#### **Thoughts on Being Pro-Life**

As we approach the anniversary of Roe vs. Wade—the Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion in our country, here is an excerpt from an article titled: *"How to be Pro-Life: A Guide for Every Day of the Year,"* by Christina Mead, on the *lifeteen.com* website:

I feel really strongly about being pro-life and standing up for the weakest and most innocent whose lives are being taken from them...So how do you live "pro-life" every day of the year? I looked to some really holy, and really pro-life people for the answer to that question and here's what I found:

#### 1. Love Above All

Any dialogue about abortion has to come from the heart because it's a heart issue. It's fear and panic and insecurity (or a lack of support or seeming lack of other options) that lead to an abortion and those feelings can only be dealt with in love and compassion. Jesus taught that love is the most important characteristic for a Christian... Be the kind of person that's truthful but approachable because of your attitude of love.

# 2. Be Pro-Your-Life

To be pro-life is to value all life, starting with the one closest to you – your own. How are you making Christ present to the world through your life? You've been given a gift that millions (well over fifty million, actually) have been denied. Use it wisely...What does abundant life mean for you? I think it means living a sacramental life – getting the most out of Mass, Confession, and prayer. To be alive is to live as close to God as possible because all life comes from Him and is heading back toward Him. When you are fully alive... fully pro-your-life... then you're fully aware of the gift that life is. You can appreciate the ups and the downs, and the struggles and joys that make up the mosaic of a human life. And in appreciating the gift of your life, you will be convicted that every life, from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death, deserves to be protected so that they can experience everything life has to offer...

#### 3. Peace Starts Inside You

To end the culture of death around us we have to end the culture of death in our minds. We have to stop any thoughts that deny people (and ourselves) of the dignity that we all deserve. Those thoughts that you're not good enough, that you deserve less than others, that you deserve pain... thoughts of hatred toward others and toward yourself... They have to end.

Peace begins in your heart and from there extends into the pro-life movement. When you value rather than hate your life and the lives of the people around, you help dispel the fear that leads a woman to seek an abortion. When a pregnant woman knows that she won't be condemned but be supported by the people around her, she's so much more likely to look at her other options than to choose abortion.

You see... you, as a Catholic, are a representation of the whole Catholic Church and however you live out our beliefs helps make up the understanding that the world has of "those Catholics." Let's make sure the world knows we want heaven for every person. This begins with you being a trustworthy, peaceful person who loves yourself and every person you come in contact with.

# 4. Pray Harder, Especially Before You Speak

The worst way to accomplish something is to try to do it by yourself. Seriously, no good thing is ever done without God's helping hand. He is the good in us...One very important time to remember to pray is before you talk or debate with someone about the morality and legality of abortion. We all know it's a debate that can quickly get very heated and very ugly. But just because you're not standing in D.C. and holding up a sign, doesn't mean you can stop standing for life and holding up the light of truth. And it will be difficult. You won't be sure what to say – and that is okay, when the time comes the Spirit will give you the words if you've prayed (Luke 21:14). You will be ridiculed. You will be tired of the fight. You will wish it were January and everyone else was still acting pro-life. But...

You are important to the pro-life movement. There are babies in the womb counting on you all 12 months of the year. And you know what I think is absolutely the best part? That when we get to heaven and God opens His arms to you, and says, "well done my good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:21), there will be millions of souls of unborn children waiting to welcome you – their own personal warrior for life.

#### Pensamientos Sobre ser Pro-Vida

A medida que nos acercamos al aniversario de Roe contra Wade, la decisión de la Corte Suprema que legalizó el aborto en nuestro país, aquí hay un extracto de un artículo titulado: "Cómo ser Pro-Vida: Una Guía para Todos los Días del Año", por Christina Mead, en el sitio web de lifeteen.com:

Me siento muy fuerte por ser pro-vida y defender a los más débiles e inocentes cuyas vidas están siendo arrebatadas de ellos... Entonces, ¿cómo vives "pro-vida" todos los días del año? Miré a algunas personas realmente santas, y realmente pro-vida para la respuesta a esa pregunta y esto es lo que encontré:

#### 1. Amor por Encima de Todo

Cualquier diálogo sobre el aborto tiene que venir del corazón porque es un problema del corazón. Es el miedo, el pánico y la inseguridad (o la falta de apoyo o aparente falta de otras opciones) lo que conduce a un aborto y esos sentimientos sólo pueden ser tratados con amor y compasión. Jesús enseñó que el amor es la característica más importante para un cristiano... Sé el tipo de persona que es veraz pero accesible debido a tu actitud de amor.

#### 2. Sea Pro-Su-Vida

Ser pro-vida es valorar toda la vida, empezando por la más cercana a ti, la tuya. ¿Cómo están haciendo que Cristo esté presente al mundo a través de su vida? Se te ha dado un don de que millones (más de cincuenta millones, en realidad) han sido negados. Utilícelo sabiamente... ¿Qué significa para ti una vida abundante? Creo que significa vivir una vida sacramental: sacar el máximo provecho de la misa, la confesión y la oración. Estar vivo es vivir lo más cerca posible de Dios porque toda vida viene de Él y se dirige de nuevo hacia Él. Cuando estás completamente vivo... totalmente pro-su -vida... entonces eres plenamente consciente del don que es la vida. Se pueden apreciar los altibajos, y las luchas y ale-grías que componen el mosaico de una vida humana. Y al apreciar el don de tu vida, serás condenado que toda vida, desde el momento de la concepción hasta el momento de la muerte natural, merece ser protegida para que puedan experimentar todo lo que la vida tiene para ofrecer...

#### 3. La Paz Comienza Dentro de Usted

Para acabar con la cultura de la muerte que nos rodea tenemos que acabar con la cultura de la muerte en nuestras mentes. Tenemos que detener cualquier pensamiento que niegue a las personas (y a nosotros mismos) de la dignidad que todos merecemos. Esos pensamientos de que no eres lo suficientemente bueno, que te mereces menos que los demás, que mereces dolor... pensamientos de odio hacia los demás y hacia ti mismo... Tienen que terminar.

La paz comienza en tu corazón y a partir de ahí se extiende hacia el movimiento pro-vida. Cuando valoras en lugar de odiar tu vida y la de las personas de alrededor, ayudas a disipar el miedo que lleva a una mujer a buscar un aborto. Cuando una mujer embarazada sabe que no será condenada, sino que será apoyada por las personas que la rodean, es mucho más probable que mire sus otras opciones que elegir el aborto.

Lo ves... usted, como católico, es una representación de toda la Iglesia Católica y como viva nuestras creencias ayuda a componer la comprensión que el mundo tiene de "esos católicos". Asegurémonos de que el mundo sepa que queremos el cielo para cada persona. Esto comienza con usted siendo una persona confiable y pacífica que se ama a sí misma y a cada persona con la que entra en contacto.

#### 4. Ora Más Duro, Especialmente Antes de Hablar

La peor manera de lograr algo es tratar de hacerlo por ti mismo. En serio, nunca se hace nada bueno sin la mano de Dios. Es el bueno en nosotros... Un momento muy importante para recordar orar es antes de hablar o debatir con alguien sobre la moralidad y la legalidad del aborto. Todos sabemos que es un debate que puede llegar a ser muy acalorado y muy feo. Pero sólo porque no estés parado en D.C. y sosteniendo un letrero, no significa que puedas dejar de estar de pie de por vida y sostener la luz de la verdad. Y será difícil. No estarás seguro de qué decir, y eso está bien, cuando llegue el momento en que llegue el Espíritu te dará las palabras si has orado (Lucas 21:14). Serás ridiculizado. Estarás cansado de la pelea. Desearás que fuera enero y todos los demás siguieran actuando a favor de la vida. Pero...

Eres importante para el movimiento pro-vida. Hay bebés en el útero que cuentan con ustedes los 12 meses del año. ¿Y sabes lo que creo que es absolutamente la mejor parte? Que cuando lleguemos al cielo y Dios os abra los brazos y os diga: "Bien hecho mi siervo bueno y fiel" (Mateo 25:21), habrá millones de almas de hijos por nacer esperando para acogeros, su propio guerrero persol para toda **Pro Élife** la vida.
