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Dear Friends,

Revitalizing any parish through Christian Formation (CF) programs begin with the young people. They can be formed to become lifelong parishioners of St. Agnes. Young people and their parents are an integral and vital part of a parish like ours. We want to welcome young people and their families, together with our longtime and senior parishioners to make our community thrive by preparing their children in our Catholic faith and by actively engaging them in various parish ministries and service projects.

To achieve the above-mentioned noble goals, we are planning to make it convenient for all our children to attend the CF classes on Sundays and come to Mass either at 8 a.m. before their class (that begins at 9 a.m.) or after their class at the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Thus, kids and young people can practice and grow in faith on a regular basis.

The good news related to this is that we have a new youth minister, Michael Deane. He will restart our youth activities and formation programs for the middle and high school level students by engaging them in Christ-centered service projects.

As we all know, parenting is a tough job in this day and age, especially with no roadmap to navigate through the journey of life. In order to support parents, during CF classes, we will resume adult faith formation programs. This will deepen parents' understanding of the relevance of Christian Sacraments and Scripture in the modern times. This will also enable them to connect with others and grow in faith while making new friends along the way.

To illustrate the impact that parents have on their children's faith formation, I would like to share a true story from a bestselling author, Elisabeth Hasselbeck.

In her book, *Flashlight Night: An Adventure in Trusting God*, Elisabeth gives a great teaching tool to shape the faith of children. A young mom painted her son's bedroom wall and asked him to write his simple prayers on that wall and so he did. At night, when the lights were off, he couldn't see his prayers any longer. His mom, therefore, gave him a flashlight to show that even though we can't see God and we might think the prayers are out of sight, God can still see them. What a beautiful lesson for our children!

Parents are the best and first teachers of faith for children. Children learn and understand many things by observation. There is an old saying about how some things are taught and many things are "caught" through observation. If your child sees you making time to attend Mass, read Bible and pray, the child will likely realize and learn these things as fundamental to their Christian life. Your patience, kindness and trustworthiness as parents are the loudest testimonies of God's grace.

I request all our parents and grandparents to encourage their children to make time for the Holy Eucharist and CF and youth formation programs. These are designed to engage the kids and young people to learn about the God who created them and loves them unconditionally. May God our Father bestow His grace abundantly upon all our parents and their children during this new academic year so that they may grow in faith and wisdom.

Sunday Mass time change starts Nov. 6

But do our neighbors or relatives recognize their own brokenness? When we help them see that the source of their own brokenness is a result of original sin, we open the door to healing and hope. Once this happens we can introduce the way that leads to life. When we proclaim Jesus as our Savior, we reveal the path toward redemption. We are not alone. Jesus is with us every day! He

walks with us in our journey of life.

This brings us to the part that might be challenging, but if we’ve ever been touched by Jesus, we shouldn’t be shy



about it. Go and tell others about the mighty deeds of Jesus found in scripture, found in the lives of the saints and experienced in our own lives. By simply telling others, “**God is so good to me.**

I’ve been blessed with _____,” we are evangelizing!

Next, we show others their cross by sharing how Jesus has helped us in our struggles. We all have our cross and Jesus tells us, “Lift up your cross and follow me.” **When we lead by example, we are evangelizing!** Knowing that Christ helps

us carry our cross is one example of our encounter with the Risen Christ. Sharing this experience with others will help them recognize their own encounter with the Risen Christ and will fortify your faith as well.

The last step is the most important. By **walking with others on their faith journey** we can help them to go

deeper through prayer and other Catholic practices such as frequent confession and attending Mass regularly. Evangelization is just that — sharing your faith, encouraging others to grow in their faith and being the disciple that God calls us to be.

Tithing report — 2nd quarter 2022

Since God graciously gives us everything we have, STEWARDSHIP is a life filled with sharing those same gifts of Time, Talent and Treasure with all God's people. This is the saying on our Stewardship logo. As a tithing parish we are committed to sharing 2.5% of our treasure with those who need our financial support. Our Human Concerns Committee is tasked with this mission. For the second quarter (April-June) of 2022 we donated approximately \$4,150. Summer Mission Trip

Volunteer experience enriches participants' lives

Here's a puzzle for you: What do three adults and six teens from St. Agnes, and four teens from St. James/Good Shepherd parishes have in common?

Answer: They all traveled to Benton Harbor and St. Joseph, twin cities in Michigan, at the end of July to do community service for a week.

There was plenty to do. Josh Bembenek, one of the St. Agnes adults, said they worked at a community gardens, a retail store and at a warehouse where they packed food to be delivered to the homebound.

"At a thrift shop, we sorted donations and decided what could be put on the sales floor," St. Agnes chaperone Kate Kaiser said.

"We moved things around on the sales floor for better organization," Bembenek said. Kaiser said that anyone who came to the thrift shop could also get food if they needed it.

"It reminded me of the corporal works of mercy," Kaiser said. "Clothe the naked, feed the hungry, etc." Kaiser said she was moved by the experience.

"We also saw the face of Christ in all the people who led the work experience," she said. "For example, there was the volunteer who was a well-educated teacher and master gardener, and she shared her food with others and talked about her faith with the clients."

For St. Agnes parent and chaperone, Jamie Becker, this was her seventh or eighth mission trip. All three of her children have gone on these trips, starting after sixth grade. Becker sees this experience as an important one for them.

"It's not so much about the community we're serving, but the service the kids are able to give," Becker said. "I love watching their transformation in faith strengthen throughout the week, which in turn renews my faith, seeing God work through the kids with others."

The program is sponsored by YouthWorks, which "provides Christ-centered mission trips for thousands of teenagers and adult leaders in communities across the U.S. and beyond," according to the website. St. Agnes has been participating for close to 20 years, said Shelly Fellin, Coordinator of Christian Formation and Liturgy at St. Agnes.



Chaperones and students in this group volunteered in Michigan this summer. Another group worked in Boston.

Bembenek was impressed with the ceremony one evening when the leader read the Bible passage about Jesus washing the feet of the apostles, followed by the kids washing the feet of the adult volunteers. "Then we washed the feet of the kids who were volunteers. It was very emotional," he said. "I realized the impact that serving others can make on a person. Even praying with others made you feel vulnerable."

Some of the St. Agnes high school students had been on a trip like this before. Kaiser said she could tell "they got closer to God and realized that they could make a difference in others' lives."

Becker was the most experienced of the St. Agnes group. "I learned a lot from Gerry Wolf on earlier trips about how to relate to the kids. It can be a challenge for them to leave the comfort of their homes, but the benefits far outweigh the uncertainties," she said. "The experience makes you appreciate what you have. It renews my faith, watching God work through the kids."

Bembenek agreed about the value of

the trip. "Knowing there are people who are going through harder times puts things in perspective."

Kaiser thought the trip was so worthwhile, she challenges other members of the St. Agnes community to volunteer to go on next year's trip.

Fellin said it's never too early to start thinking about this. Talk to her now about your interest for next year—both adults and students. It's one week in July. Sign up and start saving now. The cost is about \$450 per person. Yes, it's a commitment, but those who have gone attest to the rewards, the new friendships with others who are also volunteering and the benefits of knowing you have made a difference in others' lives.

We invite adults and students to consider joining next year's Mission Trips:

- Catholic Work Camp: Marshalltown, Iowa — July 15-22
- Youthworks Mission Trip: Indianapolis Indiana — July 23-28

Both trips are for both middle school and high school students.

54 new students enroll at St. Agnes School this fall

Principal Rachel Kolbeck and Assistant Principal Amy Retzer are happy people. Last year St. Agnes School started with 91 students and ended with 123. They began this year with 145, an increase of 54 children, compared with

the start of last year.

"Word gets around," Kolbeck said. "Families are happy here. They are happy that their students are in a safe, peaceful environment that is conducive to learning."

Retzer reinforced that viewpoint, saying, "They know their children are receiving a strong foundation in academics and faith formation."

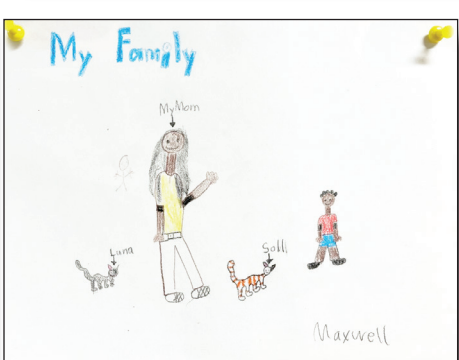
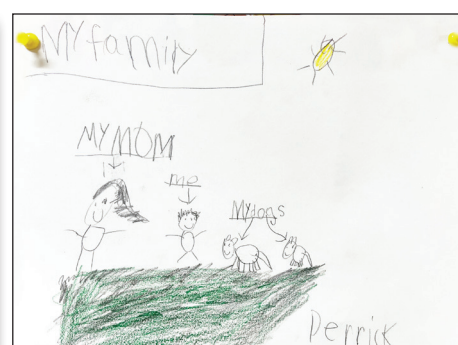
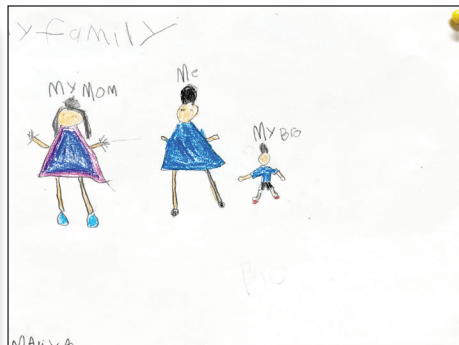
2nd graders' drawings focus on family love
