

Thoughts on Martha and Mary

Here is an excerpt from an article titled: Mary, Martha and Catholic Fullness, by Dr. Marcellino D'Ambrosio, posted on 9 July 2019 on the *Catholic Exchange* website:

Catholic Means Fullness

... The Greek word "catholic" comes from the word for "wholeness" or "fullness." The "catholic" church is not just a regional sect for an exclusive little group. Rather it must include the *whole* family of God over the *whole* world, welcoming *all*, from every tribe, tongue,

people, and nation (Rev. 7: 9 In addition, the "catholic" church cannot pick and choose which doctrines are trendy and convenient, but must be faithful to the whole truth ...

Jesus, the Fullness of Truth

One day, the fullness of life and truth came walking into the living room of a pair of sisters named Martha and Mary. They immediately recognized the privilege of having Jesus in their home and set to work fulfilling the sacred duty of hospitality. The problem was, they had conflicting ideas of what that duty entailed. Martha's response is very recognizable, especially by those familiar with Mediterranean culture. "Bring out the coffee, the wine (what kind do you prefer?), make sure the china and silverware are laid out in proper order, get out a full assortment of hot and cold hors d'oeurves (make sure the hot are really served hot!)."

Giving Jesus Full Attention

Mary thought that the supreme compliment that she could pay to her divine guest, even more than world-class refreshments, was to give him her full attention. The fullness of truth had come to her home to nourish, enlighten, and transform her. Not to receive and unwrap this wonderful gift would be an insult to the giver. Martha's mistake was not that she attended to the guest's bodily needs. The story of Martha and Mary is not an endorsement of laziness and passivity. In Gen 18:1-10 God visits Abraham in the form of three travelers, and Abraham and Sara pull out all the stops when it comes to food and drink, and this was good.

Action that becomes Distraction


Martha's problem was that she allowed the activity of hospitality to become a *distraction*. She couldn't see the forest for the trees. She lost her focus and actually got mad that her sister would not join her in her frenetic fussing. Mary kept her focus. She was not *passive* - attentiveness to the fullness of truth is supremely *active*. That's why the contemplative, monastic life has always been held in the highest esteem in the Catholic Church.

The Sin of Busyness

I was once told by a monk that the greatest sin of the modern world is not its lewdness but its busyness. We live in the most distracted, frenetic society of all time. It is tempting in such a society to think we are good Christians and deserve applause because we look to God from time to time out of the corner of our eye. But the fullness of truth, the fullness of life, the fullness of grace deserves our full attention. Jesus really cannot be merely a part of one's life, but must be the center of one's life. It does not mean that our life can't be full of activities. But unless we preserve some quiet time each day to sit at his feet as did Mary, our action will become distraction and we'll be as snappy and unhappy as Martha.

Aquí hay un extracto de un artículo titulado: María, Marta y la Plenitud Católica, por el Dr. Marcellino D'Ambrosio, publicado el 9 de julio de 2019 en el sitio web de *Catholic Exchange*:

Católico significa plenitud

...La palabra griega de la que se deriva "católico" se traduce como "totalidad" o "plenitud"...

La Iglesia "católica", no es simplemente una secta regional para un grupo exclusivo de personas. Por el contrario, la Iglesia debe incluir a "toda" la familia de Dios en "todo" el mundo, dando la bienvenida a "todas" las personas, de todas las naciones, razas, pueblos y lenguas (Ap 7:9). Adicionalmente, la Iglesia "católica" no puede seleccionar solo doctrinas que le son convenientes o están de moda, sino que debe ser fiel a "toda" la verdad...

Jesús, La plenitud de la verdad

Un día, la plenitud de la vida y la verdad entró caminando a la sala de un par de hermanas llamadas Marta y María. Inmediatamente reconocieron el privilegio de tener a Jesús en su hogar y se pusieron a trabajar para cumplir con su deber sagrado de hospitalidad. El problema era que tenían ideas encontradas sobre como cumplir con ese deber. La respuesta de Marta es conocida por todos, especialmente por los familiarizados con la cultura mediterránea. "Traer el café, el vino, asegurarse que la vajilla y los cubiertos sean colocados sobre la mesa apropiadamente, traer todo el surtido de entradas frías y calientes (y asegurarse que las entradas calientes se sirvan verdaderamente calientes).

Darle a Jesús toda nuestra atención

María pensó que el mejor elogio que podía hacerle su invitado, mejor aún que servirle bebidas exquisitas, era dedicarle toda su atención. La plenitud de la verdad había llegado a su hogar para nutrirla, iluminarla y transformarla. No recibir y desenvolver este maravilloso regalo habría sido un insulto para aquel que da la vida. El error de Marta no fue atender las necesidades materiales de su invitado. La historia de Marta y María no es una aprobación de la pereza y la pasividad. En Génesis 18:1-10 Dios visita a Abraham en la forma de tres viajeros. Abraham y Sara hicieron todo lo posible para proveerles de comida y bebida y esto estuvo bien.

Acción que se convierte en distracción

El error de Marta fue haber permitido que la actividad de la hospitalidad se convirtiera en distracción. Perdió de vista el bosque por poner atención a los árboles. Perdió la concentración y se enfadó con su hermana por no unirse a su frenesí. María mantuvo su enfoque. Ella no fue *pasiva* – estar atenta a la plenitud de la verdad implica estar supremamente *activa*. Es por eso la vida monástica contemplativa siempre ha sido vista con gran estima en la Iglesia Católica. El pecado de mantenerse ocupado

Una vez, un monje me comentó que el pecado más grande del mundo moderno no es su ociosidad, si no su laboriosidad. Vivimos en la sociedad más distraída y frenética de todos los tiempos. En tal sociedad, es tentador pensar que somos buenos cristianos y que merecemos ser aplaudidos porque miramos de reojo a Dios de vez en cuando. Sin embargo, la plenitud de la verdad, la plenitud de la vida, la plenitud de la gracia merece nuestra total atención. Jesús no puede ser simplemente parte de nuestras vidas, sino que debe ser el centro de nuestras vidas. Esto no quiere decir que nuestras vidas no estén llenas de actividades. Pero, a menos que reservemos un poco de tiempo cada día para sentarnos a sus pies como hizo María, nuestra "acción" se convertirá en distracción y estaremos tan irritados y descontentos como Marta.
