"Theology of the Body" for Couples <u>Talk 7</u>: Marriage—The Dimension of Sign

"I passed near you again and looked on you...I swore a covenant with you, says the Lord God, and you became *mine*..." (Ez. 16:8)

In Summary

This talk continued the 2nd half of "Theology of the Body", which John Paul II calls "The Sacrament". This particular section that we looked at is entitled "The Dimension of Sign". Here, "sign" is understood as something which *points toward* an even greater destination. The sacraments partake of the world of signs, and so does a couple's marital embrace: The marital embrace is a sign of *true love*, a love that is *from* God, and which is Heaven-bound.

We learned in this section that love has a truth all its own. Love is both an action ("self-gift" and "wanting the good of the other") and a passion ("the spiritual presence of the beloved *in* the lover"). Love cannot be manipulated. If it is, it is no longer love. It is in this light that John Paul II speaks of the "Language of the Body" and the "Prophecy of the Body". In the marital embrace, the body itself "speaks" the language of marital love and marital truth. It says, "I belong to you and *only* you" (unity); "I want to be with you *forever* (indissolubility); and "I want to have children with you (procreativity). A prophet is one who speaks the truth. The body's language is prophetic: It declares the *truth of love*, and the *truth of marriage*.

The "language of the liturgy" is also prophetic. It speaks the truth of marital love through the vows that are exchanged: Freely ("Have you come here freely and without reservation...?"); Fully ("...to give yourself to each other in marriage?"); Faithfully ("Will you love and honor each other as man and wife for the rest of your lives?"); and Fruitfully ("Will you accept children lovingly from God?"). These "four F's" are also perfectly exemplified in the life of Christ in relationship to the Church, His Bride, showing us yet again the powerful sign value of authentic married love and how it shows forth for the world the life of faith, and is built up by the life of faith. In a word, the Church builds up marriage, and marriage builds up the Church.

Lastly, we looked at the two great Biblical "love stories" of the Song of Songs and the book of Tobit. Both of these stories show the sacred nature of human love. In the Song of Songs, we see the woman being embraced as *sister* before she is fully received as bride. And in the book of Tobit, we see how shared prayer in the life of a couple can be not only life-giving, but literally life-*saving*. It is when God is invited *into* marital life and the marital embrace that true intimacy is born, and couples are able to serve one another through the greatest of gifts: being one another's help mates toward Heaven.

TOB Terms

Sign: Like a sacrament, a sign is "the visibility of the invisible" (TOB 95b:7). A sign points *beyond* itself toward a hoped-for destination.

Grace: God's help to us so that we can live His divine life.

Liturgy: Our thanksgiving to God through right worship and adoration, centered on the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass; The public prayer of the Church.

Love: As a <u>passion</u>, love is the spiritual presence of the beloved in the lover. It is something that happens *to* me. As an <u>action</u>, love is a gift of self, and wanting the good of the other. It is something that I do

Language of the body: "[The] singular language of... [our] personal existence and vocation" (TOB 104:7). The marital embrace is a sacramental sign in which the bodies of man and woman speak "prophetically" in the name of God with His authority. This language is meant to proclaim the truth of God's love for us, poured out in Christ's body, *given up* for us.

Prophetism of the Body: "Conjugal consent...offers the spouses a particular share in the prophetic mission of the Church" (TOB 106:4). Our bodies are created for a gift of self that is unitive and life-giving, because *God* is a life-giving communion of love. Made in His image, we show forth His life *prophetically* through our actions and our choices when they are good, or, we *obscure* His life when our actions and choices are sinful.

Prophet: "one who expresses with human words the truth that comes from God" (TOB 105:2).
