Here is a reprint of Archbishop Chaput's Weekly Column titled: "Gilroy, El Paso, Dayton — and Columbine," by Archbishop Charles Chaput, O.F.M. Cap., dated 5 August 2019, on the Archdiocese of Philadelphia website:

Exactly 20 years ago, in U.S. Senate testimony just weeks after the Columbine High School massacre, I offered these thoughts:

The real problem [of Columbine-like violence in our culture] is in here, in us . . . In the last four decades we've created a culture that markets violence in dozens of different ways, seven days a week. It's part of our social fabric. When we build our advertising campaigns on consumer selfishness and greed, and when money becomes the universal measure of value, how can we be surprised when our sense of community erodes? When we glorify and multiply guns, why are we shocked when kids use them?

When we answer murder with more violence in the death penalty, we put the state's seal of approval on revenge. When the most dangerous place in the country is a mother's womb and the unborn child can have his or her head crushed in an abortion, even in the process of being born, the body language of that message is that life isn't sacred and may not be worth much at all. In fact, certain kinds of killing no longer even count officially as "killing." Certain kinds of killing we enshrine as rights and protect by law. When we live this kind of contradiction, why are we surprised at the results?

The Columbine murders will mark my [Denver] community for years to come. They're a wound felt by the entire country — but I don't think they'll be the last. We live in the most violent century in history. Nothing makes us immune from that violence except a relentless commitment to respect the sanctity of each human life, from womb to natural death. The civility and community we've built in this country are fragile. We're losing them. In examining how and why our culture markets violence, I ask you not to stop with the symptoms. Look deeper. The families in Littleton and throughout the country deserve at least that much.

In separate incidents over the past two weeks, gunmen have killed three persons and wounded 13 others in Gilroy, CA; killed at least 20 (now 22) and wounded 24 others in El Paso, TX; and killed at least nine and wounded 27 others in Dayton, OH. These are just the latest in a long pattern of mass shootings; shootings that have blood-stained the past two decades with no end in sight. Now begins the usual aftermath: expressions of shock; hand-wringing about senseless (or racist, or religious, or political) violence; bitter arguments about gun control; heated editorials, earnest (but brief) self-searching of the national soul, and eventually – we're on to the next crisis.

I buried some of the young Columbine victims 20 years ago. I sat with their families, watched them weep, listened to their anger, and saw the human wreckage that gun violence leaves behind. The experience taught me that assault rifles are not a birthright, and the Second Amendment is not a Golden Calf. I support thorough background checks and more restrictive access to guns for anyone seeking to purchase them. But it also taught me that only a fool can believe that "gun control" will solve the problem of mass violence. The people *using* the guns in these loathsome incidents are moral agents with twisted hearts. And the twisting is done by the culture of sexual anarchy, personal excess, political hatreds, intellectual dishonesty, and perverted freedoms that we've systematically created over the past half-century.

So I'll say it again, 20 years later. Treating the symptoms in a culture of violence doesn't work. We need to look deeper. Until we're willing to do that, nothing fundamental will change.

Aquí hay una reimpresión de la Columna Semanal del Arzobispo Chaput titulada: "Gilroy, El Paso, Dayton — y Columbine", por el Arzobispo Charles Chaput, O.F.M. Cap., fechada el 5 de agosto de 2019, en el sitio web de la Arquidiócesis de Filadelfia:

Hace exactamente 20 años, en el testimonio del Senado de los Estados Unidos pocas semanas después de la masacre de la Escuela Secundaria Columbine, ofrecí estos pensamientos:

El verdadero problema [de la violencia Columbine en nuestra cultura] está aquí, en nosotros... En las últimas cuatro décadas hemos creado una cultura que comercializa la violencia de docenas de maneras diferentes, los siete días de la semana. Es parte de nuestro tejido social. Cuando construimos nuestras campañas publicitarias sobre el egoísmo y la codicia de los consumidores, y cuando el dinero se convierte en la medida universal del valor, ¿cómo podemos sorprendernos cuando nuestro sentido de comunidad se erosiona? Cuando glorificamos y multiplicamos las armas, ¿por qué nos sorprendemos cuando los niños las usan?

Cuando respondemos al asesinato con más violencia en la pena de muerte, ponemos el sello de aprobación del estado en venganza. Cuando el lugar más peligroso del país es el vientre de una madre y el feto puede tener su cabeza aplastada en un aborto, incluso en el proceso de nacer, el lenguaje corporal de ese mensaje es que la vida no es sagrada y puede no valer mucho en absoluto. De hecho, ciertos tipos de asesinatos ya ni siquiera cuentan oficialmente como "matar". Ciertos tipos de asesinatos que consagramos como derechos y protegemos por ley. Cuando vivimos este tipo de contradicción, ¿por qué nos sorprenden los resultados?

Los asesinatos de Columbine marcarán mi comunidad [Denver] en los años venideros. Son una herida sentida por todo el país—pero no creo que sean las últimas. Vivimos en el siglo más violento de la historia. Nada nos hace inmunes a esa violencia, excepto el compromiso implacable de respetar la santidad de cada vida humana, desde el vientre hasta la muerte natural. La civilidad y la comunidad que hemos construido en este país son frágiles. Los estamos perdiendo. Al examinar cómo y por qué nuestra cultura comercializa la violencia, les pido que no dejen de presentarse con los síntomas. Mira más profundo. Las familias de Littleton y de todo el país merecen al menos eso.

En incidentes separados en las últimas dos semanas, hombres armados han matado a tres personas e herido a otras 13 en Gilroy, CA; mató al menos a 20 (ahora 22) e hirió a otros 24 en El Paso, TX; e mató al menos a nueve e hirió a otras 27 personas en Dayton, OH. Estos son sólo los últimos en un largo patrón de tiroteos masivos; tiroteos que han manchado de sangre las últimas dos décadas sin fin a la vista. Ahora comienza las secuelas habituales: expresiones de shock; hacer retorcimiento de las manos sobre la violencia sin sentido (o racista, o religiosa o política); argumentos amargos sobre el control de armas; editoriales acaloradas, serias (pero breves) auto-búsqueda del alma nacional, y eventualmente — estamos en la próxima crisis.

Enterré a algunas de las jóvenes víctimas de Columbine hace 20 años. Me senté con sus familias, los vi llorar, escuché su ira y vi los restos humanos que la violencia armada deja atrás. La experiencia me enseñó que los rifles de asalto no son un derecho de nacimiento, y la Segunda Enmienda no es un becerro de oro. Apoyo comprobaciones exhaustivas de antecedentes y acceso más restrictivo a las armas para cualquiera que busque comprarlas. Pero también me enseñó que sólo un tonto puede creer que el "control de armas" resolverá el problema de la violencia masiva. La gente que usa las armas en estos incidentes repugnantes son agentes morales con corazones retorcidos. Y la torsión se hace por la cultura de la anarquía sexual, el exceso personal, los odios políticos, la deshonestidad intelectual y las libertades pervertidas que hemos creado sistemáticamente en el último medio siglo.

Así que lo diré de nuevo, 20 años después. Tratar los síntomas en una cultura de violencia no funciona. Tenemos que mirar más profundo. Hasta que estemos dispuestos a hacer eso, nada fundamental cambiará.

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
