April Highlights

Saint of the Month: St. Catherine of Siena

Saint Catherine of Siena was born on March 25, 1347. She was an ascetic, mystic, activist, author, and holy woman of the Catholic Church. Her assertive and confrontational letters to bishops and popes, as well as her commitment to direct service to the sick and the poor, made Catherine a powerful role model for a more worldly and active spirituality.

Catherine of Siena was born into a large family during the outbreak of the plaque in Siena, Italy. She was born a twin, although her sister did not survive infancy. Her father was a wealthy dye-maker. From age six or seven, Catherine had religious visions. She practiced self-deprivation, especially abstaining from food. She took a vow of virginity but told no one, not even her parents.

Her mother urged her to improve her appearance as her family began to arrange her marriage to the widower of her sister, who had died in childbirth. Catherine cut off her hair and her parents punished her for it until she revealed her vow. They then permitted her to become a Dominican tertiary.

In 1363, she joined the Sisters of Penance of St. Dominic, an order made up mostly of widows. It was not an enclosed order, so she lived at home. For her first three years in the order, she stayed isolated in her room, seeing only her confessor. During the three years of contemplation and prayer, she developed a rich theological system, including her theology of the Precious Blood of Jesus.

At the end of the three years she believed she had a divine command to go out into the world and serve as a means of saving souls and working

on her salvation. But something changed her when she was 21. She described an experience she referred to as her "mystical marriage to Christ." She continued to practice fasting and self-mortification, including self-scourging, and took communion frequently.

From 1375 onwards, St. Catherine began dictating letters to scribes. She petitioned for peace and was instrumental in persuading the Pope in Avignon to return to Rome. She became involved in the fractured politics of her time, but was instrumental in restoring the Papacy to Rome and in brokering peace deals during a time of factional conflict and war between the Italian city states.

She also established a monastery for women in 1377 out-

side of Siena. She is credited with composing over 400 letters, her Dialogue, which is her definitive work, and her prayers. These works are so influential that St. Catherine would later be declared a Doctor of the Church. She is one of the most influential and

popular saints in the Church.

In January of 1380, she became ill which accelerated her inability to eat and drink. Within weeks, she was unable to use her legs. She died on April 29 at the age of 33 following a stroke just a week prior.

She is the patroness against fire, illness, the United States, Italy, miscarriages, people ridiculed for their faith, sexual temptation, and nurses.

Monthly Minute: Divine Mercy

The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And, He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy. The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A - Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.



- **B** Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.
- **C** Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with trust, the more we can receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.

The message and devotional practices proposed in the *Diary* of *Saint Faustina* are completely in accordance with the teachings of Church and are firmly rooted in the Gospel message of our Merciful Savior. Properly understood and implemented, they will help us grow as genuine followers of Christ.

Spend time to learn more about the mercy of God, learn to trust in Jesus, and live your life as merciful to others, as Christ is merciful to you.

Catechism Corner

This issue we focus on the 10th Commandment:

You shall not covet anything that is your neighbor's. Ex. 20:17

For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. Matt. 6:21

The ninth and tenth commandments are related in that they both speak of covetousness; the ninth focuses on the desires of the flesh while the tenth focuses on the material goods of others and the intentions of the heart. (CCC 2534)

The tenth commandment forbids greed and avarice. These two vices reflect our desires for earthly goods and the power that is associated with attaining riches. Only by ridding envy from our heart can we overcome these desires. (CCC2536 & 2538) "Envy is a capital sin. It refers to the sadness at the sight of another's goods and the immoderate desire to acquire them for oneself, even unjustly." Envy reflects our lack of charity and often is rooted in pride. To overcome our struggle with envy we are called to exercise good will toward others and train ourselves in humility. (CCC2539 & 2540)

In the Gospels Jesus encouraged his disciples to prefer *Him* over everything and everyone. Jesus gave the example of the poor widow of Jerusalem that, out of her poverty, gave all that she had. Lk. 21:4 For our entrance into the Kingdom of Heaven we must have a detachment from riches. (CCC2544)

The Beatitudes also speak of a "Poverty of the Spirit" and the joy that comes from our humility. They also reveal to us the way to find happiness, grace and peace. Those who find consolation in the abundance of earthly goods are far from the Kingdom of heaven.

Trusting in God's providence "frees us from anxiety about tomorrow." "Desire for true happiness frees man from his immoderate attachment to the goods of this world so that he can find his fulfillment in the vision and beatitude of God." (CCC2546-2548)
