Letter from our Pastor

Dear families and friends of St. Mark's Catholic School

Our readings for this coming weekend can serve as a powerful rally cry to embrace the identity of our Faith, and live with intention to follow Christ.



The prophet Amos (1st Reading) is speaking to us from approx 760 - 755 BC. He is an older contemporary of Isaiah. His Holy Spirit inspired teaching is to the people of the northern Kingdom (the people of Israel were divided after the death of Solomon 200 years before Amos into the northern and southern kingdoms). They were enjoying bountiful harvests. As we hear read...they were enjoying sumptuous meals, eating heartily, and living a life of leisure and comfort. But they are not adherent to matters of faith. They had become ambivalent or indifferent to the God-denying practices and cultural norms that had been gradually accepted as normative. They were losing their identity as a people called by name by God through whom God would bring salvation to all peoples. A mere half century after Amos' public ministry, the powerful Assyrian army invaded and laid siege to the northern kingdom. Many were killed, and their people and their treasury taken into captivity. The trauma of this invasion will impact the people of Israel for generations. God used the Assyrian army and their brutal invasion to bring the people of Israel to account.

In the Gospel reading from Luke, we hear in the 16th Chapter the story of the wealthy man, and the poor beggar Lazarus. The wealthy man enjoys the many comforts of life, indifferent to the sufferings of those around him. Poor Lazarus dies, relieved of his earthly struggles, and is carried by angels to the "bosom of Abraham"...heaven. The rich man also dies, and is cast into the netherworld...or hell. We can learn from this story several key points. First, there is definitively a heaven and a hell. Jesus, who is God, is telling us so. Second, how we live in this life determines our eternal destination. We must choose Christ as Savior, and we must follow His way and teachings. All people will live forever in a full and present consciousness. Either in heaven in the proximity to and in the glory of God, or in hell, eternally separated from God, and under the eternal suffering and abuse of the evil one. The wealthy man, now cast into hell and fully aware of his eternal sentence, asks that a messenger be sent to his brothers so that they might avoid this eternal damnation. Abraham replies, "they have the prophets", and "even if one were to rise from the dead, they would not be persuaded".


Let us be bold in claiming and living our identity in Christ. The world desperately needs followers of Christ to provide the example of how to live as people of God. Our walk in the Catholic Faith is not only for our benefit. It is for the benefit of the many who do not know him, who do not have the privilege of receiving a formation in the Catholic Faith. Let us rise each day in humility before the Lord, and then engage the day enlivened by the Holy Spirit, and committed to being Christ present to all we meet. If we seek to follow Him, God can use our lives in the Catholic Faith to save the lives of many.



Teaching kids to withhold information about school.

You're on your way home from work. You're anxious for a little encouragement, some relaxation, and maybe something cool to drink. It's been a hard day. You need all the support you can get to recharge your batteries and feel strong enough to face tomorrow.

You are greeted with, "Hi honey. How was it today? Where are your papers? I want to see how you did today."

"It was OK. I really don't want to talk about it. Is there anything cool to drink? I'm really beat."

"Well, no wonder you don't want to talk about it. Look at these papers. You can do a lot better than this. Where was your mind today? You sit down right now, and we'll go over these proposals you wrote and get the spelling straightened out. Look at these paragraphs! You'll never get promoted at this rate. I don't understand this. You have so much more potential than this!"

How long would it be before you found a more comfortable place to go after work? "Who needs this?" you will say. "I'll find someone who can show me a little more appreciation for my hard work!"

Many school aged children face this same type of situation daily. After school, they are greeted with, "what did you learn today?" And "where is your homework? You get on it right now!" Children are also requested to bring home their papers so that their mistakes can be corrected. This is done in the name of love and caring by parents who believe they should show an interest in their child's progress.

But children can't choose to go somewhere else after school. They can't avoid facing a replay of their daily failures at work. They must return home and listen to whatever their parents have to say.

It is very difficult for a child to say, "Mother! Do you realize you are training me to keep my school progress a secret from you?" Adults, on the other hand, spend little time with people who remind them of their failures or weaknesses.

Many parents train their children to avoid talking about school through the following tried and true method. First, the kids quit bringing home their school papers. They make excuses and blame it on their teachers. "She never gives me my papers to bring home."

Next, the parent goes to the school demanding that the teacher develops some sort of foolproof reporting method, such as daily or weekly reports. This never proves a long-term solution because it addresses the wrong problem. It also robs teachers a valuable teaching and preparation time.

The real problem is that the child does not feel safe discussing school with the parent. Instead of a reporting plan, it is much wiser for parents and children to learn how to talk to each other in safe and supportive ways. This solution works and it lasts for a lifetime.

You can teach your child to want to discuss school with you. At the same time, you can lay the foundation for helping your youngster become a true winner. This technique is based on extensive research on winners and losers. Winners always think about how they are going to succeed, well losers always think about their possible failures.

Here are four steps to follow that will teach your child to discuss school with you:

Step 1

Sit down with your child two or three times per week. Have him point out the best things he did on his papers.

Step 2

Make sure your child describes the reasons for his success. As he puts these into words, they become imprinted in his brain, never to be erased. He will start to believe that he is in control of his own success or failure.

Step 3

Work with your child on mistakes only when you are asked to help. Let the school work on the deficiencies. Unfortunately, many school personnel have more expertise with what is wrong rather than what is right. Your child will get enough attention about that at school.

Step 4

Be patient. This is a real change in operation. It will take the child a period of time to believe that it is not just a new phase you are going through.

Look for the results and benefits to show up in several months or maybe the next few years, depending on the child's past history. One thing we do know for sure is how the old way works. We can always go back to fighting with our children and blaming teachers if we lose either our patience or our faith.
