukesha. While at the hospital he served part time at Holy Apostles parish, New Berlin, the county children's home, and St. Mary, Elm Grove.

He was named pastor at St. Anthony's on June 27, 1955.


















## Celebrating 50 years!

St. Anthony on the Lake W280 N2101 Hwy SS, Pewaukee

- First church: In the early 1900s, Catholics living on the southern and western shores of Pewaukee Lake petitioned the chancery and requested a priest for Sunday Masses. They received Fr. Eugene Rudge, who celebrated the first Mass in the home of Mary Siegfried with 46 worshippers. In 1920, a small chapel costing \$1,100 was built on the corner of Angela Road and Louis Avenue. Additional land was purchased in 1936 and the building was moved 150 feet and expanded. In 1955, a decree issued by Archbishop Albert G. Mever raised St. Anthony on the Lake from mission to parish status. Beginning in 1963, Mass was held in the lower level of the school building.
- Eurrent church: Construction began on the current church in 1998. The church was dedicated Sept. 5, 1999.
- First pastor: The parish's first permanent pastor was Fr. William Loesch in 1956.
- Current pastor: Fr. Joseph Hornacek
- School: Ground was broken in 1957 for a school building. As of September 1959, the school was staffed with three Sisters of the Sorrowful Mother and lay teachers for grades 1 through 6. Grades 7, 8 and

kindergarten were established later. 1962 marked the graduation of the first eighth grade class. In 1968, three Sisters of Perpetual Adoration came to staff the school. A two-room addition for kindergarteners was built in 1991.

■ Worth noting: The first parish festival was held in 1968, and has been held every year since.

The parish received the Mustard Seed Award in 2001 for excellence in involving parents in religious education.

## Parish History

During the early 1900's, a petition by the Cutholics of the south + west shores of Pewnukee Lake to the chancery resulted in a priest being assigned to offer Sunday Mass. On Sunday, June 30th 1918, Fr. Eugene Rudge celebrated the Bit Mass at the Auer Parkhome of Mary Siegfried, with 46 worshippers.

1920 - A chaptel costing \$1,100 was built- paid for in 2 weeks at the southwest comer












In the last stages of being converted into a house, the old St. Anthony's Roman Catholic church at Pewaukee

The floor plan that Lippke decided on includes many angled walls. He said this helped to break up the big look of the front rooms. Note the angled hallway, with storage space at one side, leading


to the master bedroom.



St. Anthony currently has 1,000 families in its congregation, Moore said, and is increasing at a good clip.

"We're on a pretty fast track. We're adding 50 to 75 families a year," he added noting the substantial growth.

Also, the priest shortage is playing a role. St. Anthony has had

another local priest's help in celebrating Mass. St. Anthony has four Masses scheduled on Sundays.


That help may disappear in the near future, as the assisting priest may be permanently reassigned, requiring St. Anthony to schedule fewer Masses, Moore said.

That means larger quarters will be needed to accommodate the growing congregation, he added. The estimated cost of the project is \$3.25 million. Through fundraising thus far, \$1.4 million has been pledged.

Moore said the goal is to have about half the money in pledges and then finance the rest of the project.

If all goes as planned, construction would begin this fall and be completed in nine to 12 months, depending on winter weather.





# Parish praying for new church

# Services now held in local school basement

PEWAUKEE - Even the Lord needs a new house every once in a while.


The parishioners of St. Anthony on the Lake are gathering this weekend for Commitment Weekend, where they will be submitting pledges outlining a three-year commitment on their part to help the parish build a new church.

According to Kent Moore, cochair for the parish's communications committee, the existing church is located in the basement of the school, and was meant to be a temporary worship facility when it was built 23 years ago. It has a capacity of 450 people, and the Rev. Tom Venne, St. Anthony pastor, said it no longer is able to house a congregation approaching 1,000 families.

"The church is not rundown," Venne said. "It just has to do with size. We need to take care of the needs of a growing congregation."

In its appeal, the parish is seeking to raise more than \$1. million, to be used to erect a new church on parish grounds. and renovate the current school building for more classroom space. Venne said some of the added classrooms would be made available for use by other parishes.

To date, the parish has not yet set a date for construction, hired an architect, or drawn up plans for the new church. But the 22-member steering committee for the project has enlisted the help of the James Company, a consultant group

experienced in similar fundraising efforts.

"If we are able to raise funds beyond what we are hoping for, congregation." we'll be able to do it sooner, and the people are aware of that," Venne said, "We'll see how the fund-raising goes so we have a better idea of how to

So far, about \$310,000 has been collected for the effort, by about 46 of the church's families since early September, Moore said. After parishioners submit their commitment statements on Sunday, he said the parish would have a much bet"The church is not run-down, it just has to do with size. ter idea of where it stands on the project.

"Everything looks good to reach our goal if we get the participation of the parish members, which I believe we will," Moore said.

Venne added that the numbers being discussed were preliminary numbers, and no definite costs have been set. If the

amount raised falls abort of projections, Venne said the church would have to turn to other sources of revenue, and even finance part of the expense. He said each church in the diocese is responsible for raising its own funds, and could not expect to receive aid from the diocese or other Church au-
