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
Farewell to St. Agnes parish

Celebration

Deacon Ray Waitrovich ordained 25 years ago

A member of St. Agnes Parish for the last 50 years, Deacon Ray Waitrovich is celebrating the 25th anniversary of his ordination. He remembered how it all came about.

"I was helping out a lot at Mass and around the parish," Deacon Ray said. "Then Father Andy Doyle fell and broke his leg. He was in a wheelchair, so I would get him around at Mass." Holy Week came and there was a lot to do during the Triduum, so Bishop Sklba came to help out.

"We got to know one another and one day he asked me to consider becoming a deacon," Deacon Ray said. While it was something of a surprise, it really shouldn't have been.

"I was always very much involved in church from a young age. I helped at Mass and funerals as an altar boy and had considered becoming a priest," Deacon Ray said. "I particularly enjoyed participating in the Lent and Easter seasons, especially the days of the Triduum.

"When I was a child [in Niagara, Wis., near Iron Mountain, Mich.], the celebration of the Triduum was during the day, not in the evening, so very few people came," Deacon Ray said. "I was an altar boy and I decided at one point that I wanted to be a priest."

After high school, however, he went on to Marquette University where he majored in accounting. Then he went into the Air Force where he played the organ each weekend at Mass. and afterwards entered the work force as director of real estate for Kohls Food Stores for 32 years.

After 25 years as a deacon, he says he would encourage others to follow this career path, but with some caveats.

"Be prepared for a long and grueling training period," he said. "I wouldn't advise this for men with small children. It's important that the man's wife fully embrace this career path."

"My wife Audrey was at first surprised at my decision to become a deacon, but I was determined and she came around," he said.

"She was pleased with my decision to do this. Today the wife is much more involved in the training than when I went through the formation process."

Looking back at the past years as a deacon, he said he presided mostly at weddings, baptisms and funerals, often for family members. The experience has been rewarding. THE GOOD WORD

Children's Liturgy of the Word (CLOW) is a liturgical celebration of the Word designed for children in 4K-4th grade that brings the Sunday Readings and Gospel message to the children in age-appropriate language. It also prepares them to attend regular Mass with better understanding.



The Apparition Oratory is an underground place of prayer located directly below the sanctuary of the Apparition Chapel. It was constructed to emphasize the experience of Mary's presence on the Shrine's sacred grounds. It includes more than 20 relics.

All children attending 10:30 Mass with their families are invited to participate in this kid-friendly Liturgy of The Word.



Along with hearing the Word of God, the children will participate in discussion and activities that

connect the message to their everyday life.

After the Opening Prayers at Mass the children will be invited to come forward for a blessing as they are dismissed for their special Liturgy of the Word.

We encourage all children attending 10:30 Mass to participate in CLOW. After taking a break during the summer, CLOW will begin again on September 10 and will be offered most weekends through May.

Out and About

Champion visit scheduled for July 22

Join us on Saturday, July 22, for a special all-day Out and About trip to the National Shrine of Our Lady of Champion in Champion, Wis. (just north of Green Bay). This is an internationally recognized holy site where the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared.

The story: Adele Brise, a Belgian immigrant girl in Champion, Wis., walked 10 miles to church each Sunday. "Three times in a row, she saw a vision of beautiful lady, clothed in dazzling white, with a yellow sash around her waist. Her dress fell to her feet in graceful folds. She had a crown of stars around her head, and her long golden wavy hair fell loosely over her shoulders. The lady had such a heavenly light around her that Adele could hardly look at her face. Overcome by the light, Adele fell to her knees and said, "In God's name, who are you, and what do you want of me?"

The lady replied, "I am the Queen of Heaven who prays for the conversion of sinners, and I wish you to do the same. You received Holy Communion this morning and that is well. But you must do

more. Make a general confession and offer Communion for the conversion of sinners. If they do not convert and do penance, my Son will be obliged to punish them."

Things you can see at the Champion shrine: prayer and devotion locations, apparition oratory and chapel (accessible entries), grave site of Adele Brise, Stations of the Cross, outdoor Rosary Walk, statues of many saints and a replica of the Divine Mercy portrait. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops declared the grounds of Our Lady of Good Help as a National Shrine in 2016.

Registration deadline for this event is July 14. Sign up in the church lobby at the Out and About table. We're carpooling, so please indicate whether you will be able to drive. Pack your own lunch or plan to buy a sandwich at the café.

We will meet at the playground entrance and carpool just as we do for regular Out and About trips. On the way, we will stop by the National Shrine of St. Joseph at St. Norbert's College in DePere, Wis.
