Society of St. Vincent de Paul Mission Statement

Inspired by Gospel values, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, a Catholic lay organization, leads women and men to join together to grow spiritually by offering person-to-person service to those who are needy and suffering in the tradition of its founder, Blessed Frédéric Ozanam, and patron, St. Vincent de Paul.

As a reflection of the whole family of God, members, who are known as Vincentians, are drawn from every ethnic and cultural background, age group, and economic level. Vincentians are united in an international society of charity by their spirit of poverty, humility and sharing, which is nourished by prayer and reflection, mutually supportive gatherings and adherence to a basic Rule.

Organized locally, Vincentians witness God's love by embracing all works of charity and justice. The Society collaborates with other people of good will in relieving need and addressing its causes, making no distinction in those served because, in them, Vincentians see the face of Christ.

What is Vincentian spirituality? Those who seek to live their lives and their faith in the spirit of St Vincent de Paul are known as Vincentians. Central to Vincentian spirituality is:
 To see Christ in the poor and marginalized. To be one with the poor. To serve with humility, authenticity, and without judgment. To give of one's self, rather than the simple provision of material assistance.
Vincentian's see their work as a continuation of Christ's own work.

The Society is an international organization. The Rule sets out basic principles and core beliefs, as well as operational directives.
Become a member of the Vincentian Society ACTIVE (Required) ASSOCIATE (Required)

The Society recognizes that the level of involvement members can commit to will vary depending on personal circumstances such as work and family commitments. For this reason, the Society holds three forms of membership:

- Active (full) members are those who participate regularly in prayer life, attends regular
 conference meetings, and participates in charitable activities through personal contact with the
 poor of the Vincentian Conference or Council. An Active (Full) Member accepts the Rule of
 the Society and belongs to a Catholic Church.
- **Associate members** are committed to living the Society mission and serving those in need by offering assistance to outreach projects held throughout the year. Associate members do not attend conference meetings and may or may not be of the Catholic faith. The Conference is expected to keep associate members informed of the conference activities.
- Contributing members offer In-Kind or financial donations to a conference, Council Program or special work.

Normally, Active membership implies Conference affiliation. Once a person expresses interest in active membership, the process begins:

- The name is submitted to the Conference President
- The President provides information about the person to the Conference for approval.
- Once approved, the person is welcomed as a member at the next Conference meeting.
- A period of training and discernment begins. A mentor may be assigned to the person.

All members are called to annually renew their promise of service to the members and to the poor, thereby deepening the spiritual dimension of their vocation.

There are several forms that are used to document home visits, vouchers, tracking service time, and more. Officers need to keep track of the information, so members' timely completion helps their responsibilities.
Attend the Ozinam Orientation ACTIVE (Required)

The Orientation provides an historical context to the work of the Society. The topics include: 1. Introduction, 2. The Story of SVdP, 3. The Gift of Vincentian Spirituality, 4. Conference Life, 5, Council Life, 6. Understanding Poverty, 7. About Home Visits. Registration is at 8:15 at the Waukesha office, and the day ends at 1:00 pm. Lunch is included.

•	ACTIVE President – This position is selected by active members in a secret ballot. The term of office is three years, and renewable for one consecutive term. (A person who has served two consecutive terms may serve again after a minimum three year period.)
	 Our current Conference president is Lynn Morrison. Her term of office began 10/1/17. Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer – These positions are appointed by the president. These appointments terminate when a new president is elected. The new president may
	choose to reappoint those serving in these roles. These positions may not be held by relatives of the president. Because these are appointed roles, there is no provision for succession training. At the president's discretion, an informal preparation of a successor is possible, but this has no impact on the election process for selecting an actual new president. It is always good practice to train others in doing any of the three appointed roles, so that there is continuity should a role become vacant.
	The vice-president exercises all the functions of the president when the president is absent. The secretary keeps records of the conference, and records meeting minutes and publishes them. The treasurer is responsible for conference funds, and is guided by specific practices detailed in the Council. Currently serving in these roles are: Vice-President – Joe Strazishar Secretary – Joanne Platke Treasurer – Gene Maurer
	Spiritual Advisor – Conferences must have a spiritual advisor. This can be a priest, a deacon or anyone who has been trained as a spiritual advisor. o The current advisor is Kathie Leemon.

Its purpose is to build a grelationship by offering support, prayer and hope to people in need. Assistance may include ency rent, utilities, food, clothing, household goods, referral services and programming to help te a path to financial stability. A standard procedure is that home visits are always conducted by two ers, and held in the patron's home whenever possible. The Council offers periodic in-depth Visitor training.

The Waukesha Council has an impressive array of services. Members can grow in their ministry and assist in services offered to the community.

- Thrift Stores SVdP's most visible presence in the community are its two stores open to the public. They are located in Oconomowoc and Waukesha.
- Coming Together to Get Ahead CTGA's initiatives seek to reduce poverty. The program guides individuals to financially self-sustaining lifestyles. It also seeks to garner support for community-wide efforts to remove barriers that burden individuals' efforts to move from poverty. Seminars, workshops and mentoring are the tools used to create this change.
- **Jail Ministry** -- For more than twenty-five years the St. Dismas Jail Ministry has been meeting the spiritual and physical needs of the men and women of the Waukesha County Jail and

Huber facility. While one-on-one jail visits are central to the ministry, St Dismas Jail Ministry members provide numerous other services.

- Back-to-School Program -- The St. Vincent de Paul Back-to-School Program helps struggling families get their children off to a good school start.
- **Monday Meal Program** -- St. Vincent Waukesha County partners with the Hope Center (with financial support and staffing) to serve a nutritious hot meal Monday evenings to the homeless, indigent and needy men, women and children in the City of Waukesha. The meal is served to approximately 60 guests at the Hope Center, located at 502 N. East Avenue, Waukesha.
- SVdP Sundays -- Donating to SVdP made easy! SVdP Sundays are designed to offer a convenient way for parishioners, neighbors and friends to donate items to our Thrift Stores right at their parish location. The SVdP truck is positioned in the church parking lot for an entire weekend. Donors may drive right up to it to donate and volunteers will help you unload your items. SVdP Sundays are held annually.
- SVdP Summer Lunch Program This provides a bag lunch and beverage to school age children and their parents Monday through Friday during the entire school summer vacation. The program is offered at Saratogan Park, located on the grounds of the Saratoga Campus Waukesha Stem Academy. This site was chosen to accommodate the largest group of children in the city of Waukesha that utilize the School District of Waukesha's Free and Reduced Breakfast and Lunch Programs while school is in session. SVdP partners with the City of Waukesha Park, Recreation and Forestry Department.
- Waukesha Food Pantry Home Delivery -- St. Vincent de Paul partners with the Waukesha
 Food Pantry and St. William Catholic Church to deliver food once a month to approximately 45
 shut-ins in Waukesha County. This is a great service to those who need assistance but have
 no way of getting to the Food Pantry. The Waukesha Food Pantry qualifies recipients, St.
 William Church volunteers packages the food, and St. Vincent de Paul members provide
 delivery services.
- Voucher Program -- St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Stores provide an avenue for members to send people they are assisting to choose, free of charge, items in need such as clothing, household items and furniture. During a Home Visit the immediate needs are determined, a dollar value of those items the Conference will support is established, and a voucher is offered to the party in need. The Voucher form is obtained through this referral process and also serves as a communication to Thrift Store staff.
